An Archaeological Fieldwalking Survey for Land at Markfield Road, Ratby, Leicestershire (NGR: SK 506 064)

Summary

An archaeological fieldwalking survey was carried out by the University of Leicester Archaeological Services (ULAS) for land at Markfield Road, Ratby, Leicestershire (SK 506 064). The survey was commissioned by Cawrey Ltd. in advance of the proposed development of the land for new housing.

Ground conditions were at the limits of suitability for fieldwalking and the crop obscured the ground surface in some parts of the fields. The fieldwalking survey recovered two medieval pottery sherds and a low level scatter of post-medieval pottery, in addition to numerous modern sherds, indicative of manuring practices in the modern period. The site archive will be held by Leicestershire Museums Service under the Accession no: X.A81.2014.

Introduction

In accordance with National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF), Section 12 (Conserving and Enhancing the Historic Environment), this report presents the results of an archaeological fieldwalking survey carried out by University of Leicester Archaeological Services (ULAS) at Markfield Road, Ratby, Leicestershire (NGR SK 506 064). The work was undertaken as part of an archaeological impact assessment in advance of proposed development of the site.

Site Description, Topography and Geology

The British Geological Survey website indicates that the underlying geology of the site is likely to be Edwalton Member Mudstone overlain by Thrussington Member diamicton.




Figure 1: Site Location. Reproduced from Explorer® 1:25 000 scale (Sheet No.246: Loughborough, Melton Mowbray & Syston) by permission of Ordnance Survey® on behalf of The Controller of Her Majesty's Stationery Office. © Crown copyright 2000 All rights reserved. Licence number AL 100029495.

Archaeological Background

The following information is taken from an archaeological desk-based assessment carried out in 2005 (George 2005), which concluded that the proposed development area is located partly within the boundaries of the medieval village core of Ratby. In addition, finds and sites of a medieval date have been located in the vicinity and it is possible that finds of a similar date may be located within the area of proposed residential development. Bury Camp Iron Age hillfort is also located nearby, as are various cropmarks and finds of Mesolithic-Neolithic flint artefacts (See Appendix 2).

In addition, various sites indicative of Roman occupation have been identified in the area and it is possible that similar sites may be found. Map evidence indicates that the site has not previously been substantially built-on. The proposed development area is seen to have moderate to high potential for containing archaeological remains of a

prehistoric, Roman and medieval date and lower potential for remains of intervening periods.

An updated Historic Environment Record (HER) search is included as Appendix 2. The projected line of the Colchester to Chester Roman road (Via Devana) suggest it may cross the application area (MLE4345) although previous work has failed to verify this (e.g Higgins 2000; Jones 2009; Coward 2011). During 2004/5 a number of metal finds dating from the late Anglo-Saxon period to the post-medieval period were recovered from the application area including a Saxon bridle fitting, medieval spindle whorl, three medieval coins, a medieval/post-medieval mount, a post-medieval coin and a post-medieval powder flask nozzle (MLE21246). Half a kilometre to the east, an enclosure and evidence of occupation of Roman date has been located through geophysical survey, trial trench evaluation and subsequent strip, map, and sample excavation (Butler 2009; Jones 2009; Coward 2011).

A geophysical survey of the application area was carried out in June 2014 (Prestidge 2014). This showed very few anomalies of archaeological origin. Some ridge and furrow field systems aligned north-east to south west were identified together with a weak anomaly of possible archaeological origin to the north-west. No evidence of a Roman road or occupation was suggested from the survey.




Figure 2: Plan of proposed development area outlined in red. Provided by Client. Scale unknown.

Aims and Methods

The overall aim of the fieldwalking survey was to gather some information to establish the potential extent, condition, character and date (as far as circumstances

permit) of any archaeological features and deposits within the area to target for further archaeological evaluation.

Fieldwalking is a technique which can be used on arable fields in order to sample artefacts found within the ploughsoil, which may indicate the presence of buried archaeological features or previous land-use. It is preferably undertaken following ploughing and subsequent weathering of the ploughsoil. However, a field sown with crop can be walked until the crop obscures visibility or would be damaged. Visibility during the survey was fairly poor due to the advanced stage of the crop (see Figure 3 - Figure 7). The weather was mostly dry, with broken cloud cover. All archaeological work adhered to the Institute for Archaeologist's (IfA) *Code of Conduct* and *Standard and Guidance for Archaeological Evaluations*.

Artefacts were collected and bagged along 10m transects. Some categories of (modern) finds were not collected; these included plastic, glass, finds such as bone and shell that are difficult to date and large quantities of ceramic building material (CBM); in the case of CBM a sample of material was collected and retained. The locations of the finds were plotted using hand held GPS loggers (Garmin Etrex 10, satellite accuracy c.3m). Assuming a cone of vision of 2 metres a 20% sample of the field's surface was examined. The artefact locations were logged manually on site, and plots produced using Garmin Base Camp, GPS Utility, and ArcGIS.


Figure 5: The survey area looking south-west (field 3).

Results

The survey area was walked via transects orientated north-east to south-west at 10m intervals. The visibility of the ground surface varied due to the advanced state of the crop. Despite this, finds were collected from most parts of the survey area with a greater quantity retrieved from the south and south-eastern areas. Although two Roman sites are known from the vicinity, no pre-medieval material was located and only two sherds of medieval pottery were recovered, along with 11 sherds of early post-medieval pottery (see Appendix 1 for details).

The remaining 173 finds comprised port-medieval and modern ceramic material, which are all highly likely to have resulted from manuring spreads being added to the fields from the post-medieval period onwards.

Conclusion

On the basis of the geophysical and fieldwalking surveys there is relatively low potential for archaeological deposits to be present within the application area.

Appendix 1: The Pottery and Miscellaneous Finds

Deborah Sawday

Approximately 190 finds were recorded during the field walking; the results are listed below (Table 1).

Post medieval or modern pottery and ceramic building material made up the bulk of the finds. These and two sherds of medieval pottery, one in Potters Marston ware, dating from the 13th or 14th centuries, and a fragment of Medieval Sandy ware, fabric MS3, probably dating from c.1300 to c.1450 were catalogued with reference to the to the guidelines set out by the Medieval Pottery Research Group, (MPRG 1998; MPRG 2001) and the ULAS fabric series (Sawday 1989; Davies and Sawday 2004; Sawday 2009). Post-medieval or modern clay tobacco pipe stems were also present.




Figure 9. HER records for the vicinity of the application area.
