


# Chatsworth House Sculpture Exhibition. Results of an Archaeological Watching Brief.

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## Executive Summary

An archaeological watching brief was undertaken by Archaeological Research Services Ltd on behalf of the Chatsworth House Trust during the installation of sculptures for display at the 2008 exhibition. This required observation of ground excavation at three different locations.

An area of made ground (area 1) which produced a collection of pottery and other small finds was excavated by hand by archaeologists from Archaeological Research Services Ltd. The assemblage of pottery consisted of 487 sherds, predominantly of horticultural wares with a small quantity of refined earthenwares dating to the 18th and 19th centuries. One sherd of medieval pottery dating to between the later 11th and early 13th centuries was also found.

A culvert revealed in area 3 can be identified on an 1858 plan of Chatsworth gardens.

No significant archaeological features, deposits, buried land surfaces or small finds were located within the three areas of excavation.

#### 1. Introduction

1.1 An archaeological watching brief was undertaken by Archaeological Research Services Ltd on behalf of the Chatsworth House Trust. Three areas of ground excavation within the formal gardens were monitored during the installation of sculptures for display at the 2008 exhibition. The work had been requested by the Senior Conservation Archaeologist at the Peak District National Park Authority (PDNPA).

## 2. Location and Geology

- 2.1 The Chatsworth Estate is located 8 miles north of Matlock off the B6012 and the house centred at NGR 261710.
- 2.2 The solid geology of the Chatsworth Estate forms part of the Millstone Grit Series. In particular, the Chatsworth Grit that that can be found around Baslow and the Chatsworth Estate (Barnatt & Williamson 2005).




Fig. 1 Location map of Chatsworth house.

#### 3. Aims of the Project

3.1 The project was an archaeological watching brief which was maintained at the request of the Chatsworth House Trust. The aim of the watching brief was to observe all ground works for the presence of archaeological remains and fully record and excavate any archaeological features encountered.

#### 4. Method Statement

4.1 The excavations were undertaken by hand and machine with regard to the circumstances presented by the archaeology and also by the presence of service drains uncovered within the test excavation areas. The entire process was monitored by an archaeologist from Archaeological Research Services Ltd. All the contexts were recorded on pro-forma sheets, and a context register, along with a finds register, were produced for inclusion in the archive.

#### 5. Results




Fig. 4 Showing the location of the three excavation areas.

Area 1 was positioned north east of the main house, on a well maintained lawn adjacent to the northern extent of the Broad Walk and south of the Conservative Wall (so called 'because it conserves heat') (Fig. 4). A circular line of 11.4m diameter was divided into 40 evenly spaced points from where 0.6m x 0.6m x 0.15m pits were excavated. Turf was carefully removed from the surface which revealed imported topsoil (context 100); the topsoil was consistently found to be up to 100mm in depth. A layer of dark silty soil (101) approximately 50mm in depth underlay the topsoil. This was a mixed layer containing large amounts of burnt coal and fragments of building bricks, 487 sherds of pottery and a collection of other small finds (Appendix II). At the limit of excavation and

underlying (101) in the southern half of the area was a firmer compacted soil (102), while at the northern extent a firm sandy clay layer (103) was visible (Figs 2 & 3). Within pits 7, 8, 11, 12 and 13 a linear feature containing a clay deposit (104) was encountered, the deposit was present 70mm to 90mm below the upper surface and has been interpreted as a 19<sup>th</sup> century pipe line or drain (Fig 3).

A worked limestone slab was revealed in pit 25 (Fig. 5). Removal of the slab was not possible in its initial position, while excavation downward exposed underlying modern red brick work. Excavation to the south east was required to expose the extent of the slab which measured  $0.9 \text{m} \times 0.7 \text{m} \times 0.065 \text{m}$ , when the slab was lifted an inspection chamber of a modern drain system was exposed (Fig. 6).

5.2 Area 2 (Fig. 4) was positioned approximately 20m south east from the southern extent of the Broad Walk path on raised ground of rough grassland, overlooking the canal pond and the course of the river Derwent below. Three pits 0.75m x 0.75m x 0.75m were excavated, and then filled with concrete to form the foundations for installing the intended sculpture. When the turf was removed

the supporting topsoil (105) was revealed as a thin layer of up to 60mm in depth (Fig. 7). Underlying (105) was a layer of natural clay (106) 0.58m in depth which overlay natural laminated sandstone (107) extending to the depth of excavation (Fig. 8). No archaeological features, deposits, buried land surfaces or small finds were located within these pits.

5.3 Area 3 (Fig. 4) was located north of the canal pond in the pathway that runs east to west. A trench measuring 4.5m in length x 3.7m in width x 0.9m in depth was excavated in order to lower the mechanical component of a sculpture into the ground (Fig. 9).

In the western portion of the trench, a layer of sandstone blocks measuring approximately 0.65m in length x 0.1m in height x 0.35m in width were revealed at a depth of 0.4m (Fig. 10). Upon removal of one of the blocks, two vertical walls constructed of sandstone and a horizontal base constructed of sandstone blocks were revealed indicating that this feature was a culvert (Fig. 11). The culvert was positioned on a north to south alignment. Due to the culvert's location, the trench was moved 1.5m to the east in order to leave the feature *in-situ* and undisturbed.




Fig. 12: Concrete blocks and sandstone wall located within the south-facing section of the trench

Upon excavation of the rest of the trench, a thin layer of white stoney gravel (108) was removed this overlay a compacted layer of black stones (109). At a depth of 1m, a layer of uncoursed sandstone blocks (110) was exposed which had been redeposited, probably to create the road between the Emperor Fountain and the lawn to the south of Chatsworth house (Fig. 13). The layer continued for 0.4m until the natural clay (111) was revealed. Within the south-facing section of the trench was a layer of concrete blocks (112) 0.25m below the ground surface. These lay on top of a layer of sandstone blocks forming the outer wall of a drain running parallel to the house (Fig. 12). For greater context detail see Appendix II.

Resident workmen confirmed that concrete blocks had been used to repair the top of the drain in the mid 1980s. After excavation of the trench to a depth of 0.9m, the base was compacted to provide a flat surface for the sculpture. No further archaeological deposits, features or finds were revealed during the excavation of this trench

#### 6. Discussion

- From information available through documented sources it is apparent that the location of area 1 has seen drastic development within the lifetime of Chatsworth House. A 1617 survey by William Senior indicates the area of excavation lay within the boundary of an orchard containing a small central pond (greenhouse pond). An engraving of 1699 and an undated painting of possible early 18<sup>th</sup> century date shows the orchard having been replaced by a large pond, possibly for the breeding of fish. No date has been noted for the removal of the pond, but a map of 1773 by George Baker and a more detailed copy by Jeffry Wyatville of early 19th century date do not show any evidence of a pond in the appropriate area. By this date the ground has become part of what is now the Salisbury Lawns. It is now separated from the Salisbury Lawns by a path leading east to the 1st Dukes Greenhouse. The adjacent position of the Conservative Wall and boiler house built in 1842, along with the knowledge of the present ground staff pertaining to a gardeners mess to the south east, may have some bearing on the finds that were uncovered. The position of the infilled ditch (104) runs a similar course to either a pipe or drain shown on a plan produced for this purpose in 1858 by Campbell.
- 6.2 The report on the pottery recovered in area 1 indicates the majority of the assemblage to be horticultural vessels with a probably date range of between c.1800 and c.1850; this should be of no surprise considering the location of area 1 within the garden and in close proximity to greenhouses. An 18<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup> century date attributed to a small assemblage of tablewares mixed within the horticultural vessels suggests the deposition of these materials simultaneously. The identification of one sherd of medieval pottery defined as Derbyshire Medieval Sandyware and dated between the later 11<sup>th</sup> and early 13<sup>th</sup> centuries is of interest, but is clearly residual in nature.
- 6.3 The thin layer of topsoil exposed in area two may be the consequence of ground reduction that was undertaken to terrace the landscape for the construction of the Canal Pond.
- Area 3 is positioned on the main path which divides the Canal Pond from the lawn and Sea Horse Fountain south of the main house. Other than general upkeep and maintenance it is probable that there has been no major development in this location since the construction of the canal pond in 1702-3. Again the location of the culvert is within the area of a pipe or drain identified on Campbell's 1858 plan.

#### 7. Conclusions

7.1 The present gently sloping nature of the ground in area 1 as opposed to the level setting of the earlier pond would have required subsequent deposition of material within the site of the pond to achieve the present slope. The large amounts of coal and coal waste removed from the sub layers would suggest that landscaping was being undertaken after the building of the Conservative wall in1842, the coal waste being associated with the boiler used to heat this wall. The mixed deposits

of garden pottery, fragments of building brick and glass suggest general waste was being used for the purpose of making up ground.

No significant archaeological features, deposits, buried land surfaces or small finds were located within the three areas of excavation.

#### Introduction

The pottery assemblage from excavations on the Chatsworth Estate (CHATS08) was examined by the author on 28<sup>th</sup> and 29<sup>th</sup> August 2008. It consisted of 487 sherds of pottery, fragments of tile and other objects weighing 8841 grams and represented a maximum of 475 vessels and objects. The data are summarised in Table 1.

#### The pottery

Medieval pottery

One sherd of medieval pottery was identified in the assemblage (context 101, Pit 9). This was a body sherd in a dark brown sandy fabric of a type defined as Derbyshire Medieval Sandy ware (Cumberpatch 2004a, 2004b). The date range of this type of pottery is poorly defined for reasons discussed elsewhere (Cumberpatch 2004a), but it appears to be of earlier medieval type, most probably dating to between the later 11<sup>th</sup> and early 13<sup>th</sup> centuries.

#### Horticultural wares

The greater part of the assemblage consisted of flowerpots and other horticultural wares in two fabrics. The first and commonest of these was *Unglazed Red Earthenware* and the second a sandier textured fabric containing quartz and red non-crystalline inclusions, was termed *Unglazed Buff Earthenware*. Other horticultural items included three small ceramic plaques, most probably for identifying plant specimens or areas of specific planting.

Unglazed Red Earthenware was the commonest ware type in the assemblage and can be described as a 'flowerpot' fabric. It was orange to red in colour and contained occasional fine dark red grains but generally appeared not to contain any significant inclusions. A small number of sherds were slightly coarser in texture and softer than the majority of sherds but the significance of this, if any, is unclear. The range of vessel forms was relatively wide. For the sake of clarity only those base sherds with clear evidence of a central drainage hole have been described as 'flowerpots' in the data table. The remainder have been described as 'horticultural vessels' which reflects the diversity of size and rim shape within the group. Vessel size is, broadly, indicated by the thickness of the sherds although the fragmentation of the assemblage precluded any useful assessment of the ratio between vessels of different sizes.

Rim shapes varied considerably from plain rounded rims to heavier rims with pronounced external bulges. One example (Pit 29) had a lateral handle immediately below the clubbed rim. In all but one case (Pit 10) the internal surface was smooth with no inturn of the rim. This presumably reflects the necessity to empty the pots of soil easily and without impediment when the plants were potted on or, in the case of larger vessels, perhaps when the plant was no longer needed for display. The wide range of vessel sizes seen in the assemblage may reflect the wide variations in the sizes and possibly the species of plants in the garden. While the smaller pots were most probably intended for the propagation and growing of plants, the larger ones may well have held larger individual plants or groups of smaller specimens. The external bulges and everted rims seen on the larger vessels may well have been intended to ease the lifting of the pots when they were full of soil. Very few of the

sherds bore any decoration and only one carried part of a maker's name (limited to a single ambiguous letter). With one exception (shown in Plate 1), decoration was limited to shallow impressed lines, usually single but sometimes double, on the external surface. The thistle design from Pit 8 shown in Plate 1 is unusual and without parallel in the author's experience.

A large rod handle was recovered from Pit 38. Superficially this bore a certain resemblance to a medieval jug handle, even down to the splashes of glaze on the surface, but the fabric was clearly that of the Unglazed Red Earthenwares. Whether the resemblance to a medieval jug is fortuitous or whether there was a deliberate intention to produce a simulacrum of an 'antique' jug, perhaps for some decorative or display purpose, is unclear.

A small number of sherds appeared to carry a thin layer of white slip on the external surface (Pits 4, 24, 28, 29 and 40). In all cases this was thin and streaky, barely covering the red body beneath

Several possible and one definite pot disc (Pit 6, shown in Plate 2) were identified amongst the red wares. The purpose of these objects remains unknown.

The range of vessel forms seen in the Unglazed Red Earthenwares was reflected in the Unglazed Buff Earthenwares, the principal difference being in the fabrics. The buff wares were generally somewhat harder then the red wares and were characterised not only by their colour but also by the presence of sparse to moderate quantities of fine quartz grit and occasional non-crystalline inclusions. One base (Pit 34) was classified as a flowerpot while the remainder appeared to be horticultural vessels of different kinds.

Three of the pits (25, 28 and 29) produced fragments of ceramic plant labels (Plate 3). These 'T' shaped objects were made from refined earthenware bodies similar to those of 19<sup>th</sup> century Whitewares and were unglazed, presumably to allow details of the plants to be written on them in pencil. No trace of writing survived on any of the fragments examined.

#### Refined earthenwares

In addition to the horticultural wares, the assemblage also included fragments of typical later  $18^{th}$  and  $19^{th}$  century tablewares. The earliest of these sherds were the fragments of *Creamware* (c.1740-c.1820) from Pits 2 and 40. Creamware, the earliest of the refined earthenwares which replaced White Salt Glazed Stoneware and matched imported porcelain in terms of quality and practicality, is a regular find on both urban and rural sites in Yorkshire and Derbyshire. Some of the other refined earthenwares, notably the *Cane Coloured ware*, *slip banded Cane Coloured ware* and the *Mocha ware* may also be of  $18^{th}$  century date although as production only began in the last decade of the  $18^{th}$  century and continued until the latter part of the  $19^{th}$  century, they might well be somewhat later than the Creamwares. Contemporary utilitarian wares from the site include the *Brown Glazed Coarseware* and *Brown Salt Glazed Stoneware*. The *Sponged ware* and *Whitewares* (plain and transfer printed) may be somewhat later in date (although the overlap in all of the date ranges listed in Table 1 should be noted in this context) as both types of pottery are of mid to later  $19^{th}$  century type.

#### Other items

Other items worthy of note in the assemblage included fragments of roof tile from Pit 30 and a piece of stone from pit 27 to which fragments of a vitreous slag were attached. All of these items require comment from suitably qualified specialists.

### Chronology and dating

The dating of flowerpots and horticultural vessels is always difficult and particularly so when the sherds are plain and it is difficult to distinguish the vessel profiles. According to the outline chronology proposed by Currie (1993:239) a date range of between c.1800 and c.1850 would seem to be appropriate in that the assemblage of horticultural waters conforms, in general terms, to his characterisation of the traits typical of this period and, to a lesser extent to the latter part of his earlier period, c.1730 - c.1800. This also fits with the date range of the non-horticultural vessels. Indications from sites in Sheffield suggest that Cane Coloured wares of all but utilitarian type

belonged to the early and middle part of the 19<sup>th</sup> century, becoming rarer in the final decades of the century (Cumberpatch 2008) although the extremely limited scope for the detailed analysis of assemblages from Sheffield means that much less can be said of this matter than might be the case in other circumstances. The presence of Whitewares may indicate a slightly later date although the distinction between late Pearlwares and early Whitewares can be difficult to demonstrate even under ideal conditions and the fragmentary and flaked sherds present in this assemblage renders the task even more difficult. It should also be noted that the date of deposition may be somewhat later than the date of manufacture. While this is true of many types of archaeological deposit, it is particularly the case with garden assemblages where pots no longer of use in the house may have been passed on for use by the gardeners and other ground staff (see also Cumberpatch 2003 for a possible parallel from Bretton Hall).

#### Discussion

It is never easy to comment in detail on an assemblage that consists largely of fragments of horticultural wares. Parallels for the assemblage locally include those from Brodsworth Hall near Doncaster (author's observations) and Bretton Hall in West Yorkshire (Cumberpatch 2003). More generally, Currie's review of the subject (1993) draws attention to the potential offered by the detailed analysis of horticultural assemblages. The assemblage considered here is somewhat too fragmentary for such a detailed analysis to be possible, but the fact that the site has produced such an assemblage suggests that the Chatsworth Estate could, in principal, provide data to compare with the two assemblages considered by Currie (Kirby Hall in Northamptonshire and Castle Bromwich Hall in the West Midlands). Should further work on or adjacent to the site considered here be in prospect, then it would seem to be worth including proposals for the inclusion of relevant parts (the diagnostic sherds) of this assemblage to be included in the analysis.

#### Further work

While further work on the assemblage would probably not lead to any great refinement of the discussion provided above, the assemblage should be retained in its entirety with a view to incorporating elements of it in any future research on the gardens of the Chatsworth Estate.

In terms of conservation and storage requirements, no conservation measures are necessary but the pottery was wet when delivered and requires thorough drying before it is finally packed and deposited in the appropriate local museum.
