Building Survey and Photographic Record of the Methodist Chapel at Terrington St Clement Norfolk

Summary

A standing building survey of the Wesleyan Methodist Chapel in the village of Terrington St Clement, west Norfolk, was undertaken by the Norfolk Archaeological Unit in advance of demolition and rebuilding.

1.0 Introduction

(Fig. 1)

The Wesleyan Methodist chapel stands in the village of Terrington St Clement, west Norfolk, on the corner of Hillgate Street and Wesley Road. The chapel is due to be demolished and replaced with a smaller chapel.

This building survey was undertaken in accordance with a Brief issued by Norfolk Landscape Archaeology (NLA Ref: ER 25.6.03) and NAU letter of 25.11.03.

The work was designed to create a written, drawn and photographic record to RCHME level 2 (RCHME 1996) in advance of demolition. This work was carried out for Parsons and Whittley Ltd of Swaffham and their clients.

The site archive is currently held by the Norfolk Museums and Archaeology Service, following the relevant policy on archiving standards.

2.0 Historical Background

The Methodist Chapel

(Figs 2 and 3. Plate 1)

The Wesleyan Methodist Society in Terrington St Clement was formed around 1813. The first chapel was built on the site of the present Sunday School located opposite, on Wesley Road, where the Sunday School building of 1881 stands today. The present chapel was built in 1844 and has a burial yard attached (Kellys Directory 1844; Religious Census 1851 in Ede 1994). The memorials date from 1872.

The chapel was given its gallery in 1860, an organ in 1875 (replaced in 1948), and in 1883 the rostrum for the pulpit was erected. In 1893 the chapel was reseated (TStCHG 1993).

As part of a survey of Nonconformist Chapels in Norfolk carried out some years ago (Ede *et al* 1994), a summary record was made of the Methodist Chapel at Terrington; this summary is held by the Norfolk Record Office (NRO SO 197 T197/20/5).

The chapel was described in this survey as 'very grand' with all ancillary buildings attached (cartshed and stables). This survey, however, has established that the attached 'cottage' is a rather later build (with brick walls butted on and with different coursing), while of the former stables only the stub of a wall survives. The cottage contains the domestic facilities for the chapel.

The chapel itself is of red brick with white brick cornices, shallow flat pilasters and pantiled roof. The interior is largely unaltered since 1844/1860, with galleries on four sides, metal pillars (octofoil sections) and pews. The chapel is aligned approximately north-to-south with the main entrance at the north end (Figs 2 and 3). The windows at the north end are round-headed and flank the main door; to east and west, the windows are rectangular, with metal casements and plain glass (Plate 1). There are two doors in the south (rear) wall. The western of the two doors is now within the attached cottage, and links the two buildings.

3.0 Methodology (Appendix 2)

The objective of this survey was to create a record of the chapel to RCHM level 2 (RCHM 1996). This requires:

4.0 Building Survey

(Figs 2, 3 and 4. Plates 1, 2, 3 and 4)

4.1 The Exterior (Appendix 1)

(Plates 1 and 2)

The building is of brick in a plain style with main façade and entrance to the north; the gable has a label above the cornice that reads:

'WESLEYAN'

Each of the two long side elevations has three pairs of windows (a lower and an upper); the south (rear) elevation has two plain entrances, two upper windows (like those at the side) and a central louvred ventilation window above them in the gable. The ventilation window has a keystone with the date '1844'.

To the west lies the burial yard. On the west side wall overlooking the burial yard are four wall monuments (1-4), these are set out in Appendix 1:

4.2 The Interior

Main Floor

(Fig. 3. Plates 3 and 4)

The ground floor has a vestibule at the north (entrance) end; from behind a door, a stair rises from each side of the vestibule to reach the gallery. The vestibule is separated from the body of the chapel by a screen, its upper part of small panes of coloured glass, in pale colours. The ground floor has a central bank of pews, two aisles, and sets of pews to each side. The pulpit stands on a rostrum with an open wrought iron screen in front (Fig 3). The ground floor has wainscotting throughout. The woodwork and furnishings on the ground floor are almost entirely of pitch pine.

The central pews are numbered and have umbrella stands at their ends (Plate 3).

The windows are mostly of plain glass but with decorative coloured insets (Plate 4).

Gallery

(Fig. 4. Plate 4)

The gallery runs around all four sides, and has a stepped raking floor on three sides (Fig. 4). The fourth (south) side is mostly occupied by the organ of 1948. Each of the other sides has a long bench against the wall and banks of box pews (Plate 4). The boxes have brass fittings for name labels, and doors.

The ceiling has a central rose and four decorative ventilation or sound holes.

5.0 Conclusions

The chapel is in near original form (1844, 1860) with pews removed downstairs (to provide space for Sunday School activities) and also upstairs near the organ. Externally, the main façade windows have modern lights, and the ancillary buildings were replaced by the present single-storey building in the past; the building is of red brick and butts with the chapel; the coursing does not conform.

The site archive also contains elevation drawings of the four external elevations.




Fig. 1 Site location. Scale 1:10,000




Fig. 2 Plan of chapel and attached cottage. Scale 1:500




Fig. 3 Main floor, plan. Scale 1:100
