NOTES.

In the Transactions of the Hampstead Antiquarian and Historical Society, 1902-3, published in 1905, at p. 145, is an article "Wyldes and its story by Mrs. Arthur Wilson." This was also reprinted as a 3d. pamphlet, in 1904.

We are not concerned with the merits of this account, but derive from it (p. 156), the fact that the earliest survey at Eton College is dated 1770.

Chalcotts was in Hampstead, but from the first entry we learn that three parishes met in one field, hence the practice of naming these parishes in transfers. Similarly Wyldes was in Hendon, but Dell Field a detached field was in Finchley.

William Rawlinson Earle and Eleanor Earle by deed dated 23 December, 1752, leased to Robert Fryer of Hampstead, victualler, a farm called Challcotts and about 100 acres of land, including Primrose Hill and Rugmoor. This farm was formerly in the occupation of Edward Snoxell. It was a fourteen years' lease.

On 23 January, 1776, Giles Earle leased the same premises to James England for 16 years. Hence the name England's Lane.

Upper Chalcotts with Brick Wall and other fields was let to a different farmer. This was in the occupation of that great farmer, Thomas Rhodes, on 14 January, 1791, when he was granted a lease for 15 years at $\pounds 140$ per annum. A fresh lease of Chalcotts and Upper Chalcotts, together with the land, was granted to Thomas Rhodes, I January, 1802, for 21 years at $\pounds 460$ per annum.

Eton College granted a lease for 21 years from Lady day 1790, of Chalcots and Wilds to Earle.

Weild or Wyld may be variants of Weald, that is, Hendon or Hampstead Weald.
