#### **Summary**

Wessex Archaeology was commissioned by Kirby Homes Ltd. to undertake an archaeological watching brief during the construction works to the rear of 84-86 Grazeley Road, Three Mile Cross, Reading, Berkshire (NGR 471080, 167569). The watching brief was undertaken between the 11<sup>th</sup> and the 22<sup>nd</sup> November 2013.

No archaeological features or deposits were found.

#### 1 INTRODUCTION

#### 1.1 Project background

- 1.1.1 Wessex Archaeology was commissioned by Kirby Homes Ltd (the Client) to undertake an archaeological watching brief during the construction works to the rear of 84-86 Grazeley Road, Three Mile Cross, Reading, Berkshire, National Grid Reference (NGR) 471080, 167569 (hereafter 'the Site'). The watching brief was undertaken during excavation of footings and other invasive groundworks for 2 dwellings and associated garages, parking and landscaping (Figure 1).
- 1.1.2 The proposed development is located on land to the rear of Nos 84-86 Grazeley Road. Planning Consent has been granted to which conditions have been attached, including the following:
  - (8) No development shall commence until a programme of archaeological work (which may comprise more than one phase of work) has been implemented in accordance with a written scheme of investigation, which has been submitted to and approved in writing by the Local Planning Authority. The development shall only take place in accordance with the detailed scheme approved pursuant to this condition.

#### Reason:

To allow adequate archaeological investigation before any archaeological remains are disturbed by the approved development.

- 1.1.3 The Archaeological Officer for Berkshire has commented (dated 22<sup>nd</sup> March 2013) that an archaeological watching brief undertaken during all intrusive groundworks will be an appropriate response.
- 1.1.4 The watching brief was undertaken between the 11<sup>th</sup> and the 22<sup>nd</sup> November 2013.

#### 1.2 The Site

- 1.2.1 The Site is located within the urban area of Three Mile Cross in the suburb of Shinfield, Reading. The land comprises roughly 716 square metres of former gardens to the rear of residential properties along Grazeley Road to the north, Loxwood Close to the east and Woodcock Court to the south.
- 1.2.2 The ground surface is generally level, at an approximate height above Ordnance Datum (aOD) of 40m. The underlying geology of the Site is mapped as London Clay (BGS).



#### 2 ARCHAEOLOGICAL BACKGROUND

2.1.1 Several archaeological investigations have taken place in the vicinity of Grazeley Road and Mereoak Lane. These investigations have predominantly yielded Iron Age and Romano-British features and artefacts, in particular to the north of Grazeley Road (TVAS 2003 & 2011). Fieldwork on the southern side of the road showed less extensive remains (TVAS 1998 & 2000) but the Site was still considered to be located within an area of high archaeological potential.

#### 3 METHODOLOGY

#### 3.1 Aims and objectives

- 3.1.1 The aims of the watching brief were:
  - to determine the presence or absence of archaeological remains, and should remains be present, to ensure their preservation by record to the highest possible standard:
  - to confirm the approximate date or date range of the remains, by means of artefactual or other evidence:
  - to determine or confirm the approximate extent of any remains;
  - to determine the condition and state of preservation of the remains;
  - to determine the degree of complexity of the horizontal and/or vertical stratigraphy present; and
  - to prepare a report on the results of the watching brief.

#### 3.2 Fieldwork methodology

- 3.2.1 The full detailed methodology of the archaeological works was set out in a Written Scheme of Investigation (Wessex Archaeology 2013), this is summarised below:
- 3.2.2 An archaeological presence was maintained during initial ground reduction as well as the excavation of the foundation trenches for the new dwellings. Once these observations were complete and no archaeological features or deposits were found, the Archaeological Advisor to the Local Planning Authority agreed that monitoring could cease.
- 3.2.3 A record was made of the on-site conditions and progress of groundworks using Wessex Archaeology's *pro-forma* record sheets.
- 3.2.4 A full photographic record was compiled using digital images. The record illustrates both the detail and the general context of the site as a whole. Digital images have been subject to a managed quality control and curation process which has embedded appropriate metadata within the image and ensures the long term accessibility of the image set.
- 3.2.5 Monitored works were referenced to the OS mapping.
- 3.2.6 A unique site code **102050** was allocated to the Site, and was used on all records and finds.



#### 3.3 Health and Safety

- 3.3.1 Health and Safety considerations were of paramount importance in conducting all fieldwork. Safe working practices override archaeological considerations at all times.
- 3.3.2 All work was carried out in accordance with the *Health and Safety at Work etc. Act* 1974 and the *Management of Health and Safety Regulations* 1992, and all other relevant Health and Safety legislation, regulations and codes of practice in force at the time.

#### 3.4 Best practice

3.4.1 The watching brief was carried out in accordance with the relevant guidance given in the *Institute for Archaeologist's Standard and Guidance for Archaeological Watching Briefs* (revised 2008).

#### 4 ARCHAEOLOGICAL RESULTS

- 4.1.1 Up to 0.3m of modern topsoil was found to overlie 0.5m of a pale yellow-orange, sandy clay (natural geology), which contained frequent tree roots. Beneath this was a more gravel rich sandy clay deposit down to 1.7m below ground level at which point a pale bluegrey, gleyed clay, the upper mantle of the London Clay, was observed.
- 4.1.2 No archaeological features or deposits were observed.

#### 5 ARTEFACTUAL EVIDENCE

5.1.1 No artefacts were recovered during this watching brief.

#### 6 CONCLUSION

6.1.1 The absence of any archaeological features or deposits on this site, along with the results of previous fieldwork in the vicinity, would seem to support the idea that the focus of Iron Age and Romano-British activity and occupation was to the north of Grazeley Road, with the area to the south remaining relatively undeveloped until the modern period.

#### 7 STORAGE AND CURATION

#### 7.1 Archive

7.1.1 No suitable repository has been found for the physical project archive. Given the small scale of the project, and the lack of artefactual evidence, it is proposed that following the digital scanning of the records, the physical archive is not retained for long-term curation. The digital records, including this report, will be submitted to the HER, with a copy retained in the Wessex Archaeology security-copied and backed-up digital archive storage facility, under its designated Wessex Archaeology project code 102050.

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
