Summary

A desk-based assessment was undertaken on land at Kilgallioch, within South Ayrshire and Dumfries and Galloway, in advance of a planning application for the construction of a new windfarm. The central area of the Development is within an extensive area of commercial forestry, established after 1950. The outer edges of the proposed windfarm are located on rough upland heather moor.

There are numerous archaeological features surviving within the site boundary, many of which are Scheduled Ancient Monuments. Most of these are located in an area designated as an Archaeologically Sensitive Area by Dumfries and Galloway Council to the south west of the Development. There are cairns, hut circles and burnt mounds indicating that a prehistoric landscape has been preserved due to the lack of later intensive farming on the site. Possible medieval and later activity is mainly agricultural and domestic in origin in the form of farmsteads and field systems and is slow to change.

The area has not been subject to excessive development until modern commercial forestry partially covered the site leading to good preservation of upstanding archaeological features. The preservation of any unknown below ground archaeological features may be good in the treeless areas. Contrastingly the intrusive nature of modern commercial forestry means that the likelihood of previously unknown below ground archaeological features being preserved is slight in the forested areas.

Introduction

Headland Archaeology Ltd undertook an archaeological desk based assessment of the proposed Development area of a windfarm at Kilgallioch on behalf of Arcus Renewable Energy Consulting for Scottish Power Renewables. This lies partially in South Ayrshire Council and partially in Dumfries and Galloway Council.

Site description

The proposed Development covers approximately 55km² (centred on NX 2230 7245) to the south west of Arecleoch Forest, approximately 11km south of Barrhill, South Ayrshire. The central upland area of the Development is located in a modern forestry plantation established in the second half of the 20th century. The outer lower lying edges of the site are located in rough heather moorland.

Methodology

The study was intended to provide an assessment of all relevant archaeological and historical records within the proposed Development area and a study area based on a radius of roughly 1km from the site boundary. Records from further afield were also studied to allow for any significant sites located just outside the 1km boundary. The objective was to determine the likely presence of known or unknown archaeological sites within the Development area. It was designed to provide a summary assessment of the implications for the Development site, not as an exhaustive historical discussion.

For the purposes of this assessment within the immediate study area around the development, all features pre-dating Ordnance Survey 1st edition mapping were considered to be potentially of cultural heritage significance.

The following sources were consulted:

- National Monuments Record of Scotland (NMRS)
- Dumfries and Galloway Sites and Monuments Record (SMR)

- West of Scotland Archaeology Service for South Ayrshire (WoSAS) SMR
- Historic Scotland Schedule of Ancient Monuments and List of Listed Buildings
- Vertical air photos held by RCAHMS
- Maps held by the National Library of Scotland and
- Other readily accessible published sources

The information was collated in a gazetteer, cross-referenced to a map showing the location and extent of all features for an initial constraints map (Fig 1). It is assumed that the information from these sources which is presented in the Gazetteer is correct.

Results

Numerous sites were identified across the development area and adjacent 1km study area. The following is a summary of the archaeological evidence identified during the desk study, a gazetteer of all identified sites is appended.

Four listed buildings exist within the study area, but outside the Development area. Two of these are buildings; Glenwhilly farmhouse (HA174) (Category C(S)) and Gatelawbridge Old Stable House (HA175) (Category B). A foot bridge (HA171) and a vehicle bridge (HA180) are also listed at Marklach and Dirniemow respectively (both category C(S)).

There are numerous Scheduled Ancient Monuments within the proposed Development area and further examples within the 1km study area. With the exception of three sites these are all located within an Archaeologically Sensitive Area as designated by Dumfries and Galloway Council. This area contains a large number of archaeological monuments of various dates and types many of which are scheduled.

Outside of this Archaeologically Sensitive Area there are 3 Scheduled Ancient Monuments; Laggangarn stone circle (HA48) a prehistoric monument with two Early Christian crosses later incised upon the stones, The Wells of the Rees (HA40) a church of probable medieval origin and Eldrig Fell (HA197) a

large cairn. One site, Airyewn farmstead and enclosure (HA6), is designated as certainly of national importance on the D&G non statutory register.

Prehistoric

Prehistoric monuments within the study area consist mainly of large numbers of cairns, the function of which it is not easily determined without archaeological investigation. The smaller cairns, often grouped together, are probably of agricultural clearance origin while the larger examples may well be funerary cairns. Frequently located amongst these cairns are hut circles, the remnants of domestic dwellings.

Along with the cairns and hut circles there are also burnt mounds of probable prehistoric origin. Other prehistoric monuments are two standing stones that are the remnants of a stone circle both of which have had early Christian crosses later inscribed upon them. Finally there is a solitary standing stone and two cup marked boulders.

Within the Archaeologically Sensitive Area many of these prehistoric sites are designated as Scheduled Ancient Monuments

Medieval and Post-medieval

There are no sites of definite medieval origin but some later sites may have origins in the medieval era. There are two religious sites; Wells of the Rees, a church with associated wells and Linns Tomb (HA 32) a covenanters grave with commemorative stones.

Other than these sites the post-medieval remains are agricultural and domestic in nature with farmsteads, often with associated fields and outbuildings, forming the most common site type. Other agricultural sites noted are fields and field systems, sheepfolds and sheep rees. There are also several shielings present on the higher ground along with buildings of undetermined character.

Within the Archaeologically Sensitive Area many of these sites are Scheduled Ancient Monuments.

Cartographic evidence

The earliest available map of the area is Gordon's 1636-52 map. This shows the hill of Craig Airie Fell with a scatter of farmsteads clustered around. The landscape changes little during subsequent mapping with scattered farmsteads situated on the lower ground generally close to the rivers running through the area. The Barrhill road to the west of the Development site is first shown on Moll's 1745 mapping of the area and the railway is first depicted on the Ordnance Survey 1896 map of the area.

Of the farmsteads shown on Gordon's map only Miltonise appears to be still inhabited now. Ainslie's map of 1821 however shows all of the earlier farmsteads being occupied.

In the New Statistical Account for New Luce of 1834-45 Rev. William McKergo states: "Farms are much improved in the last 30 years, by new houses, marsh dykes and fences dividing the meadow and arable lands from the moor pasture." This shows the division that exists between the enclosed infield and the moor pastures.

Discussion

There are numerous examples of prehistoric sites dating to the Neolithic and Bronze Age both within the development area and throughout the wider study area. The majority of the sites are cairns, some of which may be funerary, these survive throughout the study area, largely untouched by later agriculture and development. Direct evidence of settlement is present in the form of numerous hut circles, the burnt mounds also suggest domestic activity. Ritual activity is represented by some of the cairns, the standing stones and cup marked boulders. This suggests that a complete prehistoric landscape has been preserved rather than solely ritual sites surviving on the higher ground.

The Post-Medieval period is represented by the appearance of small rural settlements and the development of small farmsteads around the hill of Craig Airie Fell on which the site is located. Farmsteads, field systems and areas of upstanding cultivation remains suggests that certain areas were exploited for arable farming during this period, whilst the more inaccessible areas higher up the hill, were reserved for the grazing of livestock. This pattern of activity seems to have had its origins in the Post-Medieval period and to have

remained substantially similar throughout the ensuing centuries, with farms being improved from around 1800 onwards.

The immediate landscape of the site was only dramatically altered with the plantation of commercial forestry in the second half of the 20th century.

Conclusions

There are numerous known archaeological sites within the Development area. All of these sites contain upstanding remains that are visible on the ground surface. There is however the potential for additional unknown archaeological sites to be present across the Development area.

Outside forested areas the Development area has seen relatively little modern activity that is likely to destroy upstanding archaeological remains, therefore it is to be expected that archaeological sites with a surface expression will have been identified. Certain types of archaeological sites, such as timber structures, would not be expected to present surface remains but to survive purely as below ground archaeology.

The Development area is either located in dense commercial forestry or upland heather moor. The potential survival of any unknown below ground archaeological features present depends upon where they are located. In moorland areas the lack of development and industrial activity mean that the potential for survival is high. Conversely the intrusive nature of commercial forestry planting and maintenance means that the potential for survival in forested areas is low.

It is recommended that at least a 50m buffer is established around all features of cultural heritage identified in this desk assessment in order to avoid accidental damage. Furthermore the Archaeologically Sensitive Area identified by Dumfries and Galloway Council contains a large number of archaeological remains of various dates and types, many of which are Scheduled Ancient Monuments. The planning policy recommends safeguarding the character and archaeological interest of this area. While this area has large numbers of archaeologically sensitive sites, rather than avoiding them, these may be protected by suitable mitigation. This may be

through the relocation and micro-siting of elements of the Development with the potential to impact known sites.

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
