Introduction:

In response to a planning condition on a side extension at 3 The Orchard, Baldock, Hertfordshire, SG7 6DE, the Heritage Network was commissioned by Mr & Mrs Donovan to undertake a programme of archaeological monitoring on the development groundworks. Planning permission for the development (17/01215/1HH) was granted by North Herts District Council (NHDC), subject to a standard archaeological condition issued under the provisions set out in the Department of Communities and Local Government's *National Planning Policy Framework* (NPPF). A full specification for the work carried out is contained in the Heritage Network's approved *Project Design*, dated October 2017.

The study area lies in the heart of a well documented multi-period archaeological landscape, centred on NGR TL 24799 33623 (Figure 1). It is located within an *Area of Archaeological Significance* No.96 as defined in the District Local Plan and close to the Scheduled Monument defining the late Iron Age settlement and Romano-British small town (List no. 1016305). The site of a wealthy Iron Age *Chieftain's Burial* (HER 1868) lies approximately 20m to the north-east, on the opposite side of The Orchard.

Narrative:

The proposed development entails the construction of a single storey extension at the rear and side of the existing house. The works for the present project involved the monitoring of the excavation of the foundation trenches for the new extension.

Foundation Trenches

The trenches for the new extension, which is located on the north-west corner of the house, measured between 2.90m and 6.25m in length, between 0.65m and 0.70m in width and between 1.20m and 1.40m in depth (Figure 2, Plate 1). This work was undertaken by a 1.5 tonne tracked 360^0 excavator, fitted with a 0.60m toothless ditching bucket.

The exposed stratigraphy was fairly uniform across the site and consisted of a mid grey, soft silty clay made ground, 0.5m thick, which contained occasional chalk flecks, modern artefacts, including glass and pottery fragments, and light rooting (Figure 3, Plate 2). This overlay a layer of dark grey, soft silty clay, 0.2 - 0.3m thick, with occasional small rounded stones, which may represent the pre-existing soil horizon before the ground levels were raised. Below this was a light grey soft silty clay subsoil, 0.3 - 0.5m thick, with occasional chalk flecks. The natural chalk and was reached at depths of between 1m and 1.40m.

Evidence for significant disturbance was encountered in the trenches, including modern services and a dog burial, which was left in situ.

Apart from the dog skeleton the finds from the site consisted of a sheep/goat lower mandible and long bone, which were observed but not retained. Three sherds of late Roman pottery were recovered from within the made ground and are therefore likely to be residual. Such finds would not be unexpected in this part of Baldock. However, as they were clearly residual and of no intrinsic significance, they have been discarded.

No other archaeological cut features, deposits or finds were encountered during the present project.

Discussion:

The monitoring of the development groundworks revealed a stratigraphic sequence consisting of made ground directly overlying subsoils. The made ground is likely to represent levelling of the site at some point in the recent past, possibly when The Orchard was built.

The three sherds of pottery recovered have been examined and dated to the 3rd - 4th century AD. They are all from the kiln site at Hadham and represent three individual vessels. Two sherds are of Hadham oxidised ware, including a red-slipped rim sherd from a jar, while the third is in Hadham reduced ware. Unfortunately their significance is limited as they were recovered from within the made ground. However, they were relatively unabraded, suggesting that they had not travelled far from their original site of deposition.

No further archaeological features, deposits or finds were encountered during the course of the present investigation and no evidence for activity pre-dating the post-medieval period was noted. No information was gained that could be considered to contribute to the research aims for the project, as defined in the approved Project Design.




