

An Archaeological Watching Brief at Travis Perkins Site, New Road/Pier Road, Littlehampton, West Sussex

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Abstract

Archaeology South-East (ASE), a division of University College London Centre for Applied Archaeology (UCLCAA), was commissioned by the Environmental Dimension Partnership (EDP) on behalf of their client, Travis Perkins Ltd, to undertake an archaeological watching brief in advance of redevelopment at New Road/Pier Road, Littlehampton, West Sussex (NGR 502782 101847).

An area of ground reduction for ground beams, a test pit and a service trench were all monitored. However, no archaeological deposits, features or artefacts of significance were identified or recovered. Most of the natural horizon had been heavily disturbed by previous construction.

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1.0 INTRODUCTION

1.1 Site Background

1.1.1 Archaeology South-East (ASE), a division of University College London Centre for Applied Archaeology (UCLCAA), were commissioned by The Environmenal Dimension Partnership (EDP) on behalf of Travis Perkins Ltd to undertake an archaeological watching brief during redevelopment at New Road/Pier Road, Littlehampton, West Sussex, which is henceforth referred to as 'the site' (NGR 502782 101847; Figure 1).

1.2 Geology and Topography

- 1.2.1 The site is located on the eastern bank of the River Arun, approximately 0.5 km north of its confluence with the English Channel. It is bounded by Pier Road and New Road, to the west and north respectively, and by housing and industrial units to the south and east.
- 1.2.2 The British Geological Survey Sheet 332: Bognor shows the site lies on Head Brickearth.

1.3 Planning Background

- 1.3.1 Planning permission was granted by Arun District Council (ADC) for the 'demolition of existing buildings and redevelopment for a builders merchant with outside storage, a food retail store, along with access, servicing, parking, boundary treatment and landscaping' (Planning Ref. LU/175/08).
- 1.3.2 Due to the potential disturbance of below ground archaeological remains, two conditions were attached to the planning consent, at the request of the West Sussex County Council (WSCC) Archaeologist, in his capacity as archaeological advisor to ADC.
- 1.3.3 Condition 15 was imposed because the "...site is of archaeological significance and it is important that it is recorded by excavation before it is destroyed by development". The wording of the condition was as follows:
 - "...before development commences for either the builders' merchant site or the retail site an archaeological investigation of the site shall be carried out at the expense of the developer in accordance with a specification for the relevant site and shall be submitted to and agreed by the Local Planning Authority in writing (following the demolition of any existing buildings and) before the commencement of any building works"
- 1.3.4 Condition 16 was imposed to "... enable items of archaeological interest to be recorded". It stated that:
 - "...The Local Planning Authority shall be informed in writing immediately of any items or archaeological interest unearthed during the building operation

- and given a reasonable opportunity for an examination of the artefact and the site where it was found".
- 1.3.5 Whilst condition 15 required the completion of an excavation in advance of development, discussions between EDP and the WSCC Archaeologist concluded that, given the limited disturbance that will be caused by the consented scheme, a watching brief was all that was necessary.
- 1.3.6 A specification for the archaeological watching brief was prepared by EDP (*Travis Perkins Site, New Road/Pier Road, Littlehampton, West Sussex. Specification for a Watching Brief*) and approved by the WSCC Archaeologist. A Method Statement was prepared by Archaeology South East with reference to the approved Specification and the WSCC *Recommended Standard Archaeological Conditions* (version 2b).

1.4 Aims and Objectives

- 1.4.1 The aims of the investigation were outlined in the Method Statement (ASE 2009) and are reproduced below with due acknowledgement:
 - To preserve by record any important archaeological remains uncovered by the contractor's operations
 - To retain samples of artefactual and ecofactual material for further study
 - To make the results available

1.5 Scope of Report

1.5.1 This report details the findings of the watching brief undertaken by Nick Garland, Kathy Grant, Dylan Hopkinson and Dan Swift between the 5th March and 19th October 2009. The project was managed by Neil Griffin (Project Manager) and Jim Stevenson (Post-Excavation Manager).

2.0 ARCHAEOLOGICAL BACKGROUND

2.1 Introduction

2.1.1 The Historic Environment Record (HER) maintained by West Sussex County Council, and held at Tower Street, Chichester, was consulted and the results are summarised below. Details were taken of all archaeological sites and listed buildings within a 1000 metre radius of the centre of the Site. The identified sites (numbered 1 – 57) are discussed below, tabulated in Appendix 1 and shown on Figure 1.

2.2 Archaeological Periods Represented

2.2.1 Prehistoric

Two find spots of a broadly prehistoric date have been discovered within the study area. These include flint implements (1:2184) and a Lodsworth saddle quern (2: 4912).

2.2.2 Neolithic

A polished and unpolished axe and a flint pick, dating to the Neolithic, were recovered during the construction of St James Church in Arundel Road (3: 2164).

2.2.3 Bronze Age

Three findspots of Bronze Age material are located within the study area, including a palstave axe dredged from the River Arun (4: 2190), a macehead found in Church street (5: 2173) and several sherds of pottery from an evaluation at Littlehampton Library (6: 6764).

2.2.4 Iron Age

A small selection of flint tempered Iron Age pottery was uncovered in Berry Lane (7: 4933). In addition, multiple sites dating to the transition between the Iron Age and Romano-British periods are located within the study area. These include pottery dating to both periods found at Maltravers Drive in 1928 (8: 2163), a settlement site at Wick Farm in Wick (9: 2171), pottery found in the grounds of Manor House in 1934 (10: 2165) and three ditches that were sectioned at Roman Acre, off Wick Road (11: 5209).

2.2.5 Roman

Six findspots of Roman coins have been found at locations within the study area, including Cornwall Rd (12: 2169), on the beach east of the pier (13: 2180), on the green north-west of the pavilion (14: 2178), at the junction of Clun and Northham roads (15: 2170), St Mary's Close (16: 2151) and Surrey Street (17: 2167).

More substantial sites of Roman remains include a findspot of pottery at St. Flora's Road (18:4934), a small settlement including burials near the Library (19: 2172), cremation burials in Kent Road (20: 2181), cremation urns in Fitzalan Road (21: 7881) and a cemetery of approximate 30 burials behind the hospital (22: 7045).

2.2.6 Medieval

Two findspots of medieval pottery lie within the study area. These are located in a garden in Lyminster road (23: 5208) and the garden of 120 Arundel Road (24: 4936). The later specifically relates to green glazed pottery.

An Archaeologically Sensitive Area lies in the centre of Littlehampton relating to its medieval occupation. The town was listed as 'Hantone' in the Domesday Book. (25: 2203)

2.2.7 Post-Medieval

Twenty two sites of post-medieval remains lie within the study area. These include a Gas works (26: 2207), Climping Shipyard (27: 2205), Wharves (28: 2204) (29: 7005) and other associated Harbour works (30: 2202). St. Mary's Church (31: 2186) was built in 1826 but may lay on the site of an earlier structure. A malthouse (32: 2210) in Duke Street and a brewery (33: 2211) that was owned by John Constable also lie within the study area.

Defensive aspects within the study area include 16th century (34: 2219) and 18th century (35: 2216) gun batteries, rifle ranges (36: 8172), a set of Napoleonic barracks (37: 6730) and a Scheduled Ancient Monument, Littlehampton Fort (38: 2215). A brickyard (39: 6077) and a brickworks (40: 6078) also lie within the study area. Two windmills (41: 2218) and (42: 2217), several structures (43: 7975), (44: 2228), (45: 5640), (46: 5642) and a swing bridge (47: 2206) are also present.

2.2.7 WWII

Several features dating to World War II and the defence of Britain lie within the study area. These include town defences (48: 8061), defence work at the harbour entrance (49: 7490), a tank trap (50: 7459), anti-tank defences (51: 7282) (52: 8173), an anti-aircraft battery (53: 7080) and aircraft hangers (54: 2229).

2.2.8 Undated

Three sites that are presently undated within the study area include a 'seleucid' coin (55: 2191), a marker post (56:8171) and a square enclosure in a field to the west of the mouth of the River Arun (57: 2153).

3.0 ARCHAEOLOGICAL METHODOLOGY

- 3.1 All ground works and excavations undertaken were monitored at all times by an archaeologist until it became clear, beyond reasonable doubt, that no archaeological remains were present (e.g. once excavation reached undisturbed natural subsoils, below which there would be no archaeological remains present).
- 3.2 The following ground works were undertaken during the development of the new Travis Perkins builders' merchants:
 - Limited level reduction for ground beams, for car parks/public open space, etc
 - Excavation of trenching for services
- 3.3 Revealed surfaces were manually cleaned to identify any archaeological deposits or features. The sections of the test pit were hand-cleaned to observe and record any stratigraphy. All spoil removed was scanned visually and by metal detector for the presence of unstratified artefacts.
- 3.4 All encountered deposits, features and finds were recorded according to accepted professional standards (IFA), in accordance with the approved WSI and using pro-forma context record sheets. Archaeological features and deposits were planned at a scale of 1:20 and sections generally drawn at a scale of 1:10. Deposit colours were verified by visual inspection.
- 3.5 A full photographic record of all associated deposits and features was kept (monochrome prints, colour slides and digital), and will form part of the site archive. The archive is presently held at the Archaeology South-East offices at Portslade, East Sussex, and will be offered to Littlehampton Museum in due course.

4.0 RESULTS (Figure 2)

4.1 The works consisted of the monitoring of three areas; ground reduction within the footprint of the new building, a test pit and a service trench. The table below lists the contexts observed across the site.

4.2 Test Pit

A single test pit was excavated in the south of the site, measuring 2.5 metres in length and 2 metres in width, to a depth of approximately 3.5 metres. No archaeological material or features were visible within the test pit. A thin layer of made ground [100] overlay a layer of natural blue/orange mottled clay [101] representing a layer of alluvium at a height of 1.693 m OD. This natural layer changed slightly at a depth of 2 meters to a blue/grey sandy clay [102].

4.3 Ground Reduction

An area measuring approximately 77 metres in length and 19 metres in width was monitored to a depth of approximately 250 mm for the placement of ground beams. The reduction of this area removed the majority of the made ground [100] down onto the natural clay [101], however, some traces were still visible to the east of the site. The height of the natural horizon varied between 2.057 m OD to the north and 1.729 m OD to the south. No archaeological remains or features were observed, however, a large amount of modern disturbance was noted across the stripped area. This disturbance appears to have originated from the construction of the previous building and possible industrial activities associated with the use of the building.

4.4 Service Trench

A service trench measuring 18 metres in length by 0.8 metres in width was excavated in an east to west orientation across the south of the site. The trench was excavated to a depth of 0.7 metres. This trench contained no archaeological remains or features and showed the same stratigraphy to the test pit discussed above. The height of the natural horizon within this trench was 1.662 m OD.

5.0 DISCUSSION AND CONCLUSIONS

- 5.1 The monitoring of the works across the site revealed no archaeological features, deposits or materials of significance.
- 5.2 The monitoring of the works suggests that this site has been heavily disturbed and truncated during the post-medieval and modern periods due to construction of previous buildings.
- 5.3 Natural clay was encountered at approximately 0.25m below present ground level at between 2.057m AOD in the north of the site and 1.662m AOD in the south.


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
