an uneven appearance to some of the inside surfaces, especially since  
some of the large grits have fallen out partly through being forced







'Of state-owned brickyards there are traces in ... in Britain' (R. S. in 1955, JRS. 46 (1956), 149) & Royal Comm. on Hist. Monuments (England) vol. 3: Roman London, London 1928, 176.] Basic text reads P. PR BR LON with every possible variant.'

Alternative meanings for initial suggested. - 'portiones, publicani & procuratores have been suggested, of which the last is the strongest contender. One might suggest also p(edicula). pr (ovinciae) or p(letunia) p(ultrica) Br (Itanniae) LON (dimensis - i.e. 'omitted') since it is agreed that the bricks were used for official buildings financed by the State.'

He gives variants P·PR BR ; P BR LON, P. BRI L<sup>(N)</sup>; P P B R LON; PP BRI LON; P.BRI·SAN; P.RRT L<sup>(N)</sup>. Quoted from CIL, amphora stamps "P PR B"; RVF SANI; OF SANI, SANNVS + SAENVS for London.

We appear to be dealing with the officing of Rufus Sannus, employed by the state in a tithing

(<sup>K.F.W.</sup> linked with P BR SAN) either leased or under contract to the central government, and busy with some London senate-house or the like "biggest" an example of farming out work contractors.

Not clear if any additional grit was added for intensification (Tomber and Rose 1998, 69 + see letters etc.) Well worn.

Chalk Little Chester Wroxeter [WPC 92a] unpublished. Fine pinky brown fabric with a buff  
slip. Probably continental; packed with grit, white & flake. Not identified


