

REPORT OF PROCEEDINGS

1937

THE ANNUAL EXCURSION was held on June 16th at Godstone and Blechingley. The Annual Excursion outside the County took place on July 19th at Oxford. On September 23rd there was a half-day excursion to Ash and Odiham. An account of these Meetings appears in the Annual Report. The Society extends its thanks to the organizers and conductors and all those who by opening their houses for inspection or in other ways ensured the success of the excursions held during the year.

1938

During the Spring the following series of whole-day Saturday Excursions was arranged and successfully carried out :

19TH FEBRUARY. The excursion was conducted by Mr. Edwin Hart, F.S.A., and visited Puttenden Manor, a fine early Tudor house the residence of Mr. P. Napier, Lingfield and Felbridge. After lunch the party, under the guidance of Mr. I. D. Margary, F.S.A., inspected remains of the Croydon-Portslade Roman road near Rowplatts Lane and walked to Hedgecourt Pond, proceeding thence via Woodcock Hill, where a good view of the Wire Mill Pond was obtained, to Blindley Heath for tea.

5TH MARCH, Mr. Hart conductor. The party walked up Riddlesdown, where Mr. Margary pointed out the probable line of the Roman road, and then proceeded by road to Wapses Lodge to see the bed of the Nailbourne and line of Roman road, after which some of the party ascended Tillingdown Lane and walked along the ancient plough bank and down into Caterham. The old parish church of Caterham was visited and the party drove via Tilburstow Hill to Horne Church and Outwood. After lunch Brownslade, Salfords, a late Tudor type of half-timber house, was inspected by permission of Mr. and Mrs. Matthias and the party proceeded to Thundersfield

Castle, near Horley, and saw the earthworks and site of the fourteenth-century bloomery which were described by Mr. Hart.

19TH MARCH, Mr. Hart conductor. The party drove over Walton Heath and Boxhill to Norbury Park and walked through the Druids Grove. At West Humble Chapel, which was next visited, Mr. Hart and Mr. Hugh Braun, F.S.A., described the ruin and the work of clearance and repair recently completed. After lunch at Ockley the remains of the earthworks of an early Norman castle near the Church were inspected by permission of Mr. W. A. Calvert, the owner. The outing terminated with a visit to Charlwood Church and the neighbouring Manor House, followed by tea at Horley.

2ND APRIL. Dr. Hooper, F.S.A., conducted an excursion to Wotton and Abinger. Assembling at Gomshall Station, the party walked by Beggars Lane and Piney Copse to High Hackhurst, a picturesque old house with numerous interesting features which was visited by permission of the Hon. Oliver and Mrs. Farrer. Proceeding over Broomy Down and Evershed's Rough past the Bishop's Cross, the fine bell barrow in Deerleap Wood was inspected and shortly described. After lunch and a visit to Wotton Church the return walk was taken past Wotton House and Abinger Mill to Crossways Farm. This charming seventeenth-century house, which has some fine brickwork, and the ancient barn adjoining, were inspected by permission of Mr. Abbott. Tea was provided at The Compasses, Gomshall, by kind invitation of Lord Farrer, F.S.A.

30TH APRIL. The excursion was conducted by Dr. Gibson and first drove to the site of the long barrow at Badshot Farm, where Mr. W. F. Rankine described his discovery of the barrow and its subsequent excavation. The mesolithic pit-dwellings at the Farnham sewage farm were next visited and explained by Mr. Rankine. Some members of the party then proceeded on foot across Farnham Park, while the remainder drove to Hog Hatch. After lunch the party proceeded to Lawday House Farm and the Bishop's Bank and thence along the Odiham road to the County Boundary. The Bishop's Bank and County Boundary were traced on foot across the Heath and down Long Bottom to near Anglesey House. Batt's Hog Sty, a curious earthwork in Claycoat Bottom, was next visited, and described by Dr. Gibson, and the Meeting concluded with tea at Aldershot.

16TH MARCH. The ordinary Spring Meeting was held at the National Maritime Museum, Greenwich, when a visit to the Queen's

House was followed by an inspection of the national treasures housed in the Museum.

THE EIGHTY-THIRD ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING was held on May 7th at the Guildhall, Guildford, by permission of His Worship the Mayor, Alderman H. Gammon, and was presided over by the President of the Society, the Rt. Hon. the Earl of Onslow, F.S.A. The Minutes of the last Annual General Meeting were read and approved and the Accounts and Report of the Council for the year ended December 31st, 1937, were presented.

Report of Council

for the year ending December 31st, 1937.

THE COUNCIL OF THE SURREY ARCHÆOLOGICAL SOCIETY has much pleasure in presenting this its EIGHTY-THIRD ANNUAL REPORT together with CASH ACCOUNT and STATEMENT OF ASSETS AND LIABILITIES FOR THE YEAR 1937.

PUBLICATIONS.—During the year Volume XLV of the *Surrey Archæological Collections* was issued to Members. It contains the following Articles: the Church of All Saints, Ockham, by R. N. Bloxam; Notes on Byfleet Manor and the Manor House, by Leonard R. Stevens; The Roman Brickworks at Wykehurst Farm in the Parish of Cranleigh, with a Note on a Roman Tile-Kiln at Horton, Epsom, by R. G. Goodchild; Surrey Incumbents in 1562, by Geoffrey Baskerville and Canon A. W. Goodman; the London-Croydon-Portslade Roman Road, by Ivan D. Margary, F.S.A.

Mr. T. E. C. Walker owing to unforeseen causes was unable to edit this Volume as he had hoped to do and Miss M. Giuseppi, at great personal inconvenience, very kindly took his place. The Council is greatly indebted to Miss Giuseppi for assuming this task at short notice, and so relieving it of a difficulty. She is unable to undertake the editing of Volume XLVI, but the Council is pleased to report that her brother, Mr. J. A. Giuseppi, has kindly offered to act in her place for the year 1938.

Archæological Survey of Farnham and District.—Work on the preparation of this special volume is now nearing completion, and it is hoped to issue it during 1938.

EXCURSIONS.—Another series of local excursions was held during the Spring in response to numerous requests and again proved popular.

On February 6th and 20th Mr. Edwin Hart, F.S.A., completed the series of walks on the Pilgrims' Way by conducting parties along the course between Hollingbourne and Wye and its continuation to Postling.

On February the 27th and March 13th the line of the Roman road forming part of the eastern boundary of the County was followed on foot from West Wickham to Crockham Hill under the guidance of Mr. Jas. Graham, C.B.E.

On April 10th an excursion arranged by Dr. J. H. and Mrs. Gibson followed the line of the Maultway from Well to Bagshot, where the party visited The Cuckoo Pen, Cæsar's Camp, and the Town, and were addressed by Dr. Gibson, Mr. Poulter, and Dr. Williams-Freeman.

On April 24th Dr. W. Hooper, F.S.A., led a party on foot from Holmwood to Abinger Hatch via Coldharbour and Leith Hill, inspecting *en route* a portion of the Stane Street and Anstiebury Camp.

The following Ordinary Excursions took place during the year :

Tallow Chandlers Hall—April 10th. This meeting was restricted to members. The party was welcomed and addressed by Mr. R. H. Monier-Williams, Clerk of the Worshipful Company of Tallow Chandlers, and was subsequently entertained to tea by kind invitation of the Master and Wardens.

Godalming—April 28th. The excursion was conducted by Dr. W. E. St. L. Finny, F.S.A., and visited the Parish Church, the Old Town Hall and Museum, the King's Arms Hotel (where tea was taken) and the Municipal Buildings. On the way back to Guildford a visit was paid to Wyatt's Almshouses at Farncombe by kind permission of the Worshipful Company of Carpenters.

Godstone and Blechingley—June 16th (Whole Day). The excursion was under the direction of Mr. Edwin Hart, F.S.A., and Mr. Hugh Braun, F.S.A., and the places visited were Lagham Manor, Leigh Mill, the earthworks at Castle Hill, Godstone, during the morning ; and, after lunch, Castle Hill, Blechingley, the Old Manor House, Pendell Court and House, Brewer Street Farm, Place Farm, and Blechingley Church. At Leigh Mill the party was addressed by Sir Frederic Kenyon, G.B.E., President of the Society of Antiquaries.

Oxford—July 19th (Whole Day). In the morning the party inspected the remains of the Castle, Christ Church, and the Cathedral. After lunch visits were made to the Bodleian Library, the old Ashmolean Museum, the Divinity School, St. Peters-in-the-East Church, which was described by Miss V. Ruffer, New College

and some of the other Colleges. After tea the party drove out to Iffley to view the Church, and on returning to the City went round Magdalen College.

Surrey-Hants Borders—September 23rd. The excursion was under the guidance of Dr. J. H. Gibson, and first called at Ash Church, which was shortly described by him. The party then drove to Odiham and viewed the Church and the Priory. After tea at The King's Arms the party drove out to Odiham Castle and were addressed by Dr. Gibson and Mr. J. L. Starkey—the explorer of Lachish, whose career has since ended so tragically.

EXCAVATIONS.—*Carshalton*. With the consent of the L.C.C., and with the co-operation of the Medical Superintendent, Dr. Gray Hill, a fortnight's excavation in the grounds of Queen Mary's Hospital, Carshalton, was carried out during August, 1936. The site was known to possess a Hill-top Camp, which was found during construction of the hospital buildings nearly thirty years ago, but of which there is no surface indication. At that time, no scientific examination of the earthwork was made, although a considerable amount of pottery and other archæological material was discovered. (This, as yet unpublished, is preserved at Thornton Heath.) It was hoped that the work done during August would (a) rediscover the earthwork and enable us to establish its plan and position in relation to the buildings, and (b) obtain a certain amount of stratified and dateable pottery or other material. Thanks largely to very favourable weather, both these objects were achieved in the fortnight, save for the qualification that a few more trenches will require to be dug to settle the exact line of the northern part of the earthwork. A full Report on the work is to appear in the *Collections*. Briefly, the results were as follows:—The site was occupied at the close of the Bronze Age, and occupation material (pottery, querns, loom-weights, etc.) showed that the settlement extended, to the south, beyond the defences of the later earthwork. The latter was made in the Iron Age A period (approximately in use from 300 to 100 B.C.), and the ditch had silted up (though the site appears still to have been in occupation) during the Late Belgic, Iron Age C period. The level of the Roman pottery which was found, showed that the ditch was silted up completely at the time of the Claudian invasion. Part of a bronze palstave and of a bronze ingot, of Late Bronze Age date, and evidently part of a "founder's hoard," were discovered during the work.

Farnham. At Farnham Sewage Farm a few weeks' excavation of part (3 huts) of the unique Mesolithic village discovered by Mr. Rankine, were undertaken by Dr. and Mrs. Grahame Clark in

conjunction with Mr. Rankine. The work, for which the funds were provided partly by this Society and partly by the Percy Sladen Trust, was highly successful, and an account of the work will be contributed to the *Collections* by the excavators, in addition to a note appearing in the forthcoming volume on the Farnham district. Two of the huts have been roofed over, to preserve them, by the Farnham U.D.C.

Excavation of the earthwork on Botany Hill, to the south-east of Farnham, had to be postponed, but it is hoped that it will be possible to do this work during the present year.

Cæsar's Camp, Wimbleton Common. A trench for a 3 ft. steel main was dug across the site from west to east by the Metropolitan Water Board in July, 1937, and was supervised archæologically by Mr. F. Cottrill and Mr. A. W. G. Lowther. The single rampart had a revetment palisade front and back, and was separated from the single ditch by a berm. The productive occupation-level was restricted to a small area inside the eastern defences with an extension up the inner slope of the rampart, showing that the pottery post-dated the construction of the camp. The pottery includes brown burnished ware of evolved situla-form with fingertip decoration, similar to that from St. Martha's, Guildford.

Guildford Castle. The Council notes with satisfaction that the Guildford Corporation has decided to carry out necessary repairs to the Castle in spite of the large sum that these are expected to cost.

West Humble Chapel, Mickleham. The Society has taken an active part in preserving the remains of this building, and has contributed towards the cost. The work of repairing the ruins and clearing the site was commenced in October 1937 and completed in March following, and the property has been presented by Lord Ashcombe and Cubitt Estates, Ltd., to the National Trust. It is hoped to publish an account of the work in Volume XLVI of the *Collections*.

MUSEUM.—Mr. A. W. G. Lowther, F.S.A., was nominated to fill the vacancy on the Museum Committee caused by Mr. Nevill's resignation. The Society's other representatives on the Committee are Lord Farrer, F.S.A., Lieut.-General Sir Alfred Bingley, K.C.I.E., C.B., and Miss D. M. King-Church.

Besides the additions noted in Volume XLV of the *Collections* the following among other objects have been lent or presented to the Museum during the year:

Hoard of Bronze Implements comprising two Socketed Axes and a Palstave of Late Bronze Age, found 1858 on Hankley Common near Tilford—lent by Lord Adam Gordon.

Second Century Romano-British Burial Group consisting of Urn and Dish, found 1902 in the former Fair Field, Farnham—lent by Major Anderson of Waverley Abbey.

Bill and Admission Card to the Surrey Zoological Gardens, Walworth—presented by Mr. Dendy Marshall.

Carved Stick depicting trade of a Bramley Bricklayer—presented by Mr. T. Wade.

LIBRARY.—The revision of the Catalogue is being kindly undertaken by Mr. and Mrs. L. Collison-Morley.

Besides the usual volumes in exchange from other Societies, the following amongst others have been presented to the Library :

Old Cottages and Farm-Houses in Surrey, by W. Galsworthy Davie, with an introduction and sketches by W. Curtis Green ; *The Cradle of a Great Corporation* (Croydon), compiled by A. L. Whealler ; *Sketches of Oxted and Limpsfield*, by Arthur Keen—Parts 2 and 3 ; *Roman Roads in South-East Britain*, by G. M. Hughes.

The Tontine Book of the White Hart Inn, Guildford, dated 1803, has been presented by Mr. H. A. Merriman. Its sign was the badge of King Richard II, and after it closed in 1905 the sign was transferred to our Museum.

A large collection of photographs and original drawings and plans of Surrey churches, etc., by Mr. P. M. Johnston, have been presented by his widow. These have not so far been tabulated.

The President, Lord Onslow, has presented a most interesting plan of the Royal Manor of Woking, containing various tithings and being the demesnes of John Walter. The map was surveyed and delineated by John Remnant of Guildford, 1739.

The collection of Surrey prints acquired by the Society in 1933 has been arranged and catalogued under parishes by Mr. J. H. Walters. The collection includes a large number of duplicates which may be purchased by Members at very moderate prices. A list of these duplicates with prices may be seen on application to the Hon. Secretary.

MUNIMENT ROOM.—The number of accessions has been unusually large this year, the most important being deeds relating to :

(1) Eashing Chapel Mill and cottages 1696–1893, presented by Rev. J. T. Douglas.

(2) Land owned by William Haydon of Guildford 1810–1815, presented by Miss Haydon.

(3) Manor of Cobham and Manor of Ham with a map of the Manor of Cobham 1828–1902, presented by Mr. H. A. Merriman, executor of the late Miss E. W. Husband.

(4) Godwin-Austen Estates dating from the fourteenth century, deposited by Sir Alfred Bingley on behalf of the Trustees. These deal chiefly with Shalford and other Villages near Guildford and are of special interest.

(5) Property in Godalming 1659-1852, presented by Messrs. Hooper & Holt.

SURVEY OF SURREY ARCHITECTURE.—Mr. C. D. Hawley, F.R.I.B.A., has kindly undertaken to act as editor and organizer of the Survey. He has written reports on the domestic architecture of the parishes of Dunsfold and Pyrford which it is hoped to publish shortly.

PHOTOGRAPHIC SURVEY.—The Council has considered a proposal for making a photographic survey of old buildings and other antiquities in the County. In view of the difficulty of organizing and carrying out such a survey and of the fact that the Photographic Survey and Record of Surrey with headquarters at the Public Library, Town Hall, Croydon, has been engaged on this work for several years, during which it has amassed a large collection, the Council does not feel justified in starting a fresh scheme. It proposes, however, to compile a list of existing collections of photographs and other pictorial records of this kind which have any claim to importance and are available for reference by Members of the Society, and the Society will be glad to receive particulars of any such collections whether public or private, relating to any part of the County, in order that the list may be made as complete as possible.

FINANCE.—There has been a slight increase in the membership in the past year and the accounts show a satisfactory balance in hand, but as the cost of printing Vol. XLV was not paid until 1938, the balance in hand does not represent the true state of affairs.

The Council intend to publish an additional volume for the year 1938, which will have the effect of considerably reducing the bank balance.

Owing to the generous gift of £100 by Mrs. H. Eric Miller, the Excavations fund is also in a better condition, but there are likely to be many demands on the fund in the coming year and more money will be required if much field work is to be undertaken.

HONORARY SECRETARY.—In July Mr. Nevill announced his impending resignation as Honorary Secretary on the ground that he had shortly to go out to New Zealand for family reasons and

would be absent for over a year. The Council received the news with keen regret and has had considerable difficulty in finding a successor. Eventually Dr. Hooper agreed to act for the time being, and the Council recommends his election. Since his appointment in 1932 Mr. Nevill has proved to be an able and exceedingly popular Secretary and his absence will be greatly felt, though it is hoped that this will be only temporary. The Council has conveyed to him its most cordial thanks for his valuable services.

COUNCIL.—Under Rule IV the following members of the Council retire and are ineligible for re-election for the ensuing year : Lt.-Col. H. F. Bidder, D.S.O., F.S.A., Captain C. H. M. Pearce, F.S.A., R. H. G. Leveson-Gower, C. D. Hawley, F.R.I.B.A., and F. E. Bray. There are also two vacancies caused by the death of Canon J. E. Jagger, and the appointment of Dr. Hooper as Hon. Secretary.

The Council recommends the election of the following members : Eric Gardner, M.B., F.S.A., Miss D. M. King-Church, Rev. H. P. B. Chubb, A. W. G. Lowther, F.S.A., Sir John Marshall, C.I.E., F.S.A., Miss M. Farewell Jones and R. G. Goodchild.

The Council appointed Mr. C. D. Hawley, F.R.I.B.A., to fill the vacancy on the Executive Committee caused by Dr. Hooper's appointment as Hon. Secretary. The other members of that Committee are : M. S. Giuseppi, F.S.A., Edwin Hart, F.S.A., Hilary Jenkinson, F.S.A., and the Hon. Officers of the Society.

The Council deeply regrets to record the deaths of Mr. Mill Stephenson, F.S.A., a Vice-President and former Hon. Secretary of the Society, and of Canon Jagger, a member of the Council. A memoir of Mr. Mill Stephenson appears in Volume XLV of the *Collections*. Canon Jagger, who was Vicar of Merton, died on February 25th. He was first elected to the Council in 1918, and it was largely through his efforts that the beautiful Norman archway from Merton Priory, discovered in 1914 and described in Volume XXVII of the *Collections*, was preserved and re-erected in Merton Churchyard.

The Report and Accounts were adopted. Lord Onslow was re-elected President. The new members recommended to serve on the Council under Rule IV were elected ; Mr. A. R. Cotton, F.S.A., was re-elected Hon. Treasurer, Dr. W. Hooper, F.S.A., was elected Hon. Secretary ; Mr. J. A. Giuseppi was elected Hon. Acting Editor ; and Mr. R. W. Strickland, Hon. Excursions Secre-

tary; and the Hon. Auditors, Mr. R. Sadleir and Lt.-Col. L. A. Allen, D.S.O., were re-elected.

The President in the course of his address suggested that part of the "green belt" round Guildford should be used for the purpose of a folk museum, which he described as an out-of-door place where it would be possible to exhibit things that could not be shown in an indoor museum, and where old buildings could be re-erected. This suggestion has since been favourably entertained by the Borough Council, which is considering the possibility of giving effect to it.

After the Meeting, the Corporation plate was shown by the Mayor and tea was served at Abbot's Hospital by permission of the Governors.

After tea a Report on the proposed repairs to Guildford Castle, which had kindly been prepared for the Society's information by the Borough Surveyor, was read by Mr. Holland, and this was followed by a short discussion.

Prior to the Annual Meeting there was a Meeting of the local secretaries, with Lord Onslow in the chair. Means of increasing the Society's membership were considered and some useful suggestions made.
