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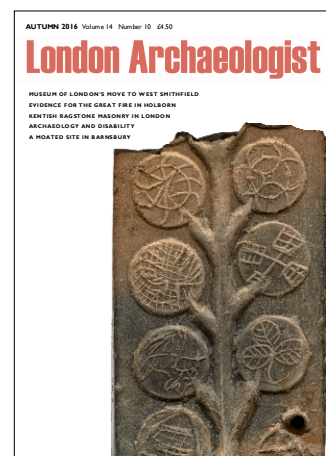
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One half of a stone token discovered during the excavations at the former General Post Office, Newgate Street, 1975–79. Designs include a lamb and flag – the *agnus dei* – as well as simple geometric and floral patterns. Tokens were made throughout the 15th–18th centuries at times when there was a lack of low denomination currency in circulation. They would be used by tradesmen relying on the trust of businesses in small neighbourhoods to accept these pieces.
