Introduction

This report documents the results of an archaeological watching brief carried out at Land at Beech Cottage, Altwood Close, Maidenhead, Berkshire (SU 8680 8015) (Fig. 1). The work was commissioned by Mr Daniel East of TP Architects. 33a St Luke's Road, Maidenhead, Berkshire, SL6 7DN on behalf Poltgot Limited, The Wickets, Sheepcote Lane, Paley Street, Berkshire, Sl6 3JU.

Planning permission (app no 12/01437) has been gained from the Royal Borough of Windsor and Maidenhead for the construction of a detached house. The consent is subject to a condition (6) relating to archaeology which requires that a watching brief be carried out during groundworks.

This is in accordance with the Department for Communities and Local Government's *National Planning Policy Framework* (NPPF 2012) and the Borough's policies on archaeology. The field investigation was carried out to a specification approved by Ms Fiona MacDonald, Principal Archaeologist with Berkshire Archaeology, advisers to the Borough on matters relating to archaeology. The fieldwork was undertaken by Tim Dawson between the 4th and 5th February 2013.

The archive is presently held at Thames Valley Archaeological Services, Reading and will be deposited at an approved local museum willing to accept material in due course.

Location, topography and geology

The site is located on a flat, rectangular, parcel of land to the north of Beech Cottage on the western side of Altwood Close, Maidenhead, Berkshire (Fig. 2). The underlying geology is shown as Upper Chalk (BGS 1981) but was, in places overlain by sandy clay patches. The site lies at a height of *c*.40m above Ordnance Datum.

Archaeological background

In summary, the site has been identified as having archaeological potential from its position in an area of eastern Berkshire which is relatively rich in finds of prehistoric and Roman date (Ford 1987) as is reflected in the number of archaeological entries noted for this area in the Berkshire Historic Environment Record. A fragment of Roman was found at Altwood Close in 1939 and the existence of a Roman villa has been suggested in the near

vicinity at the site of County Boys School at Shoppenhanger Road to the east. Roman pottery and a Neolithic axe

were found in the school grounds but the circumstances of these finds are unclear. A rectangular enclosure (and

possible earthwork) was identified a short way to the west through aerial photography. At the northern end of

Shoppenhanger Road (c.1km to the north-west) pits have been excavated containing Iron Age pottery and

worked flint. To the south on Altwood Bailey, fieldwork has observed a posthole and ditch tentatively dated to

the Saxon period (Coles 2005).

Objectives and methodology

The purpose of the watching brief was to excavate and record any archaeological deposits affected by the

groundworks.

Results

The watching brief was only concerned with monitoring of the new house footing trenches as pre-existing

service runs were to be re-used (Fig. 3). These footings measured 0.65m wide and were dug to a depth of c.

1.10mdeep. The stratigraphy revealed consisted of 0.13m of topsoil overlying 0.27m of sandy clay subsoil

overlying chalk with clay patches natural geology. The southern portion of the new footings showed some

truncation at the top of the stratigraphy from where a previous garage had stood. No archaeological deposits or

finds were observed.

Finds

No finds of an archaeological nature were recovered.

Conclusion

Despite the potential for archaeological deposits being encountered during the watching brief, no features nor

finds of archaeological interest were observed.



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



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Figure 1. Location of site within Maidenhead and Berkshire.
