Report on an Archaeological Watching Brief at Labour-in-Vain Yard, Norwich, 37403N

Summary

Monitoring of conversion work to buildings around Labour-in-Vain Yard recorded a previously recognised timber-framed building (1 Guildhall Hill). No below ground archaeological deposits were revealed.

1.0 Introduction

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


Figure 1. Site Location. Scale 1:5000

This archaeological watching brief was undertaken in accordance with a Brief issued by Norfolk Landscape Archaeology and a Method Statement for watching briefs prepared by the Norfolk Archaeological Unit. The objective was to record any archaeological evidence revealed during groundworks and alterations to the fabric of buildings in Labour-in-Vain Yard (Fig. 1) arising from their conversion to commercial and residential use.






Figure 2. The site. Scale 1:200

Labour-in-Vain Yard is at the end of a narrow passage (Fig. 2) that extends approximately 40m north from Guildhall Hill, about 10m east of the junction with Lower Goat Lane. The yard provides access to buildings at the rear of 1 and 2 Guildhall Hill.

Alterations to the building fabric were monitored and photographs (colour and monochrome) taken of all relevant features and deposits.

The site archive is currently held by the Norfolk Museums and Archaeology Service, in accordance with the relevant policy on archiving standards.

2.0 Observations

On 21st June, the removal of laths and rendering from the exterior of the east facing façade of 1 Guildhall Hill (a building to the west of Labour-in-Vain Yard, SMR 26112) was monitored. A first floor jettied timber-framed wall protruding 0.16m from the line of the ground floor wall and with some surviving lath and plaster infill was observed. Photographs were taken although the wall was obscured by scaffolding.

The brick weave surface of Labour-in-Vain Yard, to approximately 20m north of Guildhall Hill, was removed on 24th July. Only the sand bedding for the brick was revealed. A replacement surface would level a slight rise from the street.

3.0 Conclusions

1 Guildhall Hill (SMR 26112) was part of the Common Inn or Woolstaper's Hostel. It is of early 16th century build with 19th century alterations. The rear range, along the west of Labour-in-Vain Yard, dates from the 17th century. It consists of four bays and has two storeys with a jettied first floor (Smith 1990). Insufficient depth of material was removed during the groundworks for archaeological deposits to be exposed.
