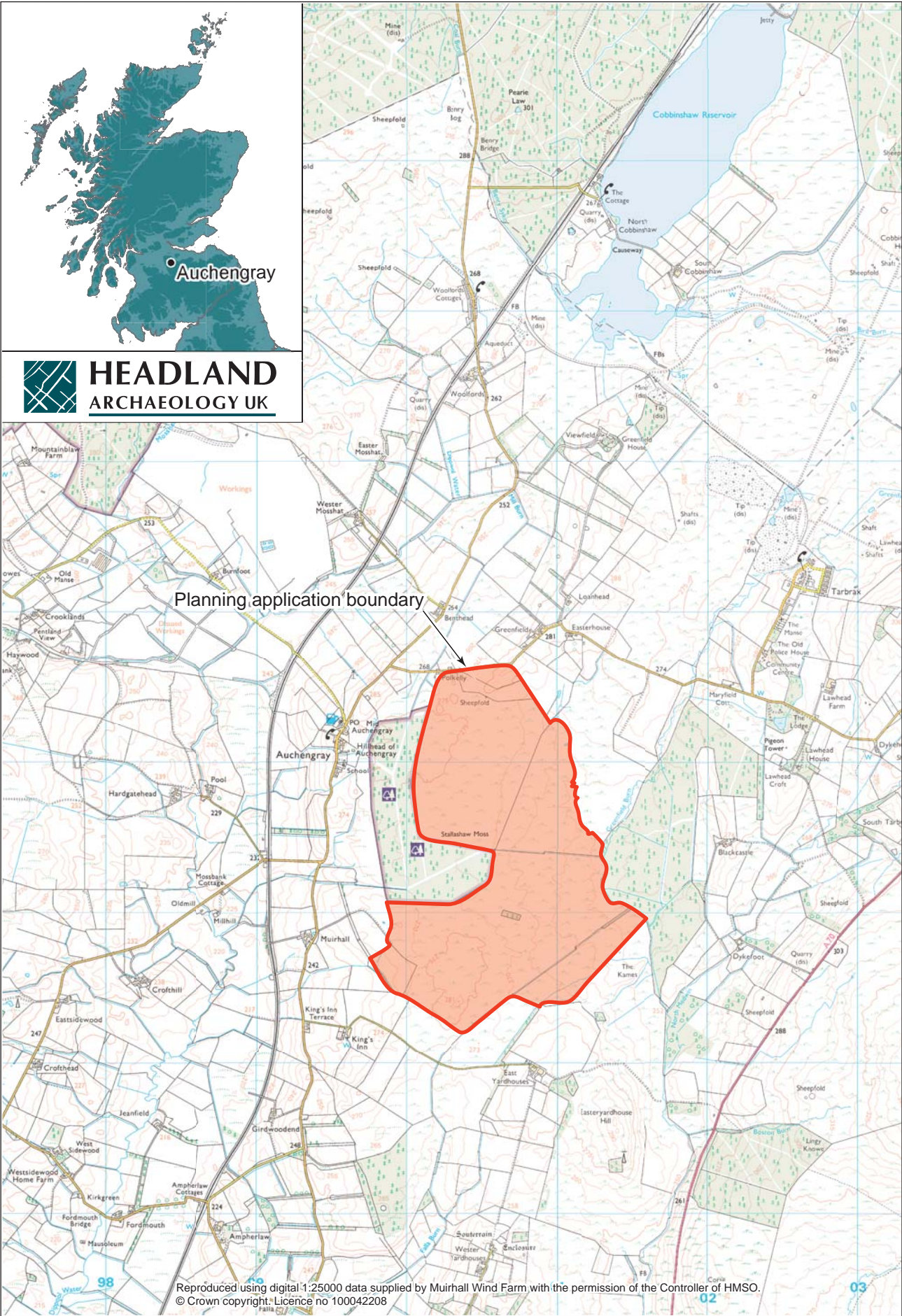

# Muirhall Wind Farm

## Desk Based Assessment

by Kate Bain

*A desk-based assessment and walkover survey were undertaken at the Muirhall Wind Farm, South Lanarkshire in advance of the erection of six new wind turbines and associated infrastructure. The development area is located in an extensive upland bog environment within which are surviving examples of rig and furrow cultivation, suggesting that the area has not been subject to excessive recent development. Other evidence of human activity in the immediate area of the turbine sites appears to be exclusively associated with attempts to drain or improve the land for grazing livestock. Potential for subsurface archaeology was identified as possible pre-historic activity pre-dating the incursion of the blanket bog which characterises the area.*

## INTRODUCTION

Headland Archaeology undertook an archaeological desk-based assessment of land at Muirhall Wind Farm, South Lanarkshire (Illus 1) on behalf of Arcus Consulting Ltd for Muirhall Windfarm Ltd. The development will comprise the erection of six new wind turbines and associated infrastructure including the creation of access tracks and a construction compound. The work was commissioned in response to a planning condition (Condition 65) outlined as follows;

*'No development shall take place within the application site, as outline in red on figure 4.1 [Site Construction Plan] until the developer has secured the implementation of a programme of archaeology survey works in accordance with a written scheme of investigation which has been submitted by the developer, agreed by the West of Scotland Archaeology Service, and approved by the Council. Thereafter the developer shall ensure that the programme of archaeological survey works is fully implemented and that all recording and recovery of archaeological resources within the application site is undertaken to the reasonable satisfaction of the Council in agreement with the West of Scotland Archaeology Service.'*

## SITE DESCRIPTION

The proposed development area comprises 242 ha<sup>2</sup> (centred on NT00519 53618) of upland bog to the east of the village of Auchengray (Illus 1). Extensive areas of late 20<sup>th</sup> century forestry plantation flank the application boundary to the east and west with the remainder of the site being given over to a combination of improved grazing and bog habitat. The surrounding area, particularly to the north and west, is heavily quarried and mined for both coal and oil, the massive bing of the former Tarbrax shale oil works being the dominating feature of the north-western horizon.

## METHODOLOGY

The study was intended to provide an assessment of all relevant archaeological and historic records within the site and a study area based on a radius of roughly 3km from the site (Illus 2). Records up to 5km from the site were studied to allow for significant sites just outside the 3km boundary. The objective was to determine the likely presence or absence of known and unknown sites within the development area. It was designed to provide a summary assessment of the implications for the development site, not as an exhaustive historical discussion.

The following sources were consulted:

- National Monuments Record of Scotland (NMRS);
- Historic Scotland Schedule of Ancient Monuments and List of Listed Buildings;
- maps held by National Library of Scotland;
- plans held by National Archives of Scotland; and
- other readily accessible published sources.

A walkover survey was also carried out in order to assess the character of the site, its current land use and condition and confirm the accuracy of information collected by documentary research. Further to this, any sites not previously noted would be identified and recorded.

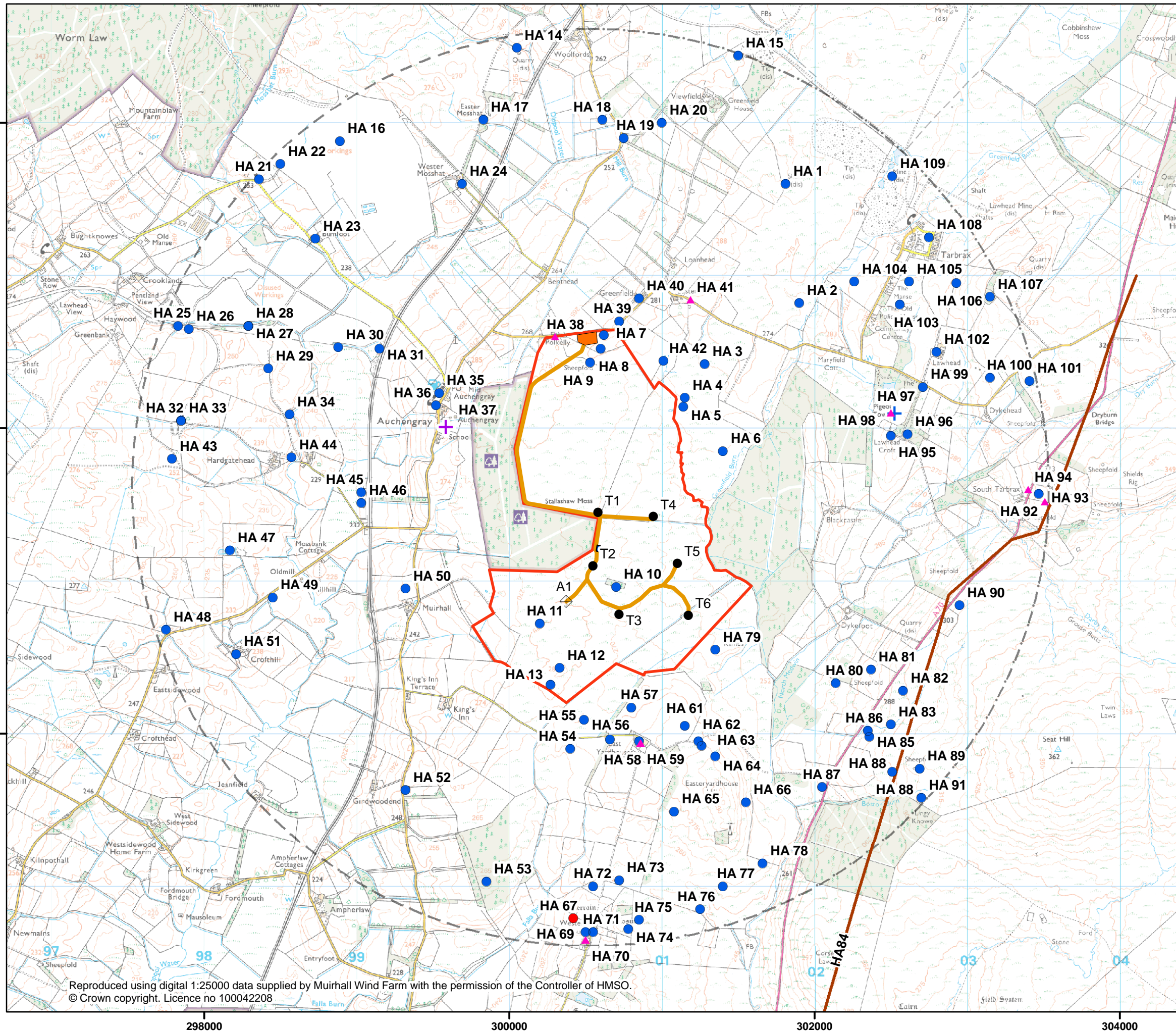
## RESULTS

Sites are referred to by Headland Archaeology (HA) numbers. A gazetteer is appended.

### Previously recorded sites

There are no Scheduled Ancient Monuments within the proposed development area. Nor are there any listed buildings. The known sites within the planning application boundary are primarily related to the improvement, drainage and agricultural management of Stallashaw Moss in which the site is located. Numerous examples of upstanding rig and

furrow cultivation (HA1, HA2, HA4, HA6, HA11, and HA13) have been identified throughout the development area and beyond. To the north-east of the proposed turbine locations, to the south of the road, a series of enclosures are recorded. The first of these (HA4) is rectilinear in plan and is reported to overlie an area of rig and furrow, this being the case, the enclosure is almost certainly part of the post-medieval agricultural landscape. Two further enclosures (HA3) are recorded just to the north-east of this feature. Each consists of a low, circular grass bank, situated on a grassy knoll. Whilst these features potentially relate to early settlement activity, it seems more likely that they represent livestock shelters occupying relatively dry locations in an otherwise waterlogged environment. A further roughly rectilinear enclosure (HA10), partially within a small stand of trees, was thought to have a similar purpose.

A small number of disused quarry pits (HA5, HA8 & HA12) are also distributed across the development area although in a much lesser concentration than are seen across the wider landscape. By far the largest relic of mining and quarrying in the vicinity of the development area is the massive bing of the former Tarbrax shale oil works (HA 109). The bing and other accompanying elements of the Tarbrax works are located to the north, outside the planning application boundary.

## Cartographic Evidence

The study area is shown on Roy's military survey map (Roy 1747-55, lowland region Illus3) and is depicted as an area of bog or marsh, along the peripheries of which are areas of cultivation.

A similar picture is presented by the 1st edition Ordnance Survey mapping of the area (1859) (Illus 4) which also shows a large expanse of

marsh or bog, entitled Stallashaw Moss, covering the whole of the development area. The first edition map also depicts a significant number of sites marked as coal pits in the surrounding area and to the west of the site, the Caledonian Railway.

The second edition Ordnance Survey (1899) also shows very little development in the vicinity of the site. Although an extension of the railway to Tarbrax had been constructed to the north of the site, marking the initial establishment of what would become the Tarbrax shale oil works.

Little change is observable within the development area on the site until the Ordnance Survey map of 1978 when two large areas of forestry have appeared flanking the east and west of the planning application area.

## Historical and Archaeological Background

### *Prehistoric and Roman*

There is no conclusive evidence for prehistoric land use in the immediate landscape of the site. There is however evidence of early prehistoric activity in the vicinity, primarily in the form of chance finds of flint artefacts. Whilst early prehistoric settlement of upland areas in the region is sparse, a concentration of both settlement and funerary features has been identified to the south of the site, in the area of Wester Yardhouses. The blanket bog, Stallashaw moss, which characterises the modern site landscape, was probably laid down throughout the Bronze Age period, thus potentially burying evidence from earlier periods. A souterrain, designated as a Scheduled Ancient Monument, lies just within the 3km study area at Wester Yardhouses (HA 67). Evidence of Roman activity is restricted to the possible line of a Roman road (HA 84) approximately 3km to the south-east of the site.

### *Medieval and Post-medieval*

There is little or no evidence for activity from the medieval period in the area of the site, this is not considered to be unusual as lower status dwelling activity is rarely identified archaeologically outside established medieval burghs.

By far the highest concentration of activity associated with the site dates to the post-medieval period, primarily in association with improvement of the wetlands for the grazing of animals. The wider landscape is littered with coal fields and other mineral extraction sites, the nearby village of Tarbrax being built specifically to house workers of the shale oil extraction industry. The demise of the collieries was quickly followed by a decline in population, returning the landscape to a rural, rather than industrial footing. These sites are listed in the gazetteer and shown in Illus 2 but are not discussed further in this report. The only sites of national designation are the B listed Auchengray Church and the C(S) listed dovecot at Lawhead House.

The first major incursion onto the Stallashaw Moss itself was made by extensive areas of forestry plantation between the 1960s and 1970s.

## Walkover Survey

The walkover survey confirmed the character of the site as upland bog, areas of which were given over to rough grazing. The turbine track, turbine locations and anemometer location were visited; no upstanding archaeological remains were identified at these locations. Numerous modern drainage channels were observed and the presence of several previously identified upstanding features within the development area was confirmed. No new features were identified.

## CONCLUSIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

The site itself appears to have seen very little development in terms of either settlement or industrial activity. The marshy character of the land restricts both agriculture and industrial use and despite the various drainage and improvement methods implemented on the site, the majority of the area remains as blanket bog.

Whilst this appears to have precluded human activity after the deposition of the bog, there is some limited potential for the survival of pre-Bronze Age activity buried beneath it. Several findspots of both Mesolithic and Neolithic material have been identified scattered across the wider area, perhaps suggesting the presence of marginal settlement. With this in mind, a study of borehole data from across the site should be considered. A programme of palaeo-environmental sampling could also be beneficial, as a part of the watching brief, in order to establish the nature of the peat. It is recommended that a programme of watching brief is maintained during the excavation of turbine and crane hardstanding areas.

The only above ground feature close enough to be immediately affected by the erection of the turbines and associated works is a small rectilinear enclosure, thought to be part of a former livestock enclosure of probable 19<sup>th</sup> century date (HA 10); this should be fenced off with

high visibility netlon mesh to avoid the possibility of accidental damage by plant during the course of the works. The trees within this enclosure will be felled, but no disturbance to the enclosure will occur.
