EDWARD REGINALD TAYLOR,

Mr. E. Reginald Taylor had only been on the Council of the London and Middlesex Archaeological Society for a short time, but his work as Honorary Secretary of the British Archaeological Society for many years made him one of the best-known archaeologists of the day. He was a very keen traveller in all parts of Europe, especially in Dalmatia, Bosnia and adjacent countries. But Switzerland was his Mecca, and he had visited it and climbed its mountains more than 30 times. As a member of the Alpine Club and as a citizen of Sidcup, and a devoted supporter of its literary and scientific interest, Mr. Taylor did yeoman service, and he will be very much missed. He died on 14th May, 1932, and was buried at Foots Cray Church.
