
Summary

Erection of a new dwelling and associated garaging (following demolition of existing buildings) in the grounds of Chestnut Farm, The Green, Thrandeston (TM 1141 7658, TDE 020), required a programme of archaeological monitoring to be undertaken. The development lies within an area of medieval settlement, to the west of the medieval church (TDE 009) and adjacent to the medieval green. The new house required footings that were inspected after excavation but no archaeological finds or features Service were revealed during the monitoring

Introduction

A condition of the planning consent for the construction of a new dwelling and associated garaging, following the demolition of existing buildings, in the grounds of Chestnut Farm, The Green, Thrandeston, required a programme of archaeological monitoring to be undertaken. The development required footings that were machine excavated. The site is within an area of medieval settlement, to the west of the medieval church (TDE 009) and adjacent to the medieval green. Durrants Charted Surveyors commissioned the project.

A Brief and Specification for the archaeological work (Appendix 1) was produced by Jess Tipper of the Conservation Team, Suffolk County Council Archaeology Service (SCCAS), who requested a monitoring visit after the excavation of the footings. This was to observe the trenches and the upcast soil to determine the presence, if any, of archaeological evidence in this area.




Figure 2: Approximate location of footings

Results

The footings were machine excavated with a machine using a toothed bucket. Due to wet ground conditions, deep footings and heavy clay soil, they were relatively unstable and so as a consequence, visibility was quite poor during the archaeological monitoring. They were observed during and after excavation and the upcast soil was retained on site for inspection.

The footings were excavated to a depth of between 1.8m and 2m, into topsoil Clare Good Suffolk County Council Archae
