#### 1 INTRODUCTION

- 1.1 In September 2017 Archaeological Solutions Ltd (AS) carried out a programme of archaeological monitoring and recording to the rear of 19 Shillington Road, Pirton, Hitchin, Hertfordshire, SG5 3QJ (NGR TL 1439 3195; Figs. 1 2). The monitoring was undertaken in compliance with a planning condition attached to planning approval for construction of an extension to an existing outbuilding so as to create a garage and utility room (North Herts District Council Planning Ref.17/01211/1HH). The monitoring was required based on the advice of Hertfordshire County Council Historic Environment Advisor
- 1.2 The monitoring was carried out in accordance with a brief issued by Hertfordshire County Council Historic Environment Advisor (HCC HEA, Simon Wood, dated 27 June 2017), and a specification compiled by AS (20 July 2017). It adhered to the requirements of the document *Standards for Field Archaeology in the East of England* (Gurney 2003) and the CIfA *Standard and Guidance for Archaeological Watching Briefs* (2014).
- 1.3 The requirements of the project were:

- Archaeological monitoring of all groundworks associated with the new development;
- The provision of an adequately detailed project report; and
- The dissemination and publication of the project results, as appropriate.

#### Planning policy context

- 1.4 The National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF 2012) states that those parts of the historic environment that have significance because of their historic, archaeological, architectural or artistic interest are heritage assets. The NPPF aims to deliver sustainable development by ensuring that policies and decisions that concern the historic environment recognise that heritage assets are a non-renewable resource, take account of the wider social, cultural, economic and environmental benefits of heritage conservation, and recognise that intelligently managed change may sometimes be necessary if heritage assets are to be maintained for the long term. The NPPF requires applications to describe the significance of any heritage asset, including its setting that may be affected in proportion to the asset's importance and the potential impact of the proposal.
- 1.5 The NPPF aims to conserve England's heritage assets in a manner appropriate to their significance, with substantial harm to designated heritage assets (i.e. listed buildings, scheduled monuments) only permitted in exceptional circumstances when the public benefit of a proposal outweighs the conservation of the asset. The effect of proposals on non-designated heritage assets must be balanced against the scale of loss and significance of the asset, but non-designated heritage assets of demonstrably equivalent significance may be considered subject to the same policies as those that are designated. The NPPF states that opportunities to capture evidence from the historic environment, to record and advance the understanding of heritage assets and to make this publicly available is a requirement of development management. This opportunity should be taken in a manner proportionate to the significance of a heritage asset and to impact of the proposal, particularly where a heritage asset is to be lost.

#### 2 DESCRIPTION OF THE SITE

- 2.1 The site is located within the village of Pirton, which is situated within the district of North Hertfordshire. The site lies on the southern frontage of Shillington Road which passes through the western section of the historic core of Pirton. The medieval and post-medieval core of Pirton is identified as Area of Archaeological Significance No. 75 on the NHDC Local Plan.
- 2.2 The site comprises a roughly rectangular plot of land, which covers an approximate area of 200m². It is bounded to the immediate north by

Shillington Road, and to the east and west by residential dwellings comprising Nos. 17 and 21 Shillington Road respectively. To the immediate south of the site is agricultural land. The site contains the dwelling of No. 19 Shillington Road with an existing outbuilding to the rear and south-east of the house.

### 3 TOPOGRAPHY, GEOLOGY AND SOILS

- 3.1 The Pirton area is characterised by its location at the base of the Chiltern Hills. The surrounding relief thus slopes significant down to the northwest, with the site located at approximately 68m AOD. Given its location at the foot of the Chiltern Hills, Pirton incorporates a number of springs and small watercourses, particularly those located 300m to the north-west of the site.
- 3.2 The underlying geological formation of the local area consists of West Melbury Marly Chalk Formation (BGS 2015). It is overlain by a drift geology of chalk, as well as soils of the Wantage 2 Association, which are described as shallow well-drained calcareous silty soils (SSEW 1983).

#### 4 ARCHAEOLOGICAL & HISTORICAL BACKGROUND

#### Prehistoric

4.1 Only sparse evidence for early prehistoric activity is known locally, with the majority of known prehistoric activity focussed on the uplands of the Chiltern Hills, such as Knocking Knoll Long Barrow, to the south-west. Circular gullies at Priors Hill and 220m to the south-west may represent the remains of prehistoric burial mounds, or may relate to 5<sup>th</sup> - 9<sup>th</sup> century settlement in the same field (HER 31109). A possible bronze hoard, consisting of four axes and a lump of metal is also recorded within the parish of Pirton (HER 553). A rough pottery base found in Pirton may be Iron Age or Anglo-Saxon in date (HER 195).

#### Romano-British

4.2 An extensive Romano-British settlement is recorded in Dane Field to the south-west of the site and extending towards Priors Hill. It includes buildings, a kiln and metal-working debris, and the settlement may have continued into the 6<sup>th</sup> or 7<sup>th</sup> centuries. Romano-British activity including pits and ditches have been recorded at Pollards Way and at Pirton Primary School (HERs 18649 & 17170). Isolated finds within Pirton also include Romano-British pottery found in the school playground (HER 1475); a Roman spindle whorl (HER 1480); and re-deposited Roman sherds in the Norman earthwork bank of the castle at Toot Hill (HER 1477).

#### Anglo-Saxon

4.3 The potential continuity of settlement from the Romano-British to Anglo-Saxon periods at Dane Field and Priors Hill, is a partial indicator of the

settlement pattern at Pirton during the latter (Page 1908). At Priors Hill, which lies 150m to the south-west of the site, archaeological investigations have revealed dense occupation in the early to middle Saxon period, which included human burials (HER 31108). Further recent investigations between that site and the High Street recorded additional Saxon and medieval features, with deep pits, ditches and gullies.

4.4 Test-pitting across the village has plotted numerous scatters of Saxon and medieval pottery (HER 16620) that suggest polyfocal settlement – probably a series of farmsteads rather than contiguous settlement – prior to the construction of the motte-and-bailey castle in the 12<sup>th</sup> century. Substantial evidence for another node of settlement and possibly the beginning of the nucleation of Pirton has been recorded *c*.200m to the south-east of the site and in the vicinity of The Fox public house, where a Saxo-Norman cemetery, possible early church and other buildings were recorded (HERs 9676, 9677 & 11409). A silver penny of king Offa, dated *c*. AD792 - 796, was also found in a ploughed field at Pirton (HER 9470).

#### Medieval

- 4.5 By the time of the Domesday Survey, a thriving manorial estate was held at Pirton by the Archbishop of Canterbury (HER 1487; Morris 1976), and in the 12<sup>th</sup> century a motte and bailey castle was constructed at Toot Hill c.370m to the south-east (HERs 32 & 12426). St Mary's Church was also constructed in the 12<sup>th</sup> century (HER 4315), and substantial medieval remains including earthworks, ditches, pots and possible forerunners to farms have been recorded close to the motte-and-bailey to the south-east of the site (HERs 9680 & 746). The village appears to have shrunk in the 14<sup>th</sup> century, potentially to no more than clusters of farmsteads or cottages separated by greens, such as Great Green (HER 12427).
- 4.6 Many of the farmsteads in and around the village may have their origins in the medieval period, including Rectory Farm c. 200m to the west, which was a moated site (HERs 2221 & 6302). A late medieval open hall house is recorded at Bury End (HER 15903). No. 28 Shillington Road, which lies to the west of the site, comprises a late medieval timber-framed house (HER 15906). Further medieval remains from Pirton include cropmarks of ridge and furrows (HER 15956), and finds of a 12th 13th century lead alloy seal die (HER 9471) and unstratified sherds (HER 13757).

#### Post-medieval and later

4.7 The post-medieval period in Pirton may be characterised by its agricultural character, with post-medieval farms including Hammonds Farm (HER 4513), Rectory Farm (HERs 154, 4715 & 6300), and Wright's Farm, which was known before the late 19<sup>th</sup> century as *Haxham's Farm* (HER 18773). Other post-medieval buildings of note include Hammond's Almshouses (HER 16666) and The Fox public house, which was built in the 17th century as a two-storey two-cell house (HER 18265). To the immediate west of the site is the Grade II listed Lavender Cottage at No. 21 Shillington

Road, which is an early 16<sup>th</sup> century open hall house, updated and extended in the early 17<sup>th</sup> century (HER 30146).

#### 5 METHODOLOGY

- 5.1 The monitoring encompassed the groundworks associated with the construction, in particular the excavation of the foundation trenches was observed.
- 5.2 The archaeological monitoring comprised the observation of groundworks, the inspection of deposits for archaeological features and the examination of spoil heaps and the recording of soil profiles. Archaeological features and deposits were recorded using *pro-forma* recording sheets, drawn to scale and photographed as appropriate. Excavated spoil was checked for finds.

Description: No archaeological features or finds were present.

#### 7 CONFIDENCE RATING

7.1 Within the parameters of the monitoring it is not felt that any factors restricted the identification of archaeological features or finds.

#### 8 DEPOSIT MODEL

- 8.1 The site was overlain by modern loose gravel surface L1000 (0.01 0.07m thick). L1000 overlay Tarmac L1001 (*c*.0.06-0.14m thick). Beneath L1001, Made Ground L1002 and L1005 were encountered. L1002 was a friable, dark yellow coarse, gritty sand (*c*.0.03-0.11m thick), while L1005 comprised a mixed red and yellow coloured brick rubble (*c*.0.05m thick). The made ground overlay Subsoil L1003, a soft, mid grey fine silty clay with occasional rooting observed throughout (*c*.0.19-0.29m thick).
- 8.2 The natural, L1004, was encountered between 0.39-0.53m below the present ground surface. It comprised a very firm, very pale grey clay with sparse rooting observed throughout.

#### 9 DISCUSSION

- 9.1 The site is located within the village of Pirton, which is situated within the district of North Hertfordshire. The site lies on the southern frontage of Shillington Road which passes through the western section of the historic core of Pirton. The medieval and post-medieval core of Pirton is identified as Area of Archaeological Significance No. 75 on the NHDC Local Plan.
- 9.2 No archaeological features or finds were present. The site stratigraphy appeared intact and therefore had archaeology been present it would likely have been preserved.

#### **DEPOSITION OF THE ARCHIVE**



Shillington Road, Pirton, Hertfordshire (P7274)






Fig. 2 Detailed site location plan
