

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Abstract

An archaeological mitigation comprising a strip, map and record exercise was required as a condition of planning consent prior to the construction of a motor retail dealership (Planning Ref 16/03449/FUL).

Features [002], [007] and [009] were linear plough furrows on a NW-SE alignment extending from trench edge. They measured between 0.23 m - 0.39 m wide by 0.14 m - 0.27 m deep and were steep sided and flat based.

Wall [011] of unknown date was uncovered on an E-W alignment. It was of drystone construction comprising rough sandstone chunks. It cut through furrows [002], [007] and [009] and was cut by modern field drains. The wall was badly disturbed by works on site and had been tracked over multiple times by machinery and so was not in a good condition.

No other significant archaeology was uncovered during the works.

1 INTRODUCTION

1.1 **Project Background**

- An archaeological mitigation comprising a strip, map and record exercise was required as a 1.1.1 condition of planning consent prior to the construction of a motor retail dealership (Planning Ref 16/03449/FUL). The site lies within the administrative area of the City of Edinburgh Council (CEC), which is advised on archaeological matters by the City of Edinburgh Council Archaeology Service (CECAS).
- 1.1.2 The programme of archaeological works were in keeping with the policies outlined in Scottish Planning Policy (2010) and PAN 2/2011 Planning and Archaeology (2011) in order to record the extent and significance of any archaeological remains which may have been present within the development area.

1.2 **Site Location**

1.2.1 The development area (NT 31108 71529), covering 0.89ha, is adjacent to Whitehill Road, at the southern edge of an existing retail park, Fort Kinnaird, in the Newcraighall area of Edinburgh. At present the site is an undeveloped Greenfield site with rough pasture, trees and shrubbery. The site is an approximate L-shape bounded on the East side by an existing storage unit and on the West two fast food chains.

1.3 **Archaeological Background**

- 1.3.1 The development site lies within the area of Newcraighall, and recent excavations by GUARD Archaeology have unearthed late/post-medieval mine shafts at Newcraighall village. The area lies within an historic mining area and is of industrial archaeological significance. Mining in the area is thought to date back to the 12th/13th centuries; however evidence is just beginning to be uncovered by these recent excavations.
- 1.3.2 Further archaeological works were carried out in the area in 2008 by CFA Archaeology on a site to the South of this proposed development. An archaeological evaluation was carried out prior to a commercial plot development (Planning Ref 08/00409/OUT). The evaluation uncovered two circular features of c. 3m diameter which are thought to relate to 18th/19th century mining excavations. A further brick feature was identified and was thought to be the remains of a capped mine shaft or adit.
- Following these initial archaeological works by CFA Archaeology; In 2009 AOC Archaeology carried out an excavation of the identified features. They unearthed a stone-built building, a cobbled surface and culverts. Cartographic evidence confirms a structure deriving from a single rectangular building lying to the West of Whitehill Road, with an origin in the late 18th or 19th century. The structures identified appear to relate to a farmstead with well drained land, given the adjacent culverts.
- 1.3.4 To the immediate North of the development area is St Andrew's Episcopalian Church (NT 31072 71629). This was constructed in 1900 and is now B-Listed (LB No. 43571)
- 1.3.5 In light of the yet undisclosed extent of mining and industrial works in the nearby area of Newcraighall this archaeological stripping report has been proposed.

2 **OBJECTIVES**

- 2.1 The objectives of the archaeological works were:
 - i) To monitor ground-breaking works associated with the proposed extension and prevent the destruction of significant archaeological features prior to their recording;
 - to undertake the immediate recording of isolated finds of nationally significant ii) archaeological material that will be disturbed by ground breaking works.

3 **METHODOLOGY**

- 3.1 CECAS have outlined that they required an archaeological strip, map and record exercise associated within the development. All ground-breaking works were therefore monitored by an experienced archaeologist who identified and recorded all archaeological finds and features which were revealed by the development works.
- 3.2 Excavation was undertaken in shallow units/spits and was supervised by an experienced field archaeologist according to AOC Archaeology Group's standard operating procedures.

RESULTS 4

- 4.1 The undertaken area strip contained topsoil a mid brown crumbly topsoil (001) which varied in thickness across site. The natural comprised mixed orange sandy clay with frequent large stone inclusions.
- 4.2 Features [002], [007] and [009] were linear plough furrows on a NW-SE alignment extending from trench edge. They measured between 0.23m - 0.39m wide by 0.14m - 0.27m deep and were steep sided and flat based.
- 4.3 Wall [011] was uncovered on an E-W alignment and was of drystone construction of rough sandstone chunks. It cut through furrows [002], [007] and [009] and is cut by modern field drains. This was badly disturbed by works on site and had been tracked over multiple times by machinery and so was not in a good condition. The 1st and 2nd Edition Ordnance Survey maps do not show any such wall and 19th century mapping shows undeveloped farmland to either side of Whitehill Road. The Church to immediate North of the site is constructed in 1900 and it is possible the wall may relate to the church though the drystone construction would suggest an earlier date.

5 **CONCLUSION AND RECOMMENDATIONS**

- The furrows [002], [007] and [009] are of unknown date but relate to the local farming activity within 5.1 the area. The wall [011] may be a boundary wall for the church located to the north of the site.
- 5.2 significant archaeology was uncovered and no further work is recommended.




Figure 1: Site location plan




Figure 2: Watching brief area


