Cremation deposit. We gave the same urn deposit no. for the ~~cremation~~ urn ~~cremation~~ and the cremation itself made of charcoal bits and burnt bones. The urn it's not intact and looks like it fell over in the pit, spilling partially the content. Only ~~the~~ half of the pot is preserved in situ, the rest ~~is~~ was disturbed post deposition, along with, probably, ~~the~~ part of the urn content as well. The urn content ~~is~~ was made mainly charcoal bits & fragment, with occ. burnt bones. It ~~is~~ ~~too~~ looks like they filled the urn with the funeral pyre content without much care for separating the human bones from the charcoal
