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Abstract

Archaeology South-East was commissioned by The Trustees of the Glynde Endowment Settlement, Glynde Estates to undertake an archaeological watching brief during groundworks at Ellinge Hall, The Street, Glynde, East Sussex.

No archaeological deposits, features or finds were recorded at the site, and there was clear evidence that any potential archaeological deposits had been removed prior to the current works, presumably during the construction of, or additions to the standing structure.

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1.0 INTRODUCTION

1.1 Site Background

1.1.1 Archaeology South-East was commissioned by The Trustees of the Glynde Endowment Settlement, Glynde Estates to undertake an archaeological watching brief during groundworks at Ellinge Hall, The Street, Glynde, East Sussex (NGR 545668 109241; Figure 1).

1.2 Geology and Topography

- 1.2.1 Ellinge Hall is a substantial 4-bedroom dwelling lying in a rural location on the north side of The Street, a country lane running northwards from Lacys Hill, Glynde. Apparently built in 1802, the house is unlisted and much altered (Lusted and Whitmore 2017).
- 1.2.2 According to the most recent available data from the British Geological Survey, the underlying geology at the site consists of the West Melbury Marly Chalk Formation with localised superficial deposits of 'head' consisting of clay, silt, sand and gravels (BGS 2017).

1.3 Planning Background

1.3.1 Planning permission was granted by South Downs National Park Authority for the erection of a two storey and single storey extension to the existing building. (planning reference SDNP/17/00568/FUL). Following consultation between South Downs National Park Authority and East Sussex County Council (South Downs National Park Authority's advisers on archaeological issues in this area), a condition was attached to the permission requiring that:

'No development shall take place until the applicant has secured the implementation of a programme of archaeological works in accordance with a written scheme of investigation which has been submitted by the applicant and approved by the Local Planning Authority. A written record of any archaeological works undertaken shall be submitted to the Local Planning Authority within 3 months of the completion of any archaeological investigation unless an alternative timescale for submission of the report is first agreed in writing with the Local Planning Authority.

Reason: To ensure that the archaeological and historical interest of the site is safeguarded and recorded to comply with the National Planning Policy Framework'

1.3.2 Subsequently a *Written Scheme of Investigation* for the archaeological work was prepared by ASE. The document outlined the methodologies to be used on site (in this case an archaeological watching brief), and in the preparation of a report and archive of the results (ASE 2017). The document was submitted to East Sussex County Council and was duly approved before the commencement of work at the site.

1.4 Scope of Report

1.4.1 This report details the results of the archaeological monitoring of groundworks at the site undertaken on 22nd November 2017 by Simon Stevens (Senior Archaeologist). The project was managed by Paul Mason (Project Manager) and by Jim Stevenson and Andy Margetts (Post-excavation Managers).

2.0 ARCHAEOLOGICAL AND CARTOGRAPHIC BACKGROUND

2.1 Archaeological Background

2.1.1 The following archaeological background and research aims are taken directly from the WSI (*ibid*.). The background data was gathered from a search of the East Sussex Historic Environment Record (see also Figure 1). Ellinge Hall lies c.50m north of the projected line of a Roman road (Margary RR 142/145; Margary 1965, 198-200).

2.2 Cartographic Background

- 2.2.1 The current Ellinge Hall was labelled as *Sevenacres* on the first edition Ordnance Survey map of 1875-6. The map shows a small rectangular dwelling with a complex of 'L' shaped farm buildings immediately to the east.
- 2.2.2 By 1899 the name of the property had changed to *Home Farm* and the house has been enlarged. The map of 1910 indicates the footprint of the house very similar to that of today and including the railway carriage on the north-east side of the house.
- 2.2.3 The house is believed to have been the home of the Glynde Estate's manager in the early 1900s and the railway carriage was used as the estate office for a time. Recently, it has rented out by the Estate to private tenants (Mackellar Schwerdt 2017).

2.3 Research Aims And Objectives

- 2.3.1 The general objective of the archaeological watching brief is to record archaeological deposits exposed by the development. Exposed deposits or recovered artefacts should be interpreted within the context of the site a whole.
- 2.3.2 The watching brief will also assess the past impacts on the site and pay particular attention to the character, height/depth below ground level, condition, date and significance of any deposits.
- 2.3.3 Consideration will also be given to publication of the results in a local journal and/or presentation/s to local historical/archaeological societies should the results be of sufficient interest
- 2.3.4 The watching brief has the potential to address the following research objectives set out in the South-East Research Framework (SERF):
 - The study of Roman communications (and roadside settlements)
 - The chronology and typology of farm buildings and lesser noticed postmedieval agricultural features
- 2.3.5 A final aim is to make public the results of the archaeological watching brief subject to any confidentiality restrictions.

3.0 ARCHAEOLOGICAL METHODOLOGY

3.1 Fieldwork Methodology

- 3.1.1 The mechanical excavation of strip footings was monitored by a suitably qualified archaeologist. All sections were examined for archaeological deposits and all spoil was scanned for the presence of archaeological artefacts, both visually and with a metal detector.
- 3.1.2 All encountered deposits were recorded according to accepted professional standards using standard Archaeology South-East context record forms. Deposit colours were recorded by visual inspection and not by reference to a Munsell Colour chart. A full photographic record of the monitoring was maintained.
- 3.1.3 The fieldwork was undertaken according to WSI (ASE 2017), in accordance with the CIfA Code of Conduct (CIfA 2014a) and Standards and Guidance for Archaeological Watching Brief (CIfA 2014b) as well as with reference to the Sussex Archaeological Standards (ESCC 2015).

3.2 Fieldwork Constraints

3.2.1 There were no physical constraints to the archaeological monitoring of the groundworks; machining was closely observed, all sections were examined and all spoil was scanned for the presence of archaeological artefacts.

3.3 The Site Archive

3.3.1 The site archive is currently held at the offices of ASE and will be offered to the Lewes Museum in due course. The contents of the archive are tabulated below (Tables 2 and 3).

3.3.2 A county-wide policy of selection and retention of archaeological finds is currently under review by the Sussex Archaeological Museum Group working party. Once the policy is agreed and in place, it will be implemented by Archaeology South-East. The finds archive will be revised in accordance with this policy in the event that it is implemented before deposition of the archive occurs.

4.0 RESULTS

4.1 Introduction (Figures 2 and 3)

4.1.1 The mechanical excavation of strip footings by a Kubota KX-14 tracked excavator were monitored on 22nd November 2017. The foundations were 600mm wide and a maximum of 1m in depth.

4.2 The Stratigraphic Sequence

- 4.2.1 Monitoring of excavations immediately to the south-west of the existing structure revealed a straightforward stratigraphic sequence. It consisted of a thin surface layer of mid-greyish brown to mid-brown heavily rooted mortary made ground, context [001], left after the recent removal of a patio surface. This directly over the greyish white/whitish grey surface of the marly chalk, context [002]. There had been disturbance to both deposits close to existing structure from the laying of a service.
- 4.2.2 No archaeological deposits, features or finds were recorded, and as recently deposited made ground was laid directly on the surface of the 'natural' with no evidence of a topsoil or subsoil layer, it is apparent that there has been substantial earthmoving at the site, potentially removing any archaeological deposits.

5.0 DISCUSSION AND CONCLUSIONS

5.1 Overview of stratigraphic sequence

5.1.1 The simple stratigraphic sequence and absence of any clear topsoil or subsoil, demonstrated that there had been significant earthmoving at the site, presumably in the recent past, supported by the paucity of deposited detritus that would be expected close to any property of age.

5.2 Deposit survival and existing impacts

5.2.1 It is clear that there has been substantial earthmoving/truncation at the property, presumably associated with the construction and/or erection of additions to the building over time.

5.3 Consideration of research aims

5.3.1 The watching brief was successful in its general aims of monitoring the groundworks to mitigate exposure of deposits or artefacts of archaeological interest. Given the lack of archaeological remains, none of the more specific research aims could be addressed in any meaningful way.

5.4 Conclusions

5.4.1 No archaeological deposits, features or finds were recorded at the site, and there was evidence that any potential archaeological deposits had been removed prior to the current works.






