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Summary

A photographic historic building survey of a house and outbuildings at The Grove, 58 Main Street, Swannington, Leicestershire was undertaken by the University of Leicester Archaeological Services (ULAS) on the 16th of November 2018. The survey studied a Grade II listed domestic house with associated outbuildings. The house has 17th century, or earlier, origins but has been extensively altered over the years.

Introduction

In accordance with National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) Section 16 *Conserving and Enhancing the Historic Environment* this document forms the report for a photographic historic building recording at The Grove, 58 Main Street, Swannington, Coalville, Leicestershire, NGR SK 41638 16466.

The report was commissioned by Mr and Mrs Goodman who are the owners of The Grove in advance of a proposed refurbishment and extension of the house. Under planning application number 18/01120/FUL and listed building consent 18/01121/LBC permission has been granted to construct a single storey extension to the rear of the house, partially demolish and convert outbuildings and carry out alterations and renovations inside the house. No structural alterations will be made to the front of the house facing onto Main Street.

Due to the historic nature of the Grade II listed house a request was made by the Senior Planning Archaeologist, Leicestershire County Council, as advisor to North West Leicestershire District Council for a programme of historic building recording to take place prior to any demolition or renovation work taking place.

Background

The village of Swannington lies in north-west Leicestershire approximately 2km to the north-west of Coalville (Fig. 1). Number 58, also known as The Grove, is located on the eastern side of Main Street towards the northern end of the village. The site is nearly opposite the village hall (Fig. 2).

The main house faces to the north-west across Main Street and has at least two different phases and rooflines. The frontage of both phases is coated in render and the roofs both have tiles. A covered gateway with a first floor room above it leads to the large rear garden. The rear, south-east facing, elevation of the house has a number of additions extending out from the main body of the house. The proposed new single-storey extension will be added between the two larger existing extensions.

The outhouses are brick-built and sit at the northern corner of the property away from the house. A large tree, recently felled, has caused some damage to the buildings. The lowest roofed building butts against the taller building and contains remnants of a loose box. The taller building has been crudely extended to create a longer building.

House, c17 or earlier, extensively altered at successive later dates, and with facade of c1900. Roughcast. Main block of 2 bays with central tall window lighting stairs, entrance door to right with wooden bracketed porch. 2 upper windows, sashes, lower a 3-light wood mullion & transom. To right a lower section with 4 centred arched doorway & mullion & transom window, both with hoodmoulds. Interior has timber roof with 3 main trusses visible, one with curved principal & collar. South wall of main block timbered in panels with brick infill. Large beam with roll moulded chamfer in kitchen. Drawing room with ornate plaster ceiling of c1820 and tracery panelled window shutters.

Main entrance hall has grained wood staircase & panelled archway to rear of house. Good internal 6 panel doors. Stair window double glazed with sinuous art-nouveau style pattern of brass strips and glass beads between the panes. Dining room has large inglenook with grained wood panelling & integral benches of c1900. Also 2 panels now shutters, moulded wood, Italian, 1820's - 40's reputed to be part of a set illustrating the 4 seasons, originally in Coleorton Hall.

The first edition of the Ordnance Survey map published in 1887 shows the footprint of the main house very much as is exists at present. A longer range of buildings extends beyond the present south-western range of buildings on this map and the outbuildings appear to be much longer and extend further south.

Objectives

The objectives for the photographic survey were set out in the ULAS Written Scheme of Investigation for a Photographic Historic Building Survey at The Grove, 58 Main Street, Swannington, Coalville, Leicestershire. Within the stated project objectives, the principal aim of the survey was to provide a photographic record of the affected historic building prior to the commencement of any redevelopment work.

Methodology

The methodology and recording system employed for the photographic survey is set out in the Written Scheme of Investigation for a Photographic Historic Building Survey at The Grove, 58 Main Street, Swannington, Coalville, Leicestershire (the WSI) produced for this site which specified the aims and objectives and methodology for the work.

The level of Historic Building Photographic Survey for this project was been specified by the Planning Archaeologist for Leicestershire County Council. A photographic historic building survey is similar in detail to a Level 2 survey. Level 2 historic building surveys are defined in the Historic England guidance document – Understanding Historic Buildings: A guide to good recording practice (2016).

All work followed the Chartered Institute for Archaeologists (CIfA) Code of Conduct (2014).

Results

At the time of the survey (16.11.2018) the house had been unoccupied for a short while but was still in a reasonably good state of repair with little evidence of water ingress or decay. The outbuildings had been neglected for a while and have been badly affected by a large mature tree which had grown against one corner. This has been removed but it seems likely that the roots will have caused significant damage to the foundations.

The two-storied main house fronts onto Main Street which is at a slightly higher level than the ground floor. To the rear of the house the large garden drops away to the southeast. The outbuildings occupy the north-west corner of a small walled area in the north-west of the site.

The photographs shown in this section of the report are a sample of the images taken during the site visit. All 104 photographs and their locations are shown below in Appendices 1 and 2.




Figure 3 First floor plan Plan drawn by David Granger Ltd




Figure 4 First floor plan and elevations Plan drawn by David Granger Ltd




Figure 5 Outbuildings plans and elevations




Figure 32 Main hall and stairs Looking east. 1m scale

The Grove clearly consists of a number of different elements with what seems likely to be the earliest element at the southern end of the range. The two sets of stairs at this end of the range and the lack of inter-connectivity at first floor level may suggest that this element originally consisted of two separate dwellings within the same building. The later part of the range, to the north, has undergone a number of additions and modifications throughout its life.


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




