#### **SUMMARY**

In November 2018 Archaeological Solutions Ltd (AS) carried out a programme of detailed archaeological 'strip, map & record' investigation and archaeological monitoring and recording during groundworks associated with the construction of a menage at Ashwell End Farm, Loves Lane, Ashwell, Hertfordshire SG7 5HZ (NGR TL 25162 40211; Figs. 1 - 2). The monitoring was also carried out according to the requirements of the Hertfordshire County Council Historic Environment Advisor Team (HCC HEAT), and was required in compliance with a planning condition attached to the planning approval (NHDC Planning Approval Ref. 18/02549/FP).

The site lies within an Area of Archaeological Significance (No. 191) as identified on the local plan, on the extreme north western edge of the village of Ashwell.

It is immediately adjacent to an area Scheduled as an Ancient Monument to the west of Loves Lane, Ashwell (NHLE 1012208, Hertfordshire Historic Environment Record HER 4197). This comprises a moated enclosure of medieval date, and the moated platform contains the buildings of Ashwell End Farm. An adjacent double island moated site lies close by to the east. Such combined moated enclosures are rare and unusual in Hertfordshire. A bank lies between the western edge of the enclosure and the area of the proposed new menage.

The site had a particular potential for the presence of medieval occupation remains associated with the adjacent homestead moat.

The construction of the menage was relatively superficial (0.16 – 0.42m deep) and the ground reduction and drainage did not penetrate the subsoil, and therefore if archaeological features are present they are preserved in situ.

### 1 INTRODUCTION

- 1.1 In November 2018 Archaeological Solutions Ltd (AS) carried out a programme of detailed archaeological 'strip, map & record' investigation and archaeological monitoring and recording during groundworks associated with the construction of a menage at Ashwell End Farm, Loves Lane, Ashwell, Hertfordshire SG7 5HZ (NGR TL 25162 40211; Figs. 1 2). The monitoring was carried out according to the requirements of the Hertfordshire County Council Historic Environment Advisor Team (HCC HEAT), and was required in compliance with a planning condition attached to the planning approval (NHDC Planning Approval Ref. 18/02549/FP).
- 1.2 The programme of archaeological monitoring and recording was carried out in accordance with a specification/Written Scheme of Investigation compiled by AS (6<sup>th</sup> November 2017) and approved by HCC HEA and the LPA. The project was also undertaken according to the requirements of the document *Standards for Field Archaeology in the East of England* (Gurney 2003) and the CIfA *Standard and Guidance for Archaeological Watching Briefs* (2014).
- 1.3 The requirements of the project were:
- Archaeological monitoring by a programme of 'strip, map & record' across the footprint of the proposed new menage, with the investigation and recording of any archaeology thereby revealed.
- The archaeological monitoring of all other groundworks associated with the scheme likely to have an impact on any remains (principally ground reduction/excavation, new drainage etc)
- The provision of an adequately detailed project report
- The dissemination and publication of the project results, as appropriate

### Planning policy context

1.4 The National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF 2012) states that those parts of the historic environment that have significance because of their historic, archaeological, architectural or artistic interest are heritage assets. The NPPF aims to deliver sustainable development by ensuring that policies and decisions that concern the historic environment recognise that heritage assets are a non-renewable resource, take account of the wider social, cultural, economic and environmental benefits of heritage conservation, and recognise that intelligently managed change may sometimes be necessary if heritage assets are to be maintained for the long term. The NPPF requires applications to describe the significance of any

heritage asset, including its setting that may be affected in proportion to the asset's importance and the potential impact of the proposal.

1.5 The NPPF aims to conserve England's heritage assets in a manner appropriate to their significance, with substantial harm to designated heritage assets (i.e. listed buildings, monuments) only permitted in exceptional circumstances when the public benefit of a proposal outweighs the conservation of the asset. The effect of proposals on non-designated heritage assets must be balanced against the scale of loss and significance of the asset, but non-designated heritage assets of demonstrably significance may be considered subject to the same policies as those that are designated. The NPPF states that opportunities to capture evidence from the historic environment, to record and advance the understanding of heritage assets and to make this publicly available is a requirement of development management. This opportunity should be taken in a manner proportionate to the significance of a heritage asset and to impact of the proposal, particularly where a heritage asset is to be lost.

### 2 DESCRIPTION OF THE SITE

- 2.1 The site lies within the bounds of Ashwell End Farm, a farmstead lying in the rural hinterland of Ashwell in north Hertfordshire. The site lies c. 1.6km north-west of the village of Ashwell and c. 1.6km south-east of the smaller village of Hinxworth.
- 2.2 At the time that archaeological work commenced, the site was in use as fairly rough, undeveloped grassland adjacent to the gardens associated with the farmhouse at Ashwell End Farm.

### 3 TOPOGRAPHY, GEOLOGY AND SOILS

- 3.1 The site lies at *c*. 45m OD in a fairly flat landscape which rises only slightly to the north-west and north-east in the vicinity of the villages of Dunton and Guilden Morden respectively. To the south-east the land drops slightly towards the centre of Ashwell before climbing steeply to the south. The land reaches a height of *c*. 84m OD around 1.5km to the south of the site.
- 3.2 The site lies on soils of the Milton Association, which are described as deep calcareous fine local soils. Soils of the Swaffham Prior Association are also present in the surrounding area; these well drained calcareous coarse and fine loamy soils over chalk rubble (SSEW 1983). The solid geology of the area belongs to the West Melbury

### 4 ARCHAEOLOGICAL & HISTORICAL BACKGROUND

- 4.1 The site lies within an Area of Archaeological Significance (No.191) as identified on the local plan, on the extreme north western edge of the village of Ashwell.
- 4.2 The site is immediately adjacent to an area Scheduled as an Ancient Monument to the west of Loves Lane, Ashwell (NHLE 1012208, Hertfordshire Historic Environment Record HER 4197). This comprises a moated enclosure of medieval date, and the moated platform contains the buildings of Ashwell End Farm. An adjacent double island moated site lies close by to the east. Such combined moated ensures are rare and unusual in Hertfordshire although this is one of three in the immediately surrounding area (see also HER 416 and HER 423). A bank lies between the western edge of the enclosure and the area of the proposed new menage.
- 4.3 Cropmarks of ring-ditches have been recorded to the east of Ashwell End Farm and further to the south-east; these are potentially of later Neolithic or Bronze Age date (HER 1245, 1259). Fragments of Bronze Age axes have been found in the surrounding area (HER 214, 437, 2840)
- 4.4 Evidence of Iron Age occupation in the area comes in the form of late Iron Age coin (a bronze stater) found in the Ashwell End area (HER 2844). Iron Age and Roman metalwork (HER 13402) has been found at Bluegates Farm
- 4.5 The Roman period is represented in the area surrounding the site by findspots from which a Roman figurine and other artefacts (HER 15648) and occupation material (HER 1178) have been recovered. A rectangular enclosure has been recorded to the southeast of Hinxworth and this is considered to possibly represent a Roman military camp (HER 181). Iron Age and Roman metalwork (HER 13402) and Roman pottery (HER 425) has been recovered from locations at nearby Bluegates Farm.
- 4.6 The site had a particular potential for the presence of medieval occupation remains associated with the adjacent homestead moat.

### 5 METHODOLOGY

- 5.1 The ground reduction and excavation of the drain were monitored.
- 5.2 The archaeological monitoring comprised the observation of all groundworks likely to affect archaeological remains, the inspection of

the subsoil and natural deposits for archaeological features, the examination of spoil heaps and the recording of soil profiles. Encountered features and deposits were cleaned by hand and recorded using *pro forma* recording sheets, drawn to scale and photographed as appropriate. Excavated spoil was checked for finds.

### 6 DESCRIPTION OF RESULTS

# 6.1 The encountered stratigraphy was recorded in sample sections presented below:

Description: No archaeological features or finds were present.

Some ground disturbance at the surface level was evident in the form of an old chicken coop, and modern (20<sup>th</sup> century) pottery, CBM and glass were present within Topsoil L1000.

### 7 CONFIDENCE RATING

7.1 Within the parameters of the investigation it is not felt that any factors restricted the identification of archaeological features or finds.

### 8 DISCUSSION

- 8.1 The site immediately adjacent to an area Scheduled as an Ancient Monument to the west of Loves Lane, Ashwell (NHLE 1012208, Hertfordshire Historic Environment Record HER 4197). An adjacent double island moated site lies close by to the east. Such combined moated enclosures are rare and unusual in Hertfordshire.
- 8.2 The construction of the menage was relatively superficial (0.16 0.42m deep) and the ground reduction and drainage did not penetrate the subsoil, and therefore if archaeological features are present they are preserved *in situ*.

### **DEPOSITION OF THE ARCHIVE**








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Fig. 2a 1898 OS map




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Fig. 2b 1950 OS map






Fig. 4 Site plan
