A MID-SEVENTEENTH CENTURY VIEW OF EAST DEREHAM MANOR by D. W. Hollis, B.A., M.A., Ph.D.

It seems a commonplace that historians seek the typical example to support their generalizations. In the case of royal manors in the seventeenth century, there is probably no typical manor because of the manifest variations from one to another. Nevertheless, East Dereham manor is ordinary in the sense that it possesses basic characteristics common to numerous other royal manors in seventeenth-century England.

The history of East Dereham manor can be traced back at least to the tenth century when King Edgar and Bishop Ethelwold of Winchester granted the village of East Dereham to the monastery of St. Ethelred at Ely. In 1109, the control of East Dereham changed from monastic to episcopal under the jurisdiction of the Bishop of Ely. In 1558, the manor was declared to be parcel of the crown's properties by an Act of Parliament. During the seventeenth century, the manor seems to have been most often part of the Queen's jointure. This was not always the case, as Prince Charles held his first manor court there in 1621.¹

According to the Domesday survey of the late eleventh century, East Dereham manor contained about five carucates² of land and three mills with an annual value of £10. By 1465, the value had increased to over £45 per annum, but future increases were modest — up to £52.14s. per annum in the 1550s and £54.14s. by 1607. The overall income from the manor as a whole had increased to only £59 per annum by the end of James I's reign in 1624. There were, however, some efforts by the early Stuarts to improve the manorial income. For example, the rent for forty acres of pasture in East Dereham rose from 8s. per annum in 1589 to £6.13s.4d. in 1607, more than a sixteenfold increase. At the time of the Parliamentary survey in 1650, East Dereham's income had risen to just under £89 per annum.³

In spite of the apparently casual and usually inconsequential improvements of incomes from some royal manors in the early seventeenth century, the management of royal manors in general failed to keep pace with the progressive measures of many private landowners. For example, royal leases under the early Stuarts remained lengthy at a time when many private landowners were shortening their leases in order that rents might be periodically raised. In the late 1620s, a lease for East Dereham of thirty-one years was granted to Robert Phipps, a London grocer, and another lease in 1635 of sixty years was granted to John Neve, a London blacksmith. Moreover, even though one of the principal purposes of the Parliamentary surveys of the 1650s was to improve the income from royal manors, apparently little was learned from the Commonwealth experience. In 1685, there were three leaseholds for East Dereham manor returning the identical rents charged by the crown for these parcels at the time of the 1650 survey.⁴

Portions of the manor were in the possession of some substantial landowners during the seventeenth century. For example, Thomas Berney of Swardeston held 101 acres of East Dereham manor under lease at the time of the 1650 survey. He also was the owner of considerable properties in Norfolk including Hockering manor and Gowthorpe manor. The leasing of crown manors was not unusual for progressive and ambitious landowners because the crown rents were

invariably lower than the market price. Therefore, the lessees could exploit the favourable terms and then move on to more attractive landed investments.⁵

Another indication of the social and economic flux in the early modern era was the frequent turnover among the ownership of freeholds and copyholds at East Dereham manor between 1465 and 1685. The surveys of 1650 and 1685 show only about fifteen family names which also appeared on the 1465 survey. In addition, the total number of tenants dwindled between 1465 and 1607 from 228 to 155. The latter statistics can be partially explained by the fact that the land area of East Dereham manor decreased by about one-fifth over the period. Nonetheless, the depopulation was more striking than the land reduction because the average size of the tenant holding increased from ten and two-thirds acres to thirteen and one-half acres between 1465 and 1607.⁶

The transcript of the 1650 Parliamentary Survey below provides a detailed and comprehensive view of the management and customs on a royal manor in the middle of the seventeenth century. The survey was ordered by the Commonwealth to establish the manor's true market value in order that it could be sold. The surveyors did an admirable job with East Dereham as they did with the vast majority of other Parliamentary surveys during the 1650s.⁷ East Dereham manor was sold in April 1650 in two separate transactions. The manor itself, the market, fairs, and about 255 acres were bought by Captain George Tracey for £2064.4s.7d., while the remaining forty acres were purchased by Erasmus Spillman for £143.4s. Spillman had been a royal tenant of the parcel which he purchased at the time of the Parliamentary confiscation of East Dereham in the 1640s.⁸
