## Narrative:

As part of the faculty requirements for repair works to the floor of the nave, the Heritage Network was commissioned to undertake a programme of archaeological monitoring at Great St. Mary's Church, Sawbridgeworth, Hertfordshire.

The study area lies within the church building, centred at NGR TL 48500 14822 (Figure 1).

The groundworks consisted of ground reduction, covering an area measuring 7.8m in length and 2m in width, in the centre of the nave (Figure 2). The ground was reduced by 0.40m across the whole area, removing the existing tiled surface. The stratigraphy exposed in the sections below the tiles comprised a layer of light grey silt, >0.40m in depth, interpreted as a make up or levelling layer. The natural substratum was not reached during the present works.

Three brick structures were revealed in this area. Structure [101], was encountered in the southwest corner of the trench and was orientated east – west, along the nave. It was built of handmade red bricks, bonded with lime mortar and had a curving roof. Its exposed area measured 2.50m in length, 0.80 in width and 0.15m in depth (Figure 3, Plate1). The structure has been interpreted as a burial vault of mid 19<sup>th</sup> century or earlier date.

Structure [102] was located on the northern side of the aisle, to the north of [101], and lay below ledger stone 16 (Figure 3, Plate 2). It was also aligned east – west and constructed of red handmade bricks bonded with lime mortar. Its exposed area measured 2.5m in length, 0.40m in width and 0.20m in depth. No lettering was visible on the ledger stone.

Structure [103] was located towards the eastern end of the aisle, to the east of [102] and was orientated north south (Figure 3, Plate 3). Its exposed area measured 0.75m in length, 0.80m in width and 0.12m in depth. It was constructed of red machine manufactured bricks, which had been broken to fit. The bricks, which were laid at least two courses high and bonded with a dry lime mortar, may have been reused or reclaimed for this purpose. This structure was apparently of later date than the postulated burial vaults to the east, although it's purpose is unknown.

No other archaeological features or deposits were revealed during the works.

Finds collected during the course of the present project comprised seventeen disarticulated human bone fragments and a sherd of slip-trailed pottery of probable 18<sup>th</sup> century date (Plate 4). With the agreement of the vicar, these were all reburied in the trench after the work was complete.

#### **Discussion:**


The Church of Great St. Mary (HER 1104) is a Grade I listed building (List Entry No. 160758), largely of late medieval date, which replaced an earlier structure. The earliest parts of the present building date to the 13<sup>th</sup> century and comprise the chancel, nave and lower part of the west tower. The north and south aisles were added in the 14<sup>th</sup> century. A priest is recorded at Sawbridgeworth in 1086, and the 13<sup>th</sup> century building is unlikely to have been the first on the site, but no evidence for an earlier structure has been identified.


The groundworks for the present project were located in the centre of the nave. This work exposed the roofs of two probable brick built burial vaults dating to the mid 19<sup>th</sup> century or earlier, and a 20<sup>th</sup> century brick structure of unknown purpose.



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
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
