Summary of fieldwork results:

As the result of an archaeological condition on the planning permission for the construction of a new extension at Letchworth Hall Hotel, Letchworth, Herts, the Heritage Network was commissioned by the owners to monitor the groundworks.

The present project formed a second stage of works at Letchworth Hall Hotel, following the construction of a new leisure centre in 2002/3. Much of the present site, which links the leisure centre with the existing hotel buildings, had been disturbed by earlier construction and drainage works, as well as landscaping. A few features were revealed during the groundworks, including the remains of a brick wall, a sand-filled rectangular feature of uncertain function, two pottery dumps, and a large bottle dump. The combined projects suggest that the study area lay outside the focus of the medieval moated complex.

1. Introduction

- 1.1 This report has been prepared on behalf of *Letchworth Hall Hotel Ltd* as part of a programme of archaeological monitoring of development groundworks located in the grounds of Letchworth Hall Hotel, Letchworth, Herts. The planning permission for the development (ref. 00/01490/1), granted by the North Hertfordshire District Council (NHDC), was subject to a standard condition which required the implementation of a programme of archaeological work in accordance with a written scheme of investigation which had been approved by the planning authority. The condition has been met by following the provisions set out in the *Design Brief for Archaeological Monitoring and Recording* prepared by the County Archaeology Office (CAO) of Hertfordshire County Council, acting as advisers to the planning authority (ref. SB 13/09/01). The work followed the specification set out in the Heritage Network's approved Project Design dated December 2001.
- 1.2 The site lies on land sloping to the south-west, between the 75 and 80m contours (Fig.1). The development area covers approximately 217m² was formerly occupied by landscaped gardens. The underlying geology is formed of chalky boulder clay.
- 1.3 The first phase of the development involved the construction of a new health and fitness centre incorporating a swimming pool, together with a new access road and car-park. The results of the monitoring of groundworks on this phase has been previously reported (Heritage Network report no. 185, March 2003). The present phase of development has seen the construction of a building to link the leisure centre with the existing Alington Suite of the hotel.
- 1.4 The site is located in a documented historic landscape which includes recorded sites of prehistoric, Roman and medieval date. It forms part of Archaeological Area 90 (AA90) in the District Local Plan (No.2, July 1993), which defines the medieval and post-medieval village of Letchworth. The site may form the centre of the pre-Norman manor of Letchworth, and the present Letchworth Hall incorporates structural evidence which dates to the 15th century. St Mary's Church, which lies just outside the hotel grounds to the north, is 12th century in date.
- 1.5 The aim of the monitoring programme has been to identify and record any archaeological features and deposits which may have been uncovered, and to retrieve artefactual and ecofactual elements which would allow the date, character, and significance of the site to be assessed in accordance with current regional research agenda (Brown and Glazebrook, 2000), and subject to the limitations of reasonable safety and practicality.

2. Fieldwork

Initial Ground reduction

- 2.1 The ground reduction was undertaken with a tracked 360° excavator fitted with a 1.80m toothless bucket. The ground was reduced by approximately 0.20m at the western end and 0.30m at the eastern end.
- 2.2 A trial hole, which measured 2.65m in length, 1.65m in width and 1.62m in depth was excavated adjacent to the hotel wall. The stratigraphy consisted of dark olive brown (2.5Y 3/3), sandy silty topsoil with frequent chalk, brick/tile, charcoal and flint inclusions and some modern glass over a dark brown (10YR 3/3), silty, clay subsoil with similar inclusions. This lay over yellowish/brown (10YR 5/6) sand, below which was a layer of brownish yellow (10YR 6/6) sand.
- 2.3 A line of frogged red bricks, orientated east to west was observed in the western part of the area [02]. The bricks [01] measured approximately 180 x 100 x 60mm (6 x 3 x 2½nches). The feature was one course wide and at least 2m long.
- 2.4 To the east of the brick line was a sub-rectangular feature [04] which was 2.80m long, 0.50m wide at the eastern end and 0.90m wide at the western end. The fill [03] consisted of yellowish sand with no datable artefacts.
- 2.5 A pottery dump [06], which measured approximately 0.50m in diameter and 0.10m in depth, was revealed by heavy machine tracking during later groundworks. Although there was no defined cut to this feature the matrix consisted of dark yellowish brown (10YR 3/4), sandy, silty clay [05]. The pottery sherds consisted of large fragments of brown glazed ware, probably from a modern century serving platter. Associated with the sherds were poultry bones.

Foundation pads

2.6 Ten foundation pads and a lift pit were excavated. Although no archaeological features were revealed, artefacts and modern features were present in a number of the pads, as shown in the table below.

Footings Trenches

- 2.7 The footings trenches were excavated using a tracked 360° excavator with a 0.60m toothed bucket.
- 2.8 The trenches were also devoid of any archaeological features. Modern drainage pipes were revealed in Trenches E and G, and there was further evidence for the bottle dump seen in Pads 7 and 11 in Trench H.

Drainage Trenches

- 2.9 The drainage trenches were excavated with a mini-digger using a 0.55m toothed bucket.
- **2.10** The only features observed in the drainage trenches were the remains of a probable hedgeline and part of the bottle dump previously noted. As the artefacts were generally of the same types and date as retrieved elsewhere, they were not collected.

3. Discussion & Conclusion

- 3.1 The features revealed during the groundworks included the remains of a brick wall [02], a sand-filled rectangular feature of uncertain function, two modern pottery dumps [06] and [07], a cinder layer [08], which may have been a levelling deposit, and a large bottle dump [09], which also contained a mixture of artefacts and animal bone. In addition, a layer of brick and concrete conglomerate was present in the east facing section of Pad 4, south of the former hedgeline. Not enough of this was exposed to indicate whether this may have been the remains of a levelling deposit or a path.
- 3.2 A number of modern services were also present in the study area, which was bounded to the east and west by modern buildings. Much of the area had been disturbed by earlier construction and drainage works, as well as landscaping which may have destroyed earlier archaeological remains. It is more likely, however, that the study area lay outside the focus of the medieval moated complex.
