

Previous excavations in advance of improvements to the A30 to the north of the site, exposed extensive evidence for prehistoric activity, including Neolithic features, a Bronze Age enclosure ditch, pits and boundary ditches (Fitzpatrick <i>et al</i> 1999).		
Results		
An area 55m x 36m wide was stripped of topsoil using a 360° tracked excavator equipped with a toothless grading bucket. Mixed yellowish-brown clay natural subsoil was exposed across the whole of the site, the surface of which was heavily marked by plough scarring. Numerous modern field drains also crossed the area.		
Disturbance of the natural subsoil was not enough to obscure any potential <i>in situ</i> archaeological deposits or feature, and none were present.		
Seven unstratified lithic artefacts were recovered from the topsoil. These are greensand-derived worked chert, including one blade of possible early Neolithic date, one core, four broad waste flakes and one broken blade, again of possible early Neolithic date. These artefacts are likely to represent a general background scatter of material.		
The finds and archive have been collated and will be deposited in RAM Museum, Exeter, under the accession number 451/2007.
