

No. 1 The Fulham Pottery; A Preliminary Account

For the last three years the Section, under the direction of V. R. Christophers, has been excavating the Fulham Pottery, founded in the 1670s by John Dwight, the first English potter to manufacture salt-glazed stoneware commercially. The excavations have been briefly described in *the London Archaeologist* and the fuller preliminary account now published contains an account of the excavations, new historical information about the Pottery, and a discussion and illustrations of some of the wares and related material found on the site, including bellarmine bottles and medallions, experimental wares made by Dwight and products of the 18th and 19th centuries. The account will be of interest both to those involved in the archaeology of London and to those concerned with the historical development of ceramic techniques.
