Summary

Wessex Archaeology was commissioned by Wm. The watching brief comprised the intermittent archaeological observation of groundwork undertaken beneath the current ground surface, such as the stripping of hardcore and soil down to the construction level.

No archaeological features or layers were observed during the watching brief.

1 INTRODUCTION

1.1 Project Background

- 1.1.1 Wessex Archaeology was commissioned by Wm. Morrisons Produce Limited (the Client), through their project management advisors Turner and Townsend, to undertake an archaeological watching brief during groundwork associated with the construction of a new distribution and food production centre on the site of the former British Cellophane works on Bristol Road (A38), Bridgwater, Somerset centred around National Grid Reference (NGR) 330913, 138930 (hereafter referred to as 'the Site', **Figure 1**).
- 1.1.2 A Written Scheme of Investigation, setting out the strategy and methodology implemented during the watching brief, was prepared by Wessex Archaeology (2011) and approved by the SHEO at Somerset County Council prior to the commencement of fieldwork.

2 SITE DESCRIPTION

2.1 Location, topography and geology

- 2.1.1 The Site occupies a rectangular plot of land to the east of the A38, which lies immediately to the east of the River Parret and approximately 1km to the south-east of the Parret Estuary. The Site is bounded to the east by a mainline railway, beyond which are open fields. To the south of the Site is an industrial estate (**Figure 1**).
- 2.1.2 The Site is relatively flat and prior to the recent development was occupied by the 20th century industrial units associated with the former British Cellophane works. The Site, lying within the estuarine plain of the River Parret, would have been relatively level prior to the development by British Cellophane and lies at approximately 6m above Ordnance datum (aOD). The drift geology of the Site comprises estuarine alluvium.

3 ARCHAEOLOGICAL AND HISTORICAL BACKGROUND

- 3.1.1 A rapid search of the Somerset Historic Environment Record identified a number of sites of archaeological interest in the vicinity of the Site. Whilst most of the records relate to Bridgwater's 19th century industrial expansion (i.e. tile factory at Chilton Trinity and a brickworks at Dunball Wharf), there are several records of earlier find spots and sites of interest which are mentioned below.
- 3.1.2 Roman coins (Constantine) have been recovered from Chilton Trinity, to the north-west of the Site. Perhaps more significantly, the remains of a deserted medieval village and manor are still evident in an area adjacent to Dunball

Wharf, to the north of the Site. The visible remains of ridge and furrow cultivation have probably been associated with this former settlement.

3.1.3 Perhaps the most common records for the area comprise those for Second World War pillboxes, obviously sited to protect against attack via the River Parret Estuary.

4 AIMS

4.1 Watching Brief

4.1.1 The aim of the watching brief was to provide further information concerning the presence/absence, date, nature and extent of any buried archaeological remains and to investigate and record these within the proposed development areas.

5 METHOD

5.1 Fieldwork

- 5.1.1 The watching brief was carried out in accordance with the relevant guidance given in the Institute for Archaeologists' *Standard and Guidance for Archaeological Watching Briefs* (IfA 2008) and with the Written Scheme of Investigation (2011).
- 5.1.2 The fieldwork consisted of the monitoring of groundwork undertaken beneath the present ground surface. An intermittent archaeological presence was maintained during groundwork undertaken within the Site.
- 5.1.3 The machining was carried out by a tracked excavator using a toothless bucket and a bulldozer (**Plates 1** and **2**); the use of the bulldozer limited the possibility for archaeological observation.
- 5.1.4 All archaeological deposits were recorded using Wessex Archaeology's *pro forma* recording sheets. This included written, drawn, and photographic record, as deemed necessary. The photographic record was maintained using a digital camera equipped with an image sensor of not less than 10 megapixels. Digital images were subject to managed quality control and curation processes which will embed appropriate metadata within the image and ensure long term accessibility of the image set.

5.2 Health and Safety

- 5.2.1 Health and safety considerations were of paramount importance in conducting all fieldwork. Safe working practises took precedence over archaeological considerations at all times.
- 5.2.2 All work was carried out in accordance with the Health and Safety at Work etc. Act 1974 and the Management of Health and Safety Regulations 1992, and all other relevant Health and Safety legislation, regulations and codes of practice in force at the time.

5.2.3 Wessex Archaeology supplied a copy of their Health and Safety Policy and a Risk Assessment to the Client before the commencement of any fieldwork. The Risk Assessment was read and understood by all staff attending the Site before any groundwork commences.

6 RESULTS

- 6.1.1 The groundwork comprised the removal of the existing concrete slab and the underlying layer of hardcore and subsequent stripping of 0.20-0.40m of soil, before spreading and rolling of fresh hardcore directly on to the natural layers (**Plates 3** and **4**). The works also comprised the cutting of a culvert alongside the Site's boundary (**Plate 5**).
- 6.1.2 The natural layers, exposed underneath the former hardcore, comprised mid brown silt/clay alluvium with areas of grey silt/clay alluvium. It was not possible to assess whether the natural deposits had been horizontally truncated during the construction of the former development.
- 6.1.3 No archaeological features or deposits were observed during the watching brief. No finds were recovered apart from building material (brick, tile, ceramic pipe, etc.) of 20th century date (not retained).

7 ARCHIVE

7.1 **Preparation and Deposition**

- 7.1.1 The project archive is currently held at the offices of Wessex Archaeology in Salisbury under the project reference 79260.
- 7.1.2 The complete project archive was prepared in accordance with Wessex Archaeology's Guidelines for Archive Preparation and in accordance with *Guidelines for the preparation of excavation archives for long-term storage* (UKIC 1990). Information will be obtained from the relevant museum concerning conditions and arrangements for the deposition of the Archive on completion of the project.
- 7.1.3 A museum accession number and Historic Environment Record Primary Record Number (PRN) were obtained from SCC prior to the commencement of the project.

8 CONCLUSIONS

8.1.1 No archaeological features, finds or deposits were identified in the course of the watching brief.


