Synopsis:

In response to the requirements of planning permission and a diocesan faculty, the Heritage Network was commissioned to implement a scheme of archaeological monitoring during the construction of an extension to Church of St. Mary The Virgin, Church Street, Ware, Hertfordshire.

It was considered that the present investigation had the potential to contribute to an understanding of the development of the present church at Ware.

No archaeological features or deposits were revealed during the groundworks. This was reflects the small area of deep excavation and a substantial degree of disturbance by modern services.

1. Introduction

- 1.1 This report has been prepared at the request of Michael Dales Partnership Ltd., acting on behalf of Ware Parochial Church Council, to cover a programme of archaeological work carried out as part of the construction of an extension to Church of St. Mary The Virgin, Church Street, Ware, Hertfordshire.
- 1.2 The planning consent for the extension (ref: 3/10/0660/FP) granted by East Hertfordshire District Council (EHDC), was subject to an archaeological condition issued in line with the Department of Communities and Local Government's *Planning Policy Statement* 5 (PPS5). The investigation was also a requirement of the Diocesan faculty for the development.
- 1.3 The extent and nature of the archaeological works has been set out in a *Brief for Archaeological Investigation, Recording and Reporting at the Church of St Mary, Ware, Hertfordshire* prepared by the Diocesan Archaeological Adviser (DAA), with the agreement of the Hertfordshire Historic Environment Unit (HEU).
- 1.4 The site is located in the core of Ware, centred on NGR 535670 214445. The churchyard is bounded by Church Street to the north and west, properties fronting on West Street to the south, and nos.1-12 Tudor Square, and 1-12 Tudor Walk to the east. The development involves the construction of an extension to the entrance lobby of the church hall, and the creation of disabled parking.
- 1.5 The present report describes the findings of the monitoring programme and is intended, together with the deposit of the project archive with Ware Museum, to complete the requirements of the EHDC and of the Diocese.

2. Fieldwork

TOPOGRAPHY AND GEOLOGY

- 2.1 The study area is located within the churchyard, immediately to the south of St. Mary's Church (Figure 2). The site lies on level ground in the valley of the River Lea at approximately 36m AOD.
- 2.2 Locally, the soils are of the Hanslope association (411d) described as "Slowly permeable calcareous clayey soils" over Chalky Till (SSEW 1983). The underlying geology consists of superficial deposits of Sand and Gravel over Chalk Bedrock (www.bgs.ac.uk/opengeoscience).

METHODOLOGY

- 2.3 The timetable for the fieldwork followed the client's groundwork schedule. A number of site visits were made to supervise the excavation of foundation trenches.
- 2.4 The machining was undertaken using a mini digger fitted with a 0.45m wide toothed bucket. In some areas of the extension footing, hand digging was employed to avoid damaging existing services.
- 2.5 All human remains encountered during the project were rapidly assessed on site for age at death, sex and any sign of obvious pathology. As none of the remains encountered were of archaeological or osteological importance they were not removed from the site. Following Church of England / English Heritage guidelines they were handed to the churchwarden for reburial in an appropriate location (Church of England 2005).
- 2.6 All work followed the published DAC Brief, and was carried out both in accordance with the Written Scheme of Investigation, and with current standards and guidance published by the Church of England and English Heritage, the Institute for Archaeologists, and the Diocese of St Albans.

MONITORING AND RECORDING

- 2.7 The deepest excavations on the site were the footings for the extension to the lobby of the Church Hall. These revealed a stratigraphic sequence that began with at least 0.10m of yellowish brown (10YR 5/6) silty sand natural with moderate chalk flecks. Above this was 0.70m of dark greyish brown (10YR 4/2) sandy silt with frequent brick, tile, stone and cement fragments. The majority of the site was covered by 0.20m of black (10YR 2/1) sandy silt topsoil with frequent stones.
- 2.8 A service trench was excavated from the southeast corner of the Church Hall, along the southeast and east sides, to the north of the building. This trench was excavated to a maximum depth of 0.45m and exposed topsoil and the upper part of the graveyard soil below. No archaeological features or deposits were revealed during the groundworks.
- 2.9 A small quantity of disarticulated human bone was recovered from the excavation, including rib, humerus and tibia fragments. All appeared to come from mature adults, but the bones were incomplete and undiagnostic. A fragment of a post-medieval iron coffin handle was also recovered. The human remains, and accompanying artefacts, were reburied on site.
- 2.10 For reasons outside the control of the Heritage Network, works on the disabled parking space was not monitored. It is understood, however, that these works did not extend to a depth greater than that of the pre-existing 'grasscrete' blocks in this area.

3. Discussion

HISTORICAL AND ARCHAEOLOGICAL CONTEXT

- 3.1 St Mary's Church and its churchyard lie in a well documented archaeological landscape which includes evidence for human activity from the Mesolithic onwards. Ware developed as a small town in the Roman period, focused on the crossing of the river Lea by Ermine Street, and by the time of the Domesday Survey in 1087, a substantial village appears to have been in existence, focused on Baldock Street.
- 3.2 The Domesday Survey indicates the presence of a priest which may, in turn, indicate the presence of an early church; this appears to be confirmed in a charter from William the Conqueror, dated 1081, granting permission to Hugh de Grandmesnil to bequeath the church and lands at Ware to the Abbey of St Evroul in Normandy for the foundation of a priory (Page 1971). The location of the priory is uncertain, though it may lie directly to the north of the present churchyard, on the site of the Old Rectory (now known as the Manor House) (Bryant et al, 1998).
- 3.3 The present church dates from the 13th century, although most of the surviving fabric is of 14th and 15th century date, with some 19th century restoration (Listed Buildings On-line). An evaluation, carried out in 1978 at the north-eastern corner of the church, anticipating the location of a proposed church hall, exposed a total of 14 burials with a probable date range of 1550-1850. No burials were found which might have been associated with the earliest phase of the present church, and no structures or sign of earlier buildings were seen (Borrill, 1979).
- 3.4 A further evaluation, carried out in 1980 in the footprint of the present church hall and its associated car-park, showed a similar density of burials but also identified the base of a pit containing pottery of mid to late 13th century date. This pit was located in the footprint of the church hall lobby (Borrill 1982).

CONCLUSIONS

- 3.5 It was considered that the present investigation had the potential to contribute to an understanding of the development of the present church at Ware.
- 3.6 No archaeological features or deposits were revealed during the groundworks and only a small quantity of disarticulated bone was recovered. This was reflects the small area of deep excavation and a substantial degree of disturbance by modern services.

Confidence Rating

3.7 Conditions on site were generally acceptable for the identification and recording of any potential archaeological remains, and as such there are no circumstances which would lead to a confidence rating for the work which was less than *High*.

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
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
