

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Abstract

This report represents the results of an archaeological watching brief undertaken by AOC Archaeology Group at Old Brae, Lesmahagow, South Lanarkshire (centred NGR: NS 8115 3975). The watching brief monitored the excavation of seven foundation trenches and two service trenches for the construction of a new house on a vacant plot fronting New Trows Road.

No archaeologically significant features or finds of were unearthed.

1 INTRODUCTION

1.1 Project Background

- 1.1.1 An archaeological watching brief was undertaken by AOC Archaeology on ground breaking works associated with the construction of a single house development at Old Brae, Lesmahagow, South Lanarkshire (NGR; NS 8115 3975). The watching brief was undertaken at the behest of Mr Gary Miller. The work was required by South Lanarkshire Council as advised by the West of Scotland Archaeology Service Archaeology (WoSAS).
- 1.1.2 The work was undertaken in accordance with *Scottish Planning Policy* (SG 2008) and *Planning Advice Note 42* (SOEnd 1994) in order to determine the nature, extent, condition, date and significance of any archaeological remains within the proposed development area.
- 1.1.3 No archaeologically significant features or finds were identified.

1.2 Location

1.2.1 The proposed development area is centred at NGR: NS 8115 3975 (Figure 1). The development area lies on a slope (181.0 m OD) overlooking the established centre of Lesmahagow with New Trows Road forming the northern boundary of the site with Old Brae Road to the north west. Existing properties mark the eastern and western boundaries to the site with the southern portion of the site overlooking Rookwood Walk, an area of green space on the north banks of the River Nethan. The site presently consisted of waste ground.

1.3 Archaeological Background

1.3.1 The village derives its name from the Tironensian priory. This was founded around 1140-1144 AD, by David I as an adjunct of Kelso Priory which was dedicated to St Mahego, this later developed into Lesmahagow. The priory survived until the reformation with many of the priory buildings destroyed during the following 17th century (Smith, R 2001, 597). Roy's map of 1750 shows Lesmahagow as a substantial village. The 19th century saw the area subject to industrialisation with coal mining, railways and mills.

2 OBJECTIVES

- 2.1 The objectives of the watching brief were:
 - to determine the character, extent, condition, quality, date and significance of any buried archaeological remains within the proposed development area;
 - ii) to advise and implement an appropriate form of archaeological mitigation, such as excavation, post-excavation analyses and publication, should significant archaeological remains be encountered that cannot be preserved *in situ*.

3 METHODOLOGY

3.1 All ground breaking works associated with the development were monitored by an experienced field archaeologist. The ground-breaking was undertaken with a JCB excavator equipped with a toothless

ditching bucket. The Watching Brief was stopped when the required formation levels or clean natural subsoil were observed.

4 RESULTS

4.1 Introduction


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


Figure 2: Plan of foundations uncovered during watching brief

4.1.1 The archaeological watching brief was undertaken on 2nd August 2010. The weather was overcast with rain showers, nevertheless archaeological visibility was good. The ground-works consisted of seven foundation trenches forming the foot-print of the building and two associated service trenches (Figure 2).

4.2 Foundation Trenches

4.2.1 Seven foundation trenches were excavated within a plot approximately 10.0 m by 20.0 m in size. The trenches reached a maximum depth of 1.20 m and were 0.60 m in width. Numerous services relating to the building previously situated on the site were revealed including clay drains and cables. Up to 0.90 m of demolition material and made ground was observed in Trenches F1 to F3 situated closest to the New Trows Road frontage. This material directly overlay a subsoil of orange sandy clay. Trenches F4 to F7 however revealed only 0.10 m of garden soil directly overlying the sub-soil. It would appear that the area under the previous building had been truncated, then in-filled and levelled off.

4.3 Service Trenches

4.3.1 Two service trenches were also excavated these measured 12.0 m by 0.60 m and 4.0 m by 0.60 m respectively (Figure 2). Both of these trenches were connected with an existing man-hole. The trench running south from New Trows Road contained an existing service. The trenches revealed 0.60 m of made ground directly overlying the natural subsoil. Several white ceramic sherds of 19th / 20th century date were noted.

5 CONCLUSION

5.1 No archaeologically significant features or finds were revealed during the Watching Brief. No further archaeological works are considered necessary. This recommendation will require confirmation by WoSAS acting on behalf of South Lanarkshire Council.


