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# A Photographic Survey of the HORSA hut at Westfield Junior School, Westfield Road, Hinckley, Leicestershire

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## Summary

An photographic survey (English Heritage Level 2) was carried out on the 11th of September 2014 of the HORSA hut at Westfield Junior School, Westfield Road, Hinckley, Leicestershire. The hut is used as the school canteen and kitchen and was constructed circa 1947, as part of the HORSA programme (Hutting Operation for the Raising of the School Leaving Age. The building is due for demolition, as part of the upgrading of the school kitchen. The archive will be deposited with Leicestershire County Council Museums Service under the accession number X.A123.2014.

## **Background**

This document presents the results of a photographic survey of the HORSA hut at Westfield Junior School, Westfield Road, Hinckley, Leicestershire SP 41970 93244.




Figure 1. Site Location in Hinckley

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The work was carried out in order to meet the requirements of the brief for an historic building photographic survey, issued by the Senior Planning Archaeologist at Leicestershire County Council, in advance of the redevelopment of the site.

The kitchen and dining block at Westfield Junior School was constructed *circa* 1947, as part of the national HORSA programme (Hutting Operation for the Raising of the School Leaving Age), which was implemented in response to the 1944 Education Act (the Butler Act). These prefabricated buildings were designed as a temporary solution to a sudden increase in demand for school accommodation during the postwar population boom, when the school leaving age was raised to 15.




Figure 2. Plan of Westfield School, with HORSA hut highlighted (supplied by client; not to scale). A second HORSA Hut not part of the application area is arrowed (H)

### Methodology

The photographic record followed the photographic section of Level 2 of English Heritage's *Understanding Historic Buildings* (2006). It included:

- Item 1: General view or views of the exterior of the building.
- Item 2: The overall appearance of principal rooms and circulation areas.
- Item 3: Detailed coverage of the building's exterior appearance.
- Item 4: Any external detail, structural or decorative, which is relevant to the building's design, development and use and which does not show adequately on general photographs.
- Item 5: The building's relationship to its setting, to other buildings, or to a significant viewpoint.

Item 6: Internal detail, structural and decorative, which is relevant to the building's design, development and use, and which does not show adequately on general photographs.

A summary of the building's type or purpose, historically and at present, its materials and possible date (s).

All work followed the Institute for Archaeologists (IfA) Code of Conduct (rev. 2010) and adhered to their Standard and Guidance for Archaeological Investigation and Recording of Standing buildings or Structures (2008). In addition, Leicestershire County Council's Guidelines and Procedures for Archaeological Work in Leicestershire was adhered to.

The buildings were photographed using a Pentax K-7 digital camera and Pentax P30 35mm film camera. The film used was Ilford HP5 rated at 400asa. Digital images were taken in proprietary RAW format and converted into TIFFs for the archive.

A floor plan was supplied by the school administrator and has been used to locate the archived photographs. Selected photographs from the archive have been reproduced below in order to illustrate the report.

#### Results

The photographic survey was carried out on the 11th of September 2014 by Sophie Clarke of University of Leicester Archaeological Services (ULAS), following procedure defined by English Heritage guidelines (2006) 'Understanding Historic Buildings: a guide to good recording practice'.

The HORSA block consists of a prefabricated H-plan structure, of pre-cast concrete set into a steel frame, with asbestos panelled roof and Crittal-style, steel framed windows. At the time of the site visit, the buildings were in use as the school kitchens and dining room, with a small area recently partitioned off for use as a music room.




Figure 3. Location of figures 4-14 on ground floor plan of Westfield junior School (plan supplied by school; scale approximate).
