

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Abstract

This report presents the results of an archaeological evaluation undertaken in respect to a proposed development at the site of the former Spartans Football Ground, Ferry Road, Edinburgh (centred on NGR: NT 2337 7595).

The development area measures approximately 2.13 ha in total. A 10% sample of the available area was investigated by the evaluation.

The evaluation was restricted by the presence of numerous live services and exclusion zones.

A high level of truncation had occurred across the development area with the exception of a small pocket within the north-east of the site. This revealed a relict plough-soil.

With the exception of a single sherd of Medieval white gritty ware recovered from the imported topsoil, no archaeological remains pre-dating the late 19th/early 20th centuries were recorded.

Due to the truncation recorded across site, no further works are considered necessary.

1 INTRODUCTION

1.1 **Background**

- 1.1.1 AOC Archaeology Group was commissioned by J Smart & Co (Contractors) PLC to undertake an archaeological evaluation prior to a development at the site of the former Spartans' Football Ground to the rear of 500 Ferry Road, Edinburgh. The evaluation was undertaken in order to satisfy the requirements of the local planning authority, City of Edinburgh Council who are advised on archaeological matters by the City of Edinburgh Council Archaeology Service (CECAS). The works were conducted according to the terms of a Written Scheme of Investigation (AOC 2013) in accordance with the principles set out in Scottish Planning Policy (Scottish Government 2010) and PAN 2/2011 Planning & Archaeology (Scottish Government 2011).
- 1.1.2 The development area (centred on NGR: NT 2337 7595; Figure 1) measured approximately 2.13 ha in total and included an area of football field, banked terracing and some scrub woodland.
- 1.1.3 Trenching revealed that much of the development area had undergone significant truncation, which had removed much of the original ground surface. Deposits of made ground up to one metre in depth were recorded alongside numerous rubble and clay field drains.
- No archaeological remains were recorded with the exception of a single sherd of white gritty ware medieval ceramic and an iron horse-shoe of indeterminate date. Both of these artefacts were recovered from the top-soil.

1.2 Location

1.2.1 The proposed development is located in the Pilton area of Edinburgh. The site is centred on NGR NT 2337 7595. The western boundary is marked by Pilton Drive whilst houses fronting onto Ferry Road form the southern boundary. Existing residential housing, West Winnelstrae and West Ferryfield, together form the eastern boundary. To the north the edge of the site is marked by a cycle path which follows the line of a former railway line.

1.3 Archaeological background

- 1.3.1 The Royal Commission on Ancient and Historical Monuments of Scotland does not list any known archaeological sites as lying within the development boundaries. The development site has most recently seen it house the grounds of Spartans Football Club, 'City Park'. A small stand that once formed part of the ground was severely damaged by fire and was demolished on the grounds of Health and Safety, however, the banked terracing is still evident around parts of the former pitch.
- 1.3.2 The Royal Commission on Ancient and Historical Monuments of Scotland does not list any known sites as existing within the development boundaries.
- 1.3.3 As noted in the brief supplied by CECAS, (March 2013) a Desk-based Assessment completed by the CFA noted that the surrounding area had been principally open farmland under cultivation from the 14th Century onwards. As a green-field site, with no history of development, there was always the possibility that hitherto unknown prehistoric features and/or artefacts may be present within the site boundaries.

2 **OBJECTIVES**

- 2.1 The objectives of the archaeological evaluation were:
 - i) to determine and assess the character, extent, condition, quality, date and significance of any buried archaeological remains within the proposed development area through evaluation trenching;
 - ii) to advise and implement an appropriate form of mitigation, such excavation, postexcavation analyses and publication, given the infeasibility of preserving the archaeological material in situ, should significant archaeological remains be encountered.

3 **METHODOLOGY**

- 3.1 The details of the archaeological evaluation, laid out below, were designed to meet the requirements of City of Edinburgh Council as advised by CECAS.
- 3.2 The evaluation was based on the trenching of a 10% sample of the c.2.13 ha development area. This equates to a minimum evaluation sample of 2,130 m² (1,065 linear metres). This was reduced to 630 linear metres due to the presence of live services and exclusion zones for badger sets and knotweed contamination.
- 3.3 The evaluation was undertaken by a 360 excavator equipped with 2.0 m wide bladed ditching bucket. Excavation was undertaken in units/spits until the first significant archaeological horizon or natural subsoil was reached. All machine excavation was supervised by an experienced field archaeologist and according to AOC Archaeology Group's standard operating procedures, and as per the methodology within the Written Scheme of Investigation (AOC 2013). The trenches were immediately backfilled upon completion.

RESULTS 4

4.1 The archaeological evaluation was undertaken during the period 17th September – 19th September 2013. Overall weather conditions were dry and archaeological visibility was good.

4.2 The area of the former football pitch (Trenches 1-8) was covered by a deposit of made ground ranging from 0.30 m to 0.60 m in depth. This deposit consisted of demolition material and redeposited clay. The made ground was in turn covered with an imported top-soil 0.25 m to 0.55 m in depth.

- 4.3 A small area of relict plough-soil was recorded to the north-east (Trenches 9-10). This was 0.30 m to 0.60 m in depth.
- 4.3 The evaluation trenches (Trenches 11 & 12) located within the eastern boundary of the development revealed that the area had been previously stripped and in-filled with a made ground of re-deposited top-soil and demolition material 0.60 m in depth.

4.4 All trenches revealed a natural sub-soil of red-brown boulder clay. This was cut by numerous clay and rubble drains orientated north to south and east to west.

5 CONCLUSION AND RECOMMENDATIONS

- 5.1 The proposed development site was subject to a full and comprehensive archaeological evaluation given the limitations imposed by the present services and exclusion zones. With the exception of the single sherd of Medieval white gritty ware recovered from the imported top-soil neither significant archaeological features nor artefacts pre-dating the late 19th/ early 20th century were identified.
- 5.2 No further works are considered necessary. This recommendation will require confirmation by Mr John Lawson Archaeological Officer for the City of Edinburgh Archaeology Service (CECAS) on behalf of City of Edinburgh Council.

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




Figure 2: Trench Location Plan






Figure 3 - Topographical survey of development area

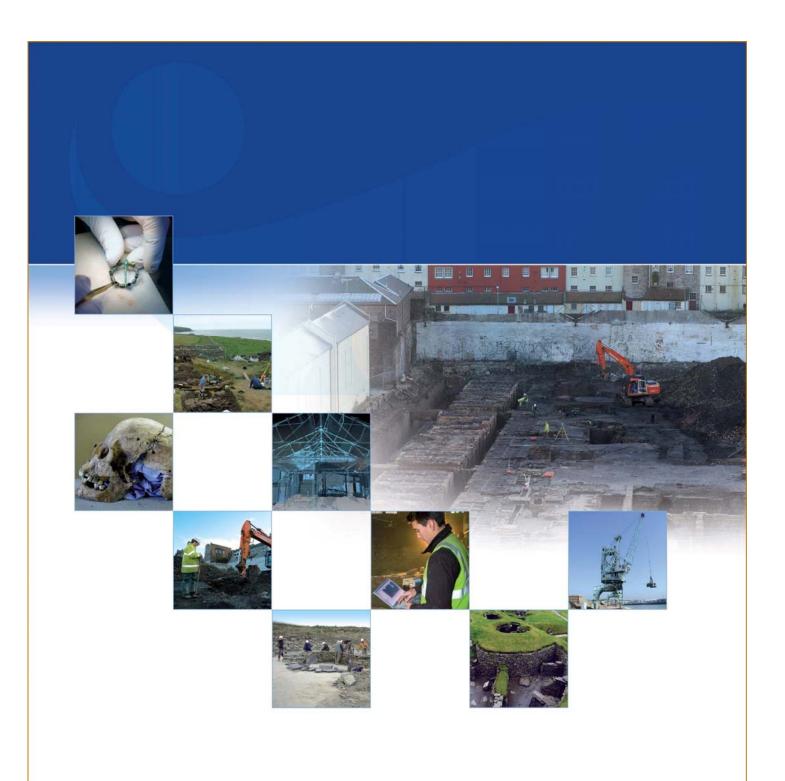
