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Abstract

This report represents the results of archaeological evaluation undertaken by AOC Archaeology Group across two existing parks which are being redeveloped and improved, at Piershill Square East and West, Edinburgh.

The archaeological works comprised the excavation of two 15 m long trenches positioned in each of the new Plaza areas and then by a further six 2-3 m long trenches/test-pits situated across the site.

Generally, the site was archaeologically sterile, with only modern features such as services being identified. However, a series of features comprising a cobble surface and associated kerb and red brick setting were identified in Piershill Square East. The features represent the fragmentary remains of the 18th century Piershill Barracks which formerly occupied the area.

No other significant features were identified and no further works are considered necessary.

NON TECHNICAL SUMMARY

- AOC Archaeology Group was commissioned by Edinburgh City Council to address the potential negative archaeological impact of proposed development works at Piershill Square East and West, Edinburgh (Figure 1). The proposed development area comprises two separate land parcels, Piershill Square East (NGR: NT 2847 7421) and Piershill Square West (NGR: 2834 7421). The ground to be impacted upon covers two areas of approximately 3120 m² each.
- 1.1.2 The proposed development lies within the administrative area of the City of Edinburgh Council, which is advised on archaeological matters by the City of Edinburgh Council Archaeology Service (CECAS). CECAS recommended a programme of archaeological works in accordance with Scottish Planning Policy (Scottish Government February 2010) and Planning Advice Note 42 (SOEnd 1994) in determining the nature, extent, condition, date and significance of any archaeological remains within the proposed development area.
- 1.1.3 A Written Scheme of Investigation (AOC 2010) was agreed with CECAS in advance of the evaluation being undertaken. The evaluation was designed around the excavation of trenching up to a maximum of 100 m² split proportionally between the two areas. This trenching consisted of two 15 m long trenches positioned in each of the new Plaza areas and then by a further six 2-3 m long trenches/test-pits situated across the site to give a good geographical distribution.
- 1.1.4 The only archaeological find comprised an isolated patch of cobbles. This cobble surface forms the remnants of one of the hospital buildings or surfaces identified on the 1st Edition OS Map.

2. INTRODUCTION

2.1 Project Background and Location

2.1.1 AOC Archaeology Group was commissioned by Edinburgh City Council to address the potential negative archaeological impact of proposed development works at Piershill Square East and West, Edinburgh (Figure 1). The proposed development area comprises two separate land parcels, Piershill Square East (NGR: NT 2847 7421) and Piershill Square West (NGR: 2834 7421). The ground to be impacted upon covers two areas of approximately 3120 m² each. The site is currently parkland, and is covered in both grass and concrete. Both land parcels are enclosed by the surrounding squares of Piershill Square East and West respectively, which are contemporary post-Second World War housing developments.

2.2 Archaeological Background

2.2.1 The two housing developments of Piershill West and East (respectively NMRS: NT27SE4254 and NT27SE4256) were built across the former location of the Piershill Cavalry Barracks (NMRS: NT27SE4220) between 1937 and 1938. Built in 1794, the

barracks were home to various regiments including the 6th Inniskillin Dragoon Guards and the 17th Lancers. The proposed development lies across the former parade ground of the barracks (Plates 1 and 2).

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


Plate 2: Detail of Piershill Cavalry Barracks, 1st Edition OS Map 1885

OBJECTIVES OF THE INVESTIGATION 3.

- 3.1 The objectives of the archaeological works were:
 - i) to determine the character, extent, condition, quality, date and significance of any buried archaeological remains within the proposed development area;

ii) to advise and implement an appropriate form of archaeological mitigation, such as excavation, post-excavation analyses and publication, should significant archaeological remains be encountered that cannot be preserved *in situ*.

4. METHOD

4.1 All ground reduction was completed by a 360 tracked excavator using a 2 m wide ditching bucket under archaeological supervision. The trench details are summarised in Appendix 1. Machine excavation was conducted in shallow units/spits through topsoil to the upper surface of the underlying geological deposits. The evaluation trial trenching was undertaken according to AOC Archaeology Group's standard operating procedures as detailed within the Written Scheme of Investigation (AOC 2010).

5. RESULTS

5.1 Piershill Square East and West are currently being used as parkland and as such are covered by a combination of grass, topsoil, tarmac and gravel, between 0.20 m and 0.70 m in depth. The natural subsoil comprised a combination of sands, silts and gravel.

5.2 The site was, in the main, archaeologically sterile; the entirety of both areas having been levelled on at least one occasion. Generally no evidence was identified for structures or the parade ground identified on the 1st Edition OS Map (Plate 1) or surviving photographs (Plate 2). Although evidence of modern services were identified in Trenches 8 and 9, no other features such as robber trenches or even building debris was identified within the make up of Trenches 1-6 and 8-10. The evidence suggests that once the barracks were decommissioned the entire area was demolished and either removed or recycled and used in the surrounding housing estate.

- 5.3 The exception to the evaluation was Trench 7, in Piershill Square East, in which feature, [701], comprising a cobble surface forming the floor of a structure on the 1st Edition OS Map (Plate 1) was identified. The surface was composed of a layer of water rounded cobbles [702], abutted to the east by a linear cobble edge [703] and to the north by a red brick setting [704]. The entire structure measured 3.60 m east to west by 5.40 m north to south and was built directly on to the underlying natural sand [705]. The cobble kerb [703] which demarcated the eastern edge of the structure measured 3.80 m in length by 0.25 m in width. A rectangular setting [704], constructed from hand made red bricks, measured 1.80 m east to west by 0.80 m north to south (where it survived), was built in to the coble surface [702]. A thin layer of mortar [706] was identified in the north-east corner of the structure [701] and may represent the surviving element of a wall.
- 5.4 Cartographic analysis has identified feature [701] on the 1st Edition OS Map (Figure 4). Unfortunately, the surviving remains are not complete enough to suggest a conclusive function and the map does not offer detailed description. However, the surface clearly represents either the internal floor of a building or an area of hard standing, perhaps to allow vehicular access by horse and cart.

- 5.5 The archaeological remains have been covered in terram, and reburied, thereby preserving the structure in situ, as requested by Mr John Lawson, CECAS.
- 5.6 No other significant archaeological remains or artefacts were identified during the work.

6. CONCLUSION

- 6.1 A cobble and red brick built structure [701] was identified and subsequently recorded during the archaeological evaluation completed at Piershill Square East and West. The structure relates to the 18th century Piershill Barracks which occupied the site until its demolition in the 1930s. That more of the barracks hasn't survived in perhaps unsurprising considering the quality of the cut stonework used. Local hearsay suggests that all of the stone was recycled and re-sued when the surrounding Piershill Square East and West was built immediately following the demolition of the barracks.
- 6.2 Feature [701] was fully recorded on the instructions of Mr John Lawson of CECAS, and was covered in terram and left in situ.

7. RECOMMENDATIONS


7.1 No further archaeological works are considered necessary. This recommendation will require confirmation by CECAS on behalf of the City of Edinburgh Council.






Figure 3: Plan of excavated features






Figure 4: 1st Edition OS Map extract with identified building highlighted


