

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ABSTRACT

This report presents the results of an Archaeological Monitored Topsoil Strip undertaken by AOC Archaeology Group on behalf of Grant and Geoghegan Ltd ahead of the proposed development of a single dwelling at Marchfield (middle plot), Lhanbryde, Moray (NGR: NJ 29220 60524).

A monitored top soil strip of the house plot and surrounding area was undertaken. In total an area of 375m² was stripped. No significant archaeological features or artefacts were encountered during the works.

1 INTRODUCTION

1.1 Background

- 1.1.1 A programme of archaeological works was required by Grant and Geoghegan Ltd, on behalf of their client, at Marchfield, Lhanbryde, Moray ahead of a proposed development (Planning Application No. 15/00548/APP) of a single residential dwelling.
- 1.1.2 The site lies within the local authority of Moray Council and is advised on archaeological matters by Aberdeenshire Council Archaeology Services (ACAS), Aberdeenshire Council. These works are required in accordance with *Scottish Planning Policy* (2010) and *PAN 2/2011 Planning and Archaeology* (2011) and are set out in the following Planning Condition:

"13. The developer shall secure the implementation of an archaeological watching brief, to be carried out by an archaeological organization acceptable to the Aberdeenshire Council Archaeology Service on behalf of the planning authority, during any groundbreaking and development work (including works associated with the foul sewerage system). The retained archeological organization shall be afforded access at all reasonable times and allowed to record and recover items of interest and finds. Terms of reference from the watching brief will be supplied by the Aberdeenshire Council Archaeology Service."

1.1.3 This Planning Condition has been laid out in order to expose, excavate and record any archaeological remains that would be subject to an adverse impact by the development proposals.

1.2 Site Location




Figure 1: Site location plan showing stripped area

1.2.1 The housing plot measures 375m² and is one of three plots that have been granted planning permission for residential development. The plot is located within a wooded area, known as Threapland Wood. The plot lies approximately 2.2 miles to the southeast of Lhanbryde, Elgin, Moray (Figure 1). The site is accessed from a single-track road which forks south off the A96.

1.3 Historical Background

- 1.3.1 There are no archaeological sites or find-spots recorded within the development area itself.
- 1.3.2 **Table 1** lists sites of archaeological significance within a 1km radius of the site, taken from the Moray Sites and Monuments Records, which are still standing or noted from documentary records.

- 1.3.3 The majority of the archaeological sites recorded in the vicinity are assumed to be prehistoric in date. The archaeological sites consist of enclosure cropmarks identified from aerial photographs.
- 1.3.4 To the northwest of the development area, the earliest map depicting Loch Oire is the OS map of 1921-1930. This suggests that the lake is an artificial man-made loch dating to the early 20th century. Prior to this a farm estate labelled Threapland is shown (OS Six Inch 1843-1882). The Inverness to Keith railway line to the south of the development area is also in use by this period.
- 1.3.5 A Rifle Range is known at this location dating back to 1899. Part of the Rifle Range may extend into the development area.




Plate 3 Extract from Ordnance Survey Six Inch Map Series 1888-1913 with the development area red line boundary superimposed.

2 **OBJECTIVES**

- 2.1 The objectives of the archaeological watching brief are:
 - to monitor all ground-breaking works associated within the development as shown on Figure 1;
 - ii) given the discovery of significant archaeological/historic structural building material in quantity that will suffer an adverse impact from the groundworks associated with the development (i.e. where preservation *in situ* is impractical), the recording of all archaeological and structural features by means of a mitigation strategy to be formulated with the Planning Authority as advised by ACAS.

3 METHODOLOGY

3.1 All excavations were undertaken by a 22 tonne 360 tracked excavator equipped with toothless ditching bucket. The excavations were carried out under the constant supervision of an experienced field archaeologist. Due to tree coverage bounding the north, east and south of the site, the access track could not be excavated. All recording was carried out according to AOC Archaeology Groups' standard practices (AOC 2017).

4 **RESULTS**

- 4.1 The watching brief was undertaken on 7th November 2017 in fair weather conditions which provided good archaeological visibility.
- 4.2 An area of 375m² (Figure 1) was stripped of topsoil. This revealed a substratum of mid orange and grey gravelly sand. Topsoil ranged from a depth of 0.05-0.20 m and the area was heavily bioturbated through tree root and animal activity.

4.3 No significant archaeological features or artefactual material were observed.

5 CONCLUSIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

- 5.1 The monitored topsoil strip revealed no significant archaeological features or finds.
- 5.2 No further archaeological works are recommended within the proposed development area. This will need to be confirmed by ACAS on behalf of Moray Council.


