

### Exhibitions

Chinese Pottery and Porcelain, from Prehistory to the Present, at the British Museum until 18 August. A survey of the history of ceramic production, tracing the development of porcelain and stoneware and religious sculpture. It also examines the technical relationship between the different wares, and demonstrates how the understanding of Chinese pottery and porcelain has been advanced by archaeological evidence from kiln sites and scientific analyses. The accompanying hardback *Chinese Pottery and Porcelain*, by S J Vainker, with 100 colour and 80 black-and-white photographs, is available from the Museum bookshop at the exhibition price of £14.95 (£19.95 from other bookshops). Admission free.

Man and metal in ancient Nigeria, at the British Museum (room 28) until 1 September. A collection of a thousand years' metal-working, including objects from 10th century Igbo-Ukwu, 12-15th century Ife and 15-19th century Benin. Admission free.
