There were six bells in Cole's time (c. 1750). Lloyd, p. 89. [See also Cole's diary, where he calls them 'tunable'.]

The single bell of CHRIST CHURCH, CROUCH END (1862) is described as 'borrowed from the school' (A.D.T.).
