Summary

Observation of groundworks at 147 Wootton Road, Kings Lynn, identified four small irregular pits within the foundation trenches. No finds were retrieved however, and the pits remain undated.

1.0 Introduction

The site lay at 147 Wootton Road, Kings Lynn, which consists of a long plot in the suburbs of the town, running west towards the Gaywood River and former marshes beyond. Now in Kings Lynn, this area lies in the former parish of Gaywood.

The work was commissioned by David Taylor Building of Kings Lynn .

This archaeological watching brief was undertaken in accordance with a Brief issued by Norfolk Landscape Archaeology (NLA Ref: EJR 01/06/2002) and a Method Statement for watching briefs prepared by the Norfolk Archaeological Unit (NAU).

The site archive is currently held by the Norfolk Museums and Archaeology Service, following the relevant policy on archiving standards.

2.0 Geology and Topography

At the time this archaeological watching brief was undertaken the plot was vacant, although until recently a bungalow had stood here and evidence of modern occupation debris was apparent throughout the topsoil.

The plot lay close to the River Gaywood, on the gentle slope leading down to the river flood plain and stood on a natural subsoil of sandy clays.

3.0 Archaeological and Historical Background

The site lies close to evidence of Saxon occupation, and adjacent to the road from Gaywood to Wootton. Two points of archaeological interest are recorded in the Norfolk Historic and Environment Record (HER), these are listed below:

- HER 14673: an isolated find of an iron spearhead, identified as Early Saxon in date, was previously found within the survey area (HER 39249)
- HER 5544: a Middle Saxon brooch has been recorded to the east of the survey area, on the site of a 17th century cemetery.

4.0 Methodology

The objective of this watching brief was to record any archaeological evidence revealed during the excavation of groundworks

All archaeological features and deposits were recorded using NAU *pro forma* sheets. Trench locations, plans and sections were recorded at appropriate scales.

5.0 Results

The main trenches were 0.90m wide, the other trenches some 0.50m wide, and up to 1.10m deep. The topsoil was c.0.60m deep over a sandy clay natural subsoil. The site lay close to the River Gaywood, to the west, with a 2m slope down to the river flood plain, some 50m to the west.

Four features were recorded in the trenches examined during this work (Fig. 2), all were irregular pits (Fig. 3), although their full extents exceeded the trench walls and could not be fully defined.

- Pit [1] was about 0.40m wide and 0.25m deep, with a fill ([2]) of dark brown to black sandy loam. There were no finds.
- Pit [3] was about 0.70m wide and 0.30m deep, with a fill ([4]) of dark loam with fragments of shell. There were no finds.
- Pit [5] was about 0.90m wide and 0.25m deep, with a fill ([6]) of dark loam with fragments of shell. There were no finds.
- Pit [7] was about 2.50m wide and 0.55m deep, with two fills. The lower fill ([9]) was a dark grey silt; the upper fill ([8]) was a black loam with fragments of shell.

6.0 Conclusions

Although there is evidence nearby for Saxon activity, no evidence for this was seen at 147, Wootton Road, although conditions were not good for identifying archaeological features, and those that were seen could not be dated.






Figure 1. Site Location. Scale 1:5000









Figure 2. Trench Plan. Scale 1:100




Figure 3. Sections of Pits [1], [3], [5] and [7] Scale 1:20
