

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Summary

Wessex Archaeology was commissioned by RPS Consulting on behalf of Hargreaves Land Ltd to produce a historic building record, commensurate with a Historic England Photographic Survey, of the remaining upstanding buildings at the former Maltby Colliery, Maltby, Rotherham, South Yorkshire, S66 7QN. The site is centred at National Grid Reference 454983, 392352. Conditional planning permission (ref: RB2019/0639) has been granted for the demolition of the remaining buildings, in order to facilitate the conversion of the site to use as an equipment and plant auction facility. The historic building recording exercise has been conducted in order to fulfil Condition 11 of the planning permission. The survey was enhanced with basic measured sketch plans.

The survey work was undertaken in two phases. The primary phase of recording was carried out between the 20th and 23rd April 2020, with a second phase of work to record the interior of the former Powerhouse on the 18th September 2020 which had not been accessible during the initial recording.

The buildings subject to the programme of recording comprised the former Powerhouse, Canteen, Pithead Baths and Locker Rooms, Lamp Room, Main Office Block, Sewage Plant, and ancillary Explosives Store and Radioactive Materials Store. In addition, a basic record was made of the 1990s structures which are to be retained: the Security/Gatehouse building, Workshop, and Former Stores. During the survey, a basic record was also made of the former Loco Shed building, situated just outside of the site's north-western boundary, as well as the Medical Centre and Control Room buildings. Due to safety constraints, the first and second-floor plant rooms of the Pithead Baths and Locker Rooms building were recorded externally only, or from what could be safely observed from openings into those rooms.

Maltby Colliery had an operational life spanning the 20th Century: a minerals lease was sealed between the 10th Earl of Scarborough and the Sheepbridge Coal and Iron Company Ltd at the Maltby site, on 21st March 1904. In 1906, Maltby Main Colliery Company was registered and construction began on a new spur line from the South Yorkshire Joint Line. In 1907 site clearance began, with the construction of six temporary huts to accommodate the workforce, and the sinking of the Number 1 Shaft, closely followed by the Number 2 Shaft. Wholescale coal working commenced in 1911, working the Barnsley Seam at a depth of 747 metres. The site continued to grow and expand, with a parallel growth in the size and population of the town of Maltby; a staggering increase from 716 in 1901, to 7,657 by 1921. Nationalisation in 1946 saw an end to hand-dug pits, with a major programme of redevelopment and modernisation beginning in 1947. A second major phase of redevelopment followed during the 1980s, at a time when many collieries were closing. The site operated nearly continuously through until 2012, when unstable geological conditions, with excess water, gas and oil being encountered, necessitated its closure. The site was one of only a few collieries to survive the mass closures of Thatcherite Britain, and one of the last operating large-scale mines in the UK.

The majority of the former colliery buildings were demolished following the closure of the colliery, site, with the shafts being sealed. The remaining structures, which were the subject of this recording programme, range in date; the Powerhouse and Loco Shed are the oldest structures, dating to the 1900s, while the conjoined Pithead Baths and Locker Rooms, Canteen, and the Lamp Room were constructed in the 1930s. The remaining structures are later in date, and are of lesser interest, but contribute to an understanding of the site's historic development and function.

1 INTRODUCTION

1.1 Project background

- 1.1.1 Wessex Archaeology (WA) has been commissioned by RPS Consulting on behalf of Hargreaves Land Ltd (hereafter 'the Client') to produce a historic building record, commensurate with a Historic England Photographic Survey, of the remaining upstanding buildings at the former Maltby Colliery, Maltby, Rotherham, South Yorkshire, S66 7QN (hereafter 'the Site', Figure 1). The survey was enhanced with basic measured sketch plans.
- 1.1.2 Conditional planning permission (ref: RB2019/0639) has been granted for the demolition of the buildings on the Site. The Site will be converted to use as an equipment and plant auction facility. The historic building recording exercise has been conducted in order to fulfil Condition 11 of the planning permission.
- 1.1.3 The Site is situated to the east of Maltby, north of Tickhill Road, and is centred at National Grid Reference (NGR) 454983, 392352 (**Figure 1**). The Site comprises a part of the former Maltby Colliery, and contains a dispersed collection of remnant buildings and structures.
- 1.1.4 The recorded buildings comprise the Powerhouse, Canteen, Pithead Baths and Locker Rooms, Lamp Room, Main Office Block, Sewage Plant, and ancillary Explosives Store and Radioactive Materials Store. In addition, a basic record was made of the 1990s structures which are to be retained: the Security/Gatehouse building, Workshop, and Former Stores. During the survey, a basic record was also made of the former Loco Shed building, situated just outside of the Site's western boundary, as well as the Medical Centre and Control Room buildings. Due to safety constraints, primarily related to unsafe levels of asbestos, several of the buildings were recorded from the exterior only these include the Powerhouse, Loco Shed, and the first and second-floor plant rooms of the Pithead Baths and Locker Rooms building.
- 1.1.5 The historic building recording was carried out in accordance with a Written Scheme of Investigation (WSI; RPS 2019), which was submitted to South Yorkshire Archaeology Service (SYAS), specialist archaeological advisors to Rotherham Metropolitan Borough Council, for approval, and submitted to the Borough Council in line with the requirements of Condition 11.
- 1.1.6 The survey work was undertaken in two phases. The primary phase of recording was between the 20th and 23rd April 2020, with a second phase of work to record the interior of the former Powerhouse on the 18th September 2020 which had not been accessible during the initial phase.

1.2 Exceptional limitations

1.2.1 This assessment was written in April/May 2020, with subsequent additions in November 2020. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the relevant archive repositories were closed to the public, and later closed entirely, to help combat the spread of the disease. As a result, this



- report draws on freely available online sources, and on the research conducted during preparation of an earlier desk-based assessment for the Site (CgMs 2019).
- 1.2.2 The data acquired is deemed sufficient to characterise and illustrate the historic building recording conducted, and it has been agreed that no further archival research will be required for this report.

1.2.3 Site location and description

- 1.2.4 The Site, a former colliery yard, is arrayed northeast to southwest, although the former colliery's extent beyond the Site comprises a much larger area. East of the colliery's former south-eastern extent is a trainline; the former South Yorkshire Joint Railway which served the colliery. The Site is masked from the surrounding landscape by wooded margins and the mass of the spoil heap; to the east the landscape is open, however, with views to open countryside. Within the Site, despite the space engendered by the large scale of development and former circulation, the character is very much insular; rendered stark by coal staining, recent demolition, and the state of repair of the extant structures. Northwest of the Site is a towering and barren spoil heap, which is prominent in views within the Site.
- 1.2.5 The Site is accessed via a private driveway north/northeast from Tickhill Road. The road leads to a gatehouse structure, of late 20th-century date. Two roads lead into the Site from there, one direct to the Pithead Baths and Locker Rooms and Lamp Room buildings, the other follows the western margin of the Site to a large area of hardstanding, formerly a car park, and on to the north-eastern end of the Site, with the Powerhouse, store building, and, just beyond the Site boundary, a former Loco Shed.
- 1.2.6 The Pithead Baths and Locker Room, Lamp Room, and Canteen comprise a single conjoined structure, to which a later medical centre was appended. South of the Pithead Baths is the later 20th-century Main Office Block building. Northeast of the Lamp Room is the modern control room building. To the west of the Lamp Room are the Explosives and Radioactive Materials Store buildings. A little further west again is the Sewage Plant, now largely overgrown.
- 1.2.7 The location and layout of the Site as existing is shown on **Figure 11**.

2 METHODOLOGY

2.1 Aims and objectives

- 2.1.1 The aims of the Historic Building Recording excercise were to record and advance our understanding of the significance of the former colliery buildings on the Site prior to their demolition.
- 2.1.2 This report comprises a full visual record of the subject in accordance with the guidelines for a Photographic Survey as detailed in the document: *Understanding Historic Buildings:* A guide to good recording practice (Historic England (HE) 2016).
- 2.1.3 The assessment has been enhanced beyond the Historic England definition of a Photographic Survey, with the production of measured sketch plans for those buildings accessible. The record makes use of previously collated data from the Desk-Based Assessment prepared for the Site (CgMs 2019).



2.2 Methodology

2.2.1 The Historic Building Recording methodology is outlined in the approved Written Scheme of Investigation (WSI) for the works (RPS 2020). The Historic Building Recording comprises a photographic record and brief written account. This was achieved through documentary research and a photographic survey. A selection of photographs are included within this report as plates, the locations of which are located on sketch plans of the Site and its buildings (**Figures 11 – 21**). The complete photographic record, with location plans, is included as **Appendix 1**. The WSI is appended to this report, for reference, as **Appendix 2**

3 HISTORIC BACKGROUND

3.1 Introduction

3.1.1 Much of the following historic background for the Site is drawn from the previous Desk-Based Assessment prepared for the Site in 2019 by CgMs (now RPS; CgMs 2019), as well as two specific studies into the Site prepared by the Royal Commission on the Historical Monuments of England (RCHME) in 1993 and 1994 (RCHME 1993; 1994). The RCHME assessed the heritage value of several coal mines and other major industrial sites in the early 1990s in response to the pending closure of large parts of the coal mining industry, with a view to potential future protection of the most significant elements of this important national industry.

3.2 The coal industry

- 3.2.1 Coal mining has been a part of British industry since the Romano-British period. However, large scale production was not undertaken until the Industrial Revolution of the 19th century. This was, in part, due to technological advances of the 18th and 19th centuries, such as the Newcomen atmospheric pumping engine. Deep seam coal exploration became possible for the first time following this invention, as water could be adequately pumped from the mines, allowing for large scale coal mining. The development of the railways drove the demand for coal, as well as providing means to transport it across land.
- 3.2.2 Towards the end of the 19th century, into the 20th century, the coal industry entered a steady state of decline, reflecting the rise in electricity, gas, and oil within the fuel market. By the 1920s the government was encouraging the closure and merger of collieries to form larger, more efficient, entities (Gill 2016: 87). The ongoing government process of rationalisation led, in 1938, with effect from 1942, to the nationalisation of coal reserves. From 1947, the mines were nationalised as the National Coal Board (NCB) (*ibid.*). NCB continuously rationalised the coal mines within its authority, closing and merging unproductive mines, encouraging the development of new coal-fired power stations, and opening new open cast mines.
- 3.2.3 From the 1950s and 60s, the market shifted again, away from coal and towards oil, gas, and nuclear for electricity production, fuel and locomotion (Gill 2016: 87). The introduction of Clean Air legislation at this time presented a further disruption to the industry. The NCB continued their rationalisation, introducing mechanised coal extraction, with a focus on supplying coal power stations. Closures across the country continued apace with the shifting markets.
- 3.2.4 Rationalisation reached its peak in the 1980s and 90s, most notably in 1984. Margaret Thatcher's Conservative government announced plans to close 20 mines, with the loss of some 20,000 jobs, resulting in the miner's strike of 1984-5; a major industrial action, led by Arthur Scargill of the National Union of Mineworkers (NUM) to shut down the British coal



industry and prevent the closure of the collieries. The miners' strike has been recognised as the most bitter industrial dispute in British history, characterised by violence and hardship suffered by the picketed miners (BBC 2005). The strike ended in failure on 3rd March 1985; the Trade Unions were weakened, and the mines were closed. In 1987 the National Coal Board became British Coal Corporation. Soon after, in 1994, the few remaining mines were merged with RJB Mining to form UK Coal plc (later UK Coal). The industry had reduced from over 170 working mines in 1983, to only fifteen large mines by 1994, and only five by 2011, including Maltby Colliery. By 2015 the last remaining mines had been closed (Gill 2016: 87).

3.2.5 The contractions of the coal industry in the 1980s and early 1990s resulted in many historic sites being cleared before they could be documented (Historic England 2017).

3.3 Maltby Colliery

- 3.3.1 Historic mapping demonstrates that the area of the Site was formerly situated within, and formed a part of, an area of possible medieval woodland known as Maltby Ridings. The woodland was divided into smaller segments and quarters, with the Site area spanning the former Shoulder of Mutton Quarter to the southwest, and Stainton Quarter to the northeast. The Site remained thus until the early 20th century (**Figures 2-4**).
- 3.3.2 A minerals lease, for 60 years, was sealed between the 10th Earl of Scarborough, Aldred Frederick George Beresford Lumley, and the Sheepbridge Coal and Iron Company Ltd at the Maltby site, on 21st March 1904 (Jones 2017: 131). In 1906, Maltby Main Colliery Company was registered, and construction began on a new spur line from the South Yorkshire Joint Line. In 1907 site clearance began, with the construction of six temporary huts to accommodate the workforce (the Tin Town), and the sinking of the Number 1 Shaft, closely followed by the Number 2 Shaft. The railway was completed in the spring of 1908 (*ibid.*). Wholescale coal working commenced in 1911, working the Barnsley Seam at a depth of 747 metres (RCHME 1993: 1). The layout of the early colliery is shown in the 1929 and 1931 Ordnance Survey mapping (**Figures 5** and **6**). The Site retained only two of its original permanent surface buildings at the time of the survey, the Powerhouse and Locomotive shed.
- 3.3.3 The original colliery worked the Barnsley seam, recovering product suited to steam raising and domestic use. In addition, the colliery operated a coke works, with plant for by-products, which was decommissioned by 1930 (*ibid.*).
- 3.3.4 Reflecting the rationalisation and merger of companies through the early 20th century, Maltby Colliery, and the Maltby Main Colliery Company, soon came under the auspices of Amalgamated Denaby Collieries Limited, and by 1934 had been acquired by the Yorkshire Amalgamated Collieries Limited (*ibid.*). The planform of the Site is depicted unchanged through these acquisitions, with the Ordnance Survey mapping showing no change within the Site by 1938 (**Figure 7**).
- 3.3.5 As the site grew and expanded, a parallel growth occurred in the size and population of the town of Maltby; a staggering increase from a population of 716 in 1901, to 7,657 by 1921 (Jones 2017: 131). The settlement was provided with a new 'model village' in 1910, designed by Maurice Deavon, with more than 500 new houses constructed by 1912 to accommodate mine workers, along with recreational grounds and a new school (*ibid.*). Census records show workers moved to Maltby from across the UK, as well as Nova Scotia, Canada (*ibid.*).



- 3.3.6 In 1927 the colliery was provided with pithead baths, constructed by the Miner's Welfare Fund; these were amongst the first to be constructed by the fund (RCHME 1993: 2). By 1930, however, the baths were deemed inefficient and outdated. In 1937-8 therefore, the extant Pithead Baths and Locker building, with an attached Canteen, was constructed. The facilities were to a design by W. A. Woodland, in the Moderne style. The new facilities incorporated separate clean and dirty locker rooms, with heated steel lockers for the drying of pit clothes. The older baths were eventually demolished in 1958 (*ibid*.).
- 3.3.7 The existing Lamp Room building was constructed at a similar time, and in a similar style, being linked with the Pithead Baths at first-floor level. The structure was connected to a contemporaneous raised walkway, which provided direct access to the pithead, avoiding the busy colliery surface.
- 3.3.8 The new Pithead Baths and Lamp Room building are depicted on the 1950 Ordnance Survey mapping (**Figure 8**).
- 3.3.9 Nationalisation in 1946 saw the beginning of the end for hand-dug pits at Maltby, with a major programme of redevelopment and modernisation beginning in 1947 and lasting for over 12 years (NCHME 1993: 2). The redevelopment included modernisation of the Number 1 shaft, new coal preparation plant, rebuilding of the Number 2 pithead and pitbottom, and new Koepe winding towers with rope friction winders (*ibid*.). The two shafts were deepened to reach the Swallow Wood and Haigh Moor seams, situated 809 and 818 metres below the surface; these seams were not worked until after 1968, however (*ibid*.). By 1954 the first mechanised coalface machine, a Melco Moore power-loader, was put into use at Matlby. The extent and layout of the modernised colliery is shown on the 1962-70 Ordnance Survey mapping (**Figure 9**).
- 3.3.10 Where many collieries were closing in the 1980s, Maltby continued to operate, with extensive restructuring beginning in 1981, as part of 'The Parkgate Scheme' (RCHME 1993: 3): new buildings, modernisation, and the construction of a tower-mounted friction winder, modern coal washing plant, and a new Number 3 shaft, constructed to target the remaining Swallow Wood seam and deeper, unworked, Parkgate and Thorncliffe seams. The Parkgate and Thorncliffe seams are situated at a depth of 956 and 978 metres, respectively. The new shaft was nearly eight metres in diameter, one of the widest in the UK. The new winder was constructed in 1986 and was fitted with two four-rope Koepe winders, capable of lifting two 24.5 ton skips each; a first in the UK. The scheme included the construction of new stores and workshops. In October 1992 Maltby Colliery was included on the Government's list of mines for closure, but the pit was reprieved and in March 1993 was marked for development as a low cost mine (*ibid*.).
- 3.3.11 The site operated nearly continuously through until 2012, when unstable geological conditions, with excess water, gas and oil being encountered, necessitated its closure; the site was one of only a few collieries to survive the mass closures of Thatcherite Britain, and one of the last operating large-scale mines in the UK. Over 90% of coal produced at Maltby was going to electricity production by the time of its closure. The layout of the colliery around the time of its closure is shown on a site plan recovered during the survey on **Figure 10**; Buildings are numbered on the plan.
- 3.3.12 The majority of the former colliery buildings and infrastructure were demolished following the site's closure, with the shafts being sealed. The RCHME studies into the Maltby site identified a number of buildings of high and moderate significance, which were recommended for listing and recording or retention: two former Koepe winders and headgear were considered to be of high significance, while the horizontal engine house, fan



- house, Power House, steel lattice headgear, Lamp Room, Pithead Baths, raised footbridge, and washery were deemed to be of moderate interest (RCHME 1994). Of those buildings, only the Powerhouse, Lamp Room and Pithead Baths survive.
- 3.3.13 The remaining structures, which were the subject of this recording, range in date; the Powerhouse and Loco Shed are the oldest structures, dating to the 1900s, while the Pithead Baths and Locker Rooms and the Lamp Room were constructed between 1937 and 1938. The remaining structures are later in date, and are of lesser interest, but contribute to an understanding of the Site's historic development and function. The Site's present appearance and character is a far cry from that of the Colliery at the time of its closure, with the majority of its buildings and landscaping removed, including trees, plant beds, and walkways.
- 3.3.14 The site of the Former Maltby Colliery is recorded in the South Yorkshire Sites and Monuments Record (SMR): reference 04404/01.

4 BUILDING DESCRIPTIONS

4.1 Introduction

- 4.1.1 The Site, inclusive of the buildings recorded herein, has been subject to an earlier survey, with descriptions of the buildings, conducted in 1994 by the Royal Commission on the Historical Monuments of England (RCHME 1994). Below provides descriptions of the extant structures at the time of the survey, updating and adding to the previous RCHME survey.
- 4.1.2 **Figures 11 21** show the Site layout (**Figure 11**), detailed layouts (**Figures 12 14**), and detailed sketch plans of the former Powerhouse, Pithead Bath and Lockers, Lamp Room building, Canteen, and Main Office (**Figures 15 23**). External plate locations are shown on **Figures 12 14**, with internal plate locations on **Figures 15 23**. Plates are presented at the back of this report (**Plates 1 98**), ordered according to the following descriptions.

4.2 Powerhouse (NGR 455058, 392506)

- 4.2.1 The Powerhouse is labelled as Building 17 on **Figure 10**. The location and planform of the Powerhouse is shown on **Figures 11** and **12**. Detailed sketch plans of the building are presented on **Figures 15** and **16**. The building is shown in **Plates 1 29**.
- 4.2.2 The Powerhouse, dated 1909, is located to the northeast of the Site, and comprises one of only two original mining buildings extant at Maltby Colliery at the time of the survey; the other being the former Loco Shed located just outside the Site's northern boundary. The building is rectangular in plan, with a near full-height flat roofed two-by-one-bay lobby projection to the north end of its northeast elevation (**Plates 1** and **2**). At the south end of the northeast elevation is a low single-storey flat-roofed extension. A detailed description of the Powerhouse, prior to the demolition of the adjacent structures and plant with which it was associated, is included in the RCHME 1994 report (RCHME 1994: 19): the building was formerly attached to the Number 1 Shaft winding engine house.
- 4.2.3 The Powerhouse comprises a substantial red-brick building with a gable roof, and large arched window openings; the majority of which have been blocked up. The southwest and southeast elevations of the building, as it stood at the time of the survey, show evidence for repair/rebuilding, and for having been formerly abutted by earlier development; they lack the external facing and presentation of the building's northeast and northwest elevations.



- 4.2.4 The building's roofline features a raised ridge, which appears to have formerly been louvred for ventilation. The northwest end of the raised ridge coincides with a simple pediment, with stone coping, terminating the building's gable end. The northwest gable end rises proud of the roofline, and also feature stone copings. The long elevations feature a typical pier and panel design. To the northeast elevation the panels are emphasised with blue engineering brickwork. The same brickwork adds interest to the northwest gable end of the building, the roofline of the lobby, and the arches to windows. The southeast elevation features later corrugated siding and brickwork.
- 4.2.5 Sections of railway sidings were evident to the north of the Powerhouse, having been removed or buried elsewhere within the Site. The lines can be traced to the Loco Shed and former workshop to the north and east of the Powerhouse.
- 4.2.6 The interior of the Powerhouse comprises a large principal room, accessed via a lobby within the projecting bay to the north end of the northeast elevation. The lobby is a simple rectangular space, open to the principal room beyond, with a metal walkway situated above a plant well below (Plates 3 and 4). The principal room (Plates 5 and 6) comprised the main powerhouse floor, formerly fitted with extensive plant; now only part of a large boiler remains and the footings for removed apparatus (Plates 7 - 10). The room's walls are subdivided into an uneven array of panels between plain brick pilasters (Plate 11), which carry a travelling girder-mounted crane (Plate 12). The room's flooring is an admixture of solid concrete flooring, interspaced with metal sheeting (Plate 13). The sheet flooring is such that the layout and fittings of the room could be almost modular in nature, allowing for variances in function dependent on the requirements and evolution of powerhouse apparatus over time, as well as allowing ready access to subfloor spaces. Delineated walkways on the concrete flooring indicate the circulation flow on the work floor - though accumulated dirt masks much of the floor surface (Plate 14). Reminders that the space formerly comprised a powerhouse are constant: "Have You Used Your Dead Line Indicator" (e.g. Plate 15). At the south corner of the room is a large garage-bay, situated below the ground-floor level, and formerly accessed via a large opening; that opening has since been blocked with a large tank, formerly the water tank counterweight to the No.2 Shaft's winding tower (Plate 16). The room's roof is carried by large steel Howe trusses, and the roof is set with roof lights (Plate 17).
- 4.2.7 Three ancillary rooms, including ventilation plant rooms and a lobby/storage space are arrayed within the extension to the south of the northeast elevation, accessible via a single doorway from the south end of the principal room (**Plates 18 20**). Former switch panels have been stored in the first room/lobby (**Plate 21**). No plant remains in the ventilation plant rooms their function is suggested by the presence of a panel of filters and louvred ventilation (**Plate 22**).
- 4.2.8 An extensive, and largely inaccessible, cellar space, is situated beneath the building. The cellar is accessed via a straight flight of steel stairs, descending to the southwest, from adjacent to the boiler in the principal room (**Plates 23** and **24**). The cellar is subdivided by brick walls into a number of small, and entirely functional spaces: a store, corridors, and ducts for piping and cabling (e.g. **Plates 25 28**). Large concrete plinths provide support for plant in the room above. Pipework disseminates from the cellar via a covered service corridor to the southwest below the now demolished extensions southwest of the Powerhouse servicing the myriad functions of the former colliery (e.g. **Plate 29**).



4.3 The Pithead Baths and Locker Rooms (NGR 454991, 392357)

- 4.3.1 The Pithead Baths and Locker Rooms are labelled as Building 4 on **Figure 10**. The layout and location of the building is shown on **Figures 11**, **13**, **17-23**. The building is shown in **Plates 30 54**.
- 4.3.2 The Pithead Baths and Locker Rooms comprise the main central block of a series of conjoined structures, with the Lamp Room building to their northeast, Canteen to their southwest, and medical centre to their west. The buildings were constructed between 1937-8, to a design by W. A. Woodland.
- 4.3.3 The building is a substantial two storey structure, largely functional in design, though clearly reflecting the aesthetic of the contemporary Streamline Moderne style, with clean horizontal emphasis and fenestration (**Plates 30 32**). Constructed of stock brown bricks, with a steel-reinforced concrete frame, the building has a flat roof and 'Z'-shaped planform. To its eastern end is a tall water tower element, housing plant rooms to both floors; these rooms were not accessed due to the quantities of disturbed asbestos present. The tower adds interest to the building's form.
- 4.3.4 Circulation between floors is provided by two large staircases to the south and east ends of the building (**Plates 33** and **34**). The eastern stair is situated within a large lightwell, lit by four tall window openings, very much in the Moderne style. North of the eastern stair, the bath building continues a short way, before a break and passageway, with the Lamp Room beyond. The two buildings are connected by a corridor at first-floor level.
- 4.3.5 The building was originally constructed as a bath and locker room building; a use which was retained at ground floor level. At some time in the later 20th century the layout of the first floor was altered, with the insertion of stud and breezeblock partitions, to store and office use; housing officials, contractors and site office space (**Plates 35-40**). Nevertheless, the first floor remains broadly legible, with the original planform clearly mirroring that seen to the ground floor.
- 4.3.6 The ground floor retains two large locker rooms: the clean and dirty locker rooms (**Plates 41-45**. Each room is almost 30 metres in length, with many original lockers with integral benches being retained, particularly in the eastern (dirty) locker room. The lockers in the dirty locker room would have been used for drying pit clothes; the duct system which provided heated air to the lockers remains extant (**Plate 45**).
- 4.3.7 Off the southern (clean) locker room are a series of ancillary rooms, including a material lift, and reception room (**Plates 46** and **47**). Accessible off both locker rooms is a single large communal shower room, divided into bays, with a raised curb/walkway along its southern edge (**Plate 48**). Regular openings in the northeast wall of the shower room lead to the dirty locker room. Rooms feature glazed brickwork and / or tiles to their lower-level, and painted brickwork above. To the east of the shower room is a plant room this room was inaccessible due to asbestos contamination (**Plate 49**). East of the dirty locker room is a small lobby area (**Plate 50**), and a stairwell (**Plate 33**).
- 4.3.8 Within the short section of building north of the eastern stair are further shower rooms (**Plates 51** and **52**). These shower rooms are smaller, more private, and were likely being reserved for officials or contractors. The first floor of this part of the building comprises the corridor linking the building to the Lamp Room (**Plates 53** and **54**). The corridor is well lit by a gabled skylight above and features paired doorways at either end. Two small offices are situated to the west side of the corridor (**Plate 55**).



4.4 Lamp Room (NGR 455029, 392370)

- 4.4.1 The Lamp Room building is labelled as Building 18 on **Figure 10**. The layout of the Lamp Room building is shown **Figures 11**, **13**, **17-19**. The building is shown in **Plates 56 72**.
- 4.4.2 The Lamp Room building is situated to the northeast of the baths, to which it is connected by a corridor at first-floor level (**Plates 53** and **54**). The building was likely constructed in the late 1930s.
- 4.4.3 The Lamp Room building is the most architecturally distinguished surviving element of this part of the Site, with an oversailing first-floor level and an exposed concrete frame (**Plates 56 58**). The Streamline Moderne is most clearly expressed in this structure, with horizontality emphasised in the projecting upper storey, which has curved corners, by the painted concrete frame and high-set narrow window openings. The building was originally open at ground-floor level, but has been subsequently converted, with a haphazard array of brick and cement-block walls; to form stores, a rescue room, fire station, and a plant room (**Plates 59 61**).
- 4.4.4 The building features a mid-floor, accessed by two external stairs, which houses a series of office rooms with later 20th-century stud wall partitions (**Plates 62 64**). This mezzanine floor is a later 20th-century insertion, formed during the infilling of the open ground-floor level.
- 4.4.5 The Lamp Room itself is situated at first-floor level, having formerly led to a raised walkway to the pithead, which has since been demolished leaving a truncated projection from the building's north-eastern end (**Plates 65** and **66**).
- 4.4.6 The interior of the Lamp Room is a bright, modern, space, lit by a central gabled skylight carried by steel trusses (**Plates 67** and **68**). A corridor runs around the outer edge of the Lamp Room (**Plate 69**), though later walls have been inserted within the western corridor to form small stores. Smaller rooms are situated at either end of the main Lamp Room, as well as two later stud-wall insertions on its eastern side. To the eastern side of the room is a large lamp rack (**Plate 70**). Safety notices and reminders proliferate on the approach to the pit head; reminders to self-search, check gear, to not carry lighters or cigarettes, and to not urinate in the gutters (**Plate 71**). The rooms at either end include a small workshop or distribution room, and a room retaining what appears to be part of a former turn-style (**Plate 72**), formerly leading through a now blocked doorway to the pithead walkway.

4.5 Canteen (NGR 454957, 392338)

- 4.5.1 The building is labelled as Building 4 on **Figure 2**. The location and layout of the Canteen is shown on **Figures 11, 13** and **22**. The building is shown in **Plates 73** and **74**.
- 4.5.2 The Canteen comprises a single-storey structure appended to the south-western end of the Pithead Baths and Locker Room building. The structure features a later 20th-century extension to its southern end, which appears contemporaneous with the medical centre and Main Office Building.
- 4.5.3 The Canteen is constructed of brown stock bricks and is styled alike with the adjacent baths building; functional, in the Moderne style (**Plate 73**). The building features a series of large windows to its southeast, arrayed contiguously to form a single large horizontal opening. The interior of the building features modern bathroom and kitchen space, with a dining room floor (**Plate 74**). A series of columns add interest to the dining room floor and carry the ceiling above.



4.6 Medical Block (NGR 454951, 392355)

- 4.6.1 The building is labelled as Building 1 on **Figure 10**. The location and plan of the building is shown on **Figures 11, 13** and **22**. The building is shown in **Plate 75**.
- 4.6.2 The Medical Block comprises a single-storey extension to the west side of the Pithead Baths and Locker Room building (**Plate 75**). Constructed in the 1960s or '70s, the building appears to supersede an earlier structure shown on historic mapping within its footprint. The building is of brown-brick, with a flat roof. Internally, the building is unornamented, with brick partition walls and concrete flooring.

4.7 Main Office Building (NGR 454974, 392320)

- 4.7.1 The building is labelled as Building 3 on **Figure 10**. The location and plan of the building is shown on **Figures 11, 13** and **22**. The building is shown in **Plates 76 78**.
- 4.7.2 The Main Office Building was constructed in the later 20th century, not appearing on historic mapping until after the 1970s. The building is of no architectural interest; a blocky brown-brick two-storey structure, which functioned as an office building (**Plate 76**). The interior is characterised by plain walls, large window openings, and asbestos tile flooring (**Plates 77** and **78**). A glazed lobby was located to the building's southeast. Modern showers and changing rooms are located on both floors, ancillary to the building's primary function.

4.8 Control Room Building (NGR 455053, 392379)

- 4.8.1 The building is labelled as Building 11 on **Figure 10**. The location and plan of the building is shown on **Figures 11** and **13**. The building is shown in **Plate 79**.
- 4.8.2 The Control Room Building is situated to the northeast of the Pithead Baths and Locker Building. The building is rectangular, single storied, and flat-roofed (**Plate 79**). Purely functional in design, lacking ornamentation, the building is constructed of brown brick, and dates to the late 20th century.

4.9 Explosives Store and Radioactive Materials Store (NGR 455009, 392403)

- 4.9.1 The buildings are labelled as Buildings 25 and 26 on **Figure 10**. The locations and plans of the buildings are shown on **Figures 11** and **13**. The buildings are shown in **Plates 80** and **81**.
- 4.9.2 Both structures are located approximately 20 metres northwest of the Lamp Room building. Both structures are mid-20th-century in date, having been constructed by 1962.
- 4.9.3 The Explosives store is a simple squat rectangular brick building with a flat roof, orientated northwest to southeast (**Plate 80**). Reinforced doors provide access these were locked at the time of the visit. The southwest side of the building has been reinforced with large cement-block buttresses.
- 4.9.4 The Radioactive Materials Store is a plain brick building, with a flat concrete roof (**Plate 81**). The building is setback behind a concrete post-and-wire fence, protected by barbed wire.

4.10 Sewage Plant (NGR 454964, 392427)

4.10.1 The Sewage Plant is labelled as Building 12 on **Figure 10**. The location and plan of the sewage plant is shown on **Figures 11** and **13**. The Sewage Plant is shown in **Plate 82**.



4.10.2 The colliery featured its own onsite sewage treatment plant – located 150 metres northwest of the Pithead Baths, to the west of the Explosives Store. The plant is dug down into a pit, with brick sides and a metal walkway (**Plate 82**). Stairs descend to the pit from its northeast side, adjacent to a brick-built structure. Northeast of the pit are further apparatus and structures, including a large tank; these are now largely overgrown.

4.11 Loco Shed (NGR 455052, 392620)

- 4.11.1 The Loco Shed is labelled as Building 10 on **Figure 10**. The location and external planform of the building is shown on **Figures 11** and **12**. The building and associated sidings are depicted in **Plates 83** and **86**.
- 4.11.2 The Loco Shed is situated just outside the Site's northern boundary, approximately 85 metres north of the Powerhouse. The building's surroundings are heavily overgrown, with only the main carriage entrance remaining clear of growth (**Plate 83**). Remnant sidings run south from the building towards the Powerhouse (**Plate 84**). The building's interior comprises a single shed room, with small flat-roofed ancillary rooms to its northeast (**Plate 85** and **86**).
- 4.11.3 The structure is long and rectangular, of brick construction in the same pier and panel design as the Powerhouse, with a gable roof carried by steel trusses. The roofline features a raised ridge, with ventilation to the interior. The building's carriage entrance is set within an arched opening.

4.12 The Gatehouse, Workshop and Former Store buildings

- 4.12.1 The Gatehouse, Workshop and Former Store buildings date to the 1990s and are of limited historic or architectural interest, nevertheless they contribute to our understanding of the Site as a whole. These structures will be retained within the proposed development. Their locations are shown on **Figures 11**, **12**, and **14**. The buildings are depicted in **Plates 87 89**.
- 4.12.2 The Gatehouse building is located towards at the Site entrance, at NGR 454840, 392168: Building 13 on **Figure 10**. The building is an unremarkable single-storey structure of red brick, which functions as a weighbridge and security office (**Plate 87**). The weighbridge is located just south of the building.
- 4.12.3 The Former Store is located to the southeast side of the Site at NGR 454973, 392240: Building 36 on **Figure 10**. The building comprises a warehouse-style structure of red brick with metal sheet roof and siding above (**Plate 88**).
- 4.12.4 The Workshop is a similar structure to the Former Store; a large warehouse with brick walls and a large sheet roof above (**Plate 89**). The building is located at the north-eastern end of the Site, northeast of the Powerhouse, at NGR 455102, 392574: Building 15 on **Figure 10**.

4.13 Signage and graffiti

- 4.13.1 Examples of signage, graffiti, and paraphernalia at Maltby Colliery are depicted in **Plates 90 98**.
- 4.13.2 Signage is a prominent part of the Maltby Colliery experience which often evokes the harsh reality of life at the Site. For example, within the locker rooms and pithead baths there are frequent details of charges for theft of shower fixings and notices that medical syringes are not allowed. One sign within the showers reads (**Plate 90**):

4.13.3 Safety and cleanliness is hammered home with painful regularity at the Site: "Please use the bins provided, not the tops of lockers", "Please put your rubbish in the bins provided", "YOU are responsible for safety at Maltby" (Plate 91), "531 days since the last major incident" (Plate 92), "Have YOU searched yourself before going underground today" (Plate 71). Printed large in the Lamp Room are further iterations, including:

Make safety your top priority
All accidents are avoidable
Look, listen learn, prevent
Think safety
Be safe
Your life could depend on it

- 4.13.4 In the Lamp Room, signage above the gutter to the corridors around the room read "Stop using as a toilet, use the toilets provided downstairs" and "Do not use these drains as toilets. Use the ones down the stairwells. Thanks" (Plate 93).
- 4.13.5 The more oppressive signage is often morbidly juxtaposed with cheerful corporate slogans: "Your BRIGHT IDEAS Make Profits" is located in the walkway to the Lamp Room, alongside "Thieves will be prosecuted" (Plate 94). At the opposite end of the walkway a salvage price list "Pick it Don't kick it" lists the price paid for salvaged materials, alongside a reminder "Do Not Forget To Go And Have Your Chest-X-Ray" (Plate 95). Other signs remind that "Quality... it's our top priority" (Plate 96).
- 4.13.6 Graffiti is relatively frequent in the locker rooms (**Plate 97**), with further evidence of humour displayed by a gorilla teddy, carrying a large tub, suspended from the light fixings at the southern end of the same room (**Plate 98**).

5 CONCLUSION

5.1 Discussion

5.1.1 The majority of the former colliery buildings and infrastructure were demolished following the closure of the colliery site, with the shafts being sealed. The previous RCHME studies into the Maltby site identified a number of buildings of high and moderate significance, which were recommended for listing and recording or retention: two former Koepe winders and headgear were considered to be of high significance, while the horizontal engine house, fan house, Powerhouse, steel lattice headgear, Lamp Room, Pithead Baths, raised walkway, and washery were deemed to be of moderate interest (RCHME 1994). Of those buildings, only the Powerhouse, Lamp Room and Pithead Baths survived; these buildings have been recorded within this report – but their significance and historic setting has been greatly eroded by the loss of the other significant elements of the Site, of which no permanent record was made prior to their demolition.



5.1.2 The remaining structures, which were the subject of this recording, range in date; the Powerhouse and Loco Shed are the oldest structures, dating to 1900s, while the conjoined Pithead Baths and Locker Rooms, Canteen, and the Lamp Room were constructed during the 1930s The remaining structures are later in date, and are of lesser interest, but contribute to an understanding of the Site's historic function.

6 STORAGE AND CURATION

6.1 Archive







Ground Floor - Powerhouse, with internal photo locations









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1 INTRODUCTION

1.1 Site Location and Description

- 1.1.1 The development site lies to the north of Tickhill Road (A631) to the east of Maltby.
- 1.1.2 It comprises approximately 11 hectares of land centred at NGR SK 549 923, and forms part of the former Maltby colliery pit yard.

1.2 Planning Background

- 1.2.1 An application was made to Rotherham Metropolitan Borough Council in April 2019 seeking planning permission for *Demolition of some buildings on site and proposed use of land and buildings for plant, machinery and equipment auction scheme and erection of check-in building, construction of 3.1m display ramp, 2.4m fencing and 6 x 10m lighting columns, all for a 27 year period.* Application ref RB2019/0639.
- 1.2.2 Planning permission was granted by Rotherham Council in October 2019.
- 1.2.3 Condition 11 of the consent relates to the archaeological impact of the development, and requires implementation of a programme of archaeological works:
 - 11: No development, including any demolition and groundworks, shall take place until the applicant, or their agent or successor in title, has submitted a Written Scheme of Investigation (WSI) that sets out a strategy for archaeological investigation and this has been approved in writing by the Local Planning Authority. The WSI shall include:
 - The programme and method of site investigation and recording.
 - The requirement to seek preservation in situ of identified features of importance.
 - The programme for post-investigation assessment.
 - The provision to be made for analysis and reporting.
 - The provision to be made for publication and dissemination of the results.
 - The provision to be made for deposition of the archive created.
 - Nomination of a competent person/persons or organisation to undertake the works.
 - The timetable for completion of all site investigation and post-investigation works.

Thereafter the development shall only take place in accordance with the approved WSI and the development shall not be brought into use until the Local Planning Authority has confirmed in writing that the requirements of the WSI have been fulfilled or alternative timescales agreed."

Reason:

To ensure that any archaeological remains present, whether buried or part of a standing building, are investigated and a proper understanding of their nature, date, extent and significance gained, before those remains are damaged or destroyed and that knowledge gained is then disseminated.

1.2.4 In discussion with the Council's archaeological advisors, South Yorkshire Archaeology Service (SYAS), it has been confirmed that the programme of site investigation and recording should focus on recording of the surviving former colliery buildings.

1.3 Archaeological Background

- 1.3.1 The known archaeological background to the development site area was reviewed in an archaeological desk-based assessment commissioned to accompany the planning application (CgMs 2019).
- 1.3.2 The desk-based study confirmed that the archaeological interest within the development site related primarily to the former Maltby Main Colliery. The heritage significance of the colliery principally related to the evidence it demonstrated for technological development of coal winding through the 20th Century. However following the colliery's closure in 2012 most of the above-ground buildings within the site, including those of greatest heritage interest, have been demolished. This has significantly reduced the significance of the colliery as a heritage asset.
- 1.3.3 This assessment established that the local area around the current site has a low/moderate potential for the presence of other below-ground archaeological assets. However within the current site, the 20th century colliery development has significantly reduced the likelihood that any earlier assets will have survived, and the assessment concluded that the site has a negligible potential for the presence of any archaeological evidence pre-dating the Maltby Main Colliery.

1.4 Scope of Document

- 1.4.1 This document forms a Written Scheme of Investigation to meet the requirements of Condition 11 of the planning permission.
- 1.4.2 It details a programme of archaeological work to record the former colliery buildings on the site prior to their demolition; analysis and reporting of findings, and archiving of project data.
- 1.4.3 This WSI will be submitted to South Yorkshire Archaeology Service (SYAS), specialist archaeological advisors to Rotherham Metropolitan Borough Council, for technical review, and submitted to the Borough Council for approval in line with the requirements of Condition 11.
- 1.4.4 The archaeological work will be undertaken by a professional team from Wessex Archaeology, a Chartered Institute for Archaeologists (CIfA) Registered Archaeological Organisation (RAO). Wessex's work will be directed by RPS.
- 1.4.5 This WSI has been prepared jointly by RPS and Wessex Archaeology, and presents the strategy and methodology by which the team will undertake the archaeological works.

1.5 Aims and Standards

- 1.5.1 The aim of the programme of archaeological works will be to record and advance our understanding of the significance of the former colliery buildings on the site prior to their demolition.
- 1.5.2 This WSI It has been designed in accordance with current best archaeological practice and the appropriate national and regional standards and guidelines including:
 - Management of Archaeological Projects (English Heritage, 1991) and MoRPHE (English Heritage 2006);
 - Code of Conduct (Chartered Institute for Archaeology, updated 2014);
 - Standard and Guidance for the Archaeological Investigation and Recording of Standing Buildings or Structures (Chartered Institute for Archaeologists, 2014, updated 2019);
 - Understanding Historic Buildings: a Guide to Good Recording Practice (Historic England, 2016).

2 STRATEGY

- 2.1 In keeping with discussions and informal scoping advice received from SYAS in October 2019, the programme of archaeological works will require a Historic England (HE) photographic survey of the extant buildings set for demolition.
- 2.2 The work required will include a comprehensive photographic record of the buildings with accompanying sketch plans to locate the photographic record.
- 2.3 Recording will focus on the extant early and mid-20th century buildings which are to be demolished (highlighted in purple on Figure 2):
 - Power House ('17' on Figure 2)
 - Canteen (2)
 - Pithead Baths & Locker Rooms (4)
 - Lamp Room (5)
 - Main Office Block (3)
 - Sewage Plant (48)
 - ancillary Explosives Store and Radioactive Materials Store
- 2.4 A basic record will be made of the other generic 1990s century structures which are to be retained or altered:
 - Security / Gatehouse building (12)
 - Workshop (15)
 - Former Stores (36)
- 2.5 A **written report** will be prepared following the recording fieldwork. The report will detail the findings of the archaeological recording. Copies of the report will be deposited with the South Yorkshire Sites and Monuments Record and with the ADS OASIS
- 2.6 The project data will be ordered into an **archive** and deposited with Rotherham Archives to ensure the long-term preservation of the archaeological information.
- 2.7 Any variations to this strategy will be discussed and agreed with SYAS on behalf of the LPA prior to their implementation.

3 METHODS STATEMENT

PREPARED BY WESSEX ARCHAEOLOGY

3.1 Historic building recording

Documentary research

3.1.1 Comprehensive documentary research will be undertaken at Rotherham Archives and Local Studies. This research will add to that previously undertaken as part of the Archaeological Desk-Based Assessment and will establish an understanding of the development and historical context of the Site, and obtain any relevant historical plans or photographs of the buildings subject to the recording works. The work will also include a map regression exercise.

Photography

- 3.1.2 A photographic record will be compiled of the extant buildings identified for demolition within the Site which will include:
 - a general view or views of the buildings in their wider setting or landscape;
 - the buildings' external appearance. Typically captured in a series of oblique views to show all external elevations of the buildings, and give an overall impression of their size and shape. Where individual elevations include complex historical information, views at right-angles to the plane of the elevation may also be taken;
 - further views to reflect the original design intentions of the buildings or architect, if
 considered necessary, where these are known from documentary sources or can be
 inferred from documentary sources or can be inferred from the building or its setting;
 - the overall appearance of the principal rooms and circulation areas;
 - any external or internal detail, structural or decorative, which is relevant to the buildings' design, development and use, with scale where appropriate;
 - any machinery or other plant, or evidence for its former existence;
 - any dates or other inscriptions; any signage, makers' plates, graffiti which contribute to an understanding of the buildings. A transcription will be made wherever characters are difficult to interpret;
 - any building contents which have a significant bearing on the buildings' history; and
 - copies of maps, drawings, views and photographs present in the buildings and illustrating their development or that of the site.
- 3.1.3 A basic photographic record will be compiled of the other 1990s structures which will be retained or converted within the scheme. This will comprise solely:
 - a general view or views of the buildings in their wider setting or landscape;
- 3.1.4 A photographic scale of an appropriate size will be included in all detailed views, where possible. The location and direction of the photographic views will be recorded on either copies of any 'as existing' plans supplied by the client, or sketch plans produced by Wessex Archaeology during the recording works. Accompanying photographic registers will record, as a minimum, the direction of the view and a brief description of the subject and location.

- 3.1.5 The full photographic record, together with annotated sketch plans and photographic registers, form part of the project archive. Selected images from the photographic record may be used to illustrate the report, although the full photographic record (with the exception of duplicated views) will be included as part of the final report. The report figures will include plans showing the location of photographic plates used in the report.
- 3.1.6 General photographs will be taken using a 35 mm SLR camera with black-and-white film. The photographs will then be printed at 6" x 4". Detail photographs of structural elements will if possible be taken with a camera with perspective control. All detail photographs will contain a graduated photographic scale of appropriate dimensions wherever possible. A two metre ranging rod, discretely positioned, will be included in a selection of general shots, sufficient to independently establish the scale of all elements of the structures.
- 3.1.7 All record photographs will be black-and-white, using conventional silver-based film only, such as Ilford FP4 or HP5, or Delta 400 Pro (a recent replacement for HP5 in certain film sizes such as 220).
- 3.1.8 Digital photography will be used in addition to, but will not form part of, the formal archive created. The digital record will comprise high-quality digital format taken with a Canon EOS 5D MkII full frame digital camera (with 21 megapixel capability). All photography will comply with Historic England guidance (Historic England 2015 and 2016).
- 3.1.9 A photographic register will be maintained detailing (as a minimum) location, direction and subject of shot; a separate photographic register will be maintained for digital photographs. The position and direction of each photograph will be noted on a copy of a plan, which will also be marked with a north pointer.

- 3.1.10 A written record will be made of the buildings subject to recording commensurate with the requirements of the Historic England photographic survey (HE 2016) and will comprise:
 - the buildings' location (NGR and address);
 - a note of any statutory designations; and
 - the date when the record was made, the names of recorder(s) and the location of any archive material.

Drawn record

3.1.11 The drawn record, in line with Historic England guidelines, will comprise the utilisation of existing plans, should they be provided, in order to locate the photographic record. If these do not exist for the buildings, then sketch plans will be produced on site and reproduced in the report. No further measure survey will form part of the recording works.

3.2 Reporting Methods

General

3.2.1 Following the completion of the archive and documentary research, and on-site survey work, a report will be produced. This will be submitted to the Client, and SYAS for comment.

- 3.2.2 Once approved, the final report will be formally issued as a full digital pdf copy. Copies will also be deposited with the South Yorkshire Sites and Monuments Record, for which a hard copy can be supplied upon request.
- 3.2.3 The report will include the following elements:

3.2.4 An OASIS online record (http://oasis.ac.uk/pages/wiki/Main) will be created, with key fields completed, and a .pdf version of the final report submitted. Subject to any contractual requirements on confidentiality, copies of the OASIS record will be integrated into the relevant local and national records and published through the Archaeology Data Service ArchSearch catalogue.

3.3 Archive Storage and Curation

- 3.3.1 Arrangements will be made with Rotherham Archives for the deposition of the historic building record archive.
- 3.3.2 The project archive will be prepared to the appropriate nationally recommended standards (SMA 1995; AAF 2011; ClfA 2014), and following any specific guidelines issued by Rotherham Archives.

Security copy

3.3.3 In line with current best practice (e.g. Brown 2011), on completion of the project a security copy of the written records will be prepared, in the form of a digital PDF/A file. PDF/A is an ISO-standardised version of the Portable Document Format (PDF) designed for the digital preservation of electronic documents through omission of features ill-suited to long-term archiving.


Site Location Figure 1














Pithead Baths and Lockers, Lamp Room building, and other buildings, with external plate locations












Ground Floor - Lamp Room Building and northeast of Pithead Baths and Lockers, with internal plate locations Figure 17




Mezzanine Floor - Lamp Room Building Offices, with internal plate locations




First Floor - Lamp Room and northeast of Pithead Baths and Lockers, with internal plate locations








Plate 18: Powerhouse, storage room overview, facing northwest towards ventilation plant rooms




Plate 22: Powerhouse, ventilation plant room filter

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


Plate 23: Powerhouse, cellar stairs to principal room, facing southeast




Plate 24: Powerhouse, cellar stairs to principal room, facing east




Plate 38: Pithead Baths, first flo $\,$, blocked openings in corridor, facing west




Plate 40: Pithead Baths, first flo $\,$, plantroom viewed from doorway, facing southwest

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






Plate 60: Lamp Room, ground floo , store, facing west
