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#### Summary

AOC Archaeology Group was commissioned to conduct an archaeological evaluation at Crichton, Pathhead, Midlothian ahead of a residential development.

In total four trenches were excavated totaling 70 linear meters. Land improvement measures were found in the form of a single rubble drain.

No significant archaeological finds or features were uncovered. No further work is considered necessary, a decision that will be determined by ELCAS.

#### 1 INTRODUCTION

#### 1.1 Project Background

- 1.1.1 A programme of archaeological works comprising an archaeological evaluation was required by Gray Macpherson Architects LLP on behalf of their client prior to the construction of a proposed residential development at land at Crichton, near Pathhead, Midlothian (Planning Ref: 17/00939/DPP). The need for, and scope of, the archaeological works has been determined by the Midlothian Council who are advised on archaeological matters by Helena Gray of the East Lothian Council Archaeology Service (ELCAS).
- 1.1.2 The programme of archaeological works required was in keeping with best practice outlined in current planning guidelines, Scottish Planning Policy (2014) & Planning and Archaeology 2/2011 (2011), in order to record the extent and significance of any archaeological remains which may have been present within the development area.
- 1.1.3 A Written Scheme of Investigation (AOC 2017) was submitted detailing the requirements of the archaeological works and AOC Archaeology Group's operating procedures and standards.
- 1.1.4 All archaeological works satisfied the codes, standards and guidance set out by the Chartered Institute for Archaeologists (2014).

#### 1.2 Site location




Figure 1: Site location plan

1.2.1 The proposed development covers approximately 750m<sup>2</sup> of land situated off the B6367 (NGR: NT 38556 62052, **Figure 1**). The site comprises of agricultural land used for grazing and is bounded by tree and hedgerow cover (**Plate 1**).

#### 1.3 Archaeological Background

- 1.3.1 No known sites lie within the immediate development area according to Historic Environment Scotland's (HES) records (Canmore, list of designations etc) as also with the Midlothian Historic Environment Record. However several are located close by.
- 1.3.2 The site itself lies within the Borthwick and Crichton Conservation Area. Less than 70m to the south of the development is the Category B-listed buildings 10-14 Crichton Village, Cottages. The interest in these are noted as follows:

'Sir Robert Rowand Anderson designed these properties. He was responsible for the design of the farmhouse at Crichton Mains, along the road, in 1885-7. These cottages were built to house workers from this estate. The farm cottages are grouped to either side of an arched thoroughfare, leading to drying greens at the back. Each cottage had its own small front garden, shared drive and the green to the rear and a small outhouse and toilet. Later alterations to each cottage added a small flat-roofed kitchen/bathroom extension to the rear or side, but now larger replacement additions have led to the rear elevation losing its original simplicity of form and line. Front elevation and gardens now surrounded by a hedge and low rubble wall.'

1.3.3 Further to the southwest is the Scheduled Monument of Play Hill (SM 6231). This is described as a later prehistoric monument surviving as earthworks. To the east lies the

medieval burgh of Crichton (Canmore ID: 53557) and associated 19<sup>th</sup> Century smithy (Canmore ID: 53595).

#### 2 OBJECTIVES

- 2.1 The objectives of the archaeological works are:
  - to determine and assess the character, extent, condition, quality, date and significance of any buried archaeological remains within the proposed development area through evaluation trenching;
  - *ii)* to advise and implement an appropriate form of mitigation, such excavation, post-excavation analyses and publication, given the infeasibility of preserving the archaeological material *in situ*, should significant archaeological remains be encountered.

#### 3 METHODOLOGY

- 3.1 ELCAS requested a 15% evaluation (70 linear meters) of the proposed footprint for the new dwelling and associated buildings (750m²) to be undertaken as per the *WSI* (AOC 2017) as well as satisfying the codes, standards and guidance set out by the ClfA (2014).
- 3.2 The evaluation was conducted using a JCB 3CX utilising a bladed ditching bucket. Trenches were excavated in shallow spits until the natural was reached or the first archaeological horizon, whichever was first. This was undertaken in accordance with AOC Archaeology Group's standard operating procedures as detailed with the *WSI* (AOC 2017).

#### 4 RESULTS

- 4.1 The evaluation was carried out on the 7<sup>th</sup> August 2018 in favourable conditions with archaeological visibility remaining good. The various detailed data gathered from the evaluation is presented as a series of appendices:
  - Appendix 1 Trench Record
  - Appendix 2 Photographic Register;
  - Appendix 3 Context Register

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


Figure 2: Trench location plan

- 4.2 In total four trenches totalling 70 linear meters were excavated across the footprint of the new dwelling (**Figure 2**). Trench 3 was stopped short due to a possible service and a small test pit, Trench 4, excavated further down the evaluation area.
- 4.3 All trenches exhibited a similar soil matrix of reddish-brown sandy loam topsoil (001) ranging in depths of 0.40-0.88m overlaying a natural substratum of yellow-orange sandy clay (002).
- 4.4 Trench 1 contained a B-horizon (003) of mixed mid-brown sandy silt and crushed stone to a depth of 0.6m. This appeared to be acting as a levelling material to fill in a natural hollow.
- 4.5 Trench 3 contained Made Ground (Type 1) (005) possibly forming a path when the field was utilised for grazing horses.
- 4.6 Trenches 2 & 3 contained a rubble drain [003], (**Plate 3**) on a northwest-southeast alignment. Probably forming part of post-medieval land improvement activity on the site.

4.7 No significant archaeological finds or features were uncovered during the works.

#### 5 CONCLUSIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

- 5.1 The evaluation at Crichton, Pathhead, Midlothian has successfully determined that no significant archaeological finds or features are to be disturbed by the development.
- 5.2 No further works are considered necessary, this decision shall be determined by Helena Gray of ELCAS acting on behalf of Midlothian Council.


