#### Introduction

This report documents the results of an archaeological watching brief carried out at 8 Castle Hill Avenue, Berkhamsted, Hertfordshire (SP 9932 0835) (Fig. 1). The work was commissioned by Mr Edward Hunt, of Edward Hunt & Co, Architectural Consultants and Chartered Building Surveyors, Berkhamsted House, 121 high Street, Berkhamsted, Hertfordshire, HP4 2DJ on behalf of Mrs Vickie Wallis of 8 Castle Hill Avenue, Berkhamsted, Hertfordshire, HP4 1HJ.

Planning permission (4/01773/12/FHA) has been gained from Dacorum Borough Council for the construction of a new extension to the house. The consent is subject to a condition (4) relating to archaeology.

This is in accordance with the Department for Communities and Local Government's *National Planning Policy Framework* (NPPF 2012) and the District's policies on archaeology. The field investigation was carried out to a specification approved by Ms Kate Batt, Historic Environment Advisor with Hertfordshire County Council, advisers to the Borough on matters relating to archaeology. The fieldwork was undertaken by Andy Taylor on 13th January 2014.

The archive is presently held at Thames Valley Archaeological Services, Reading and will be deposited at Dacorum Museum in due course.

#### Location, topography and geology

The site is located on the eastern side of Castle Hill Avenue, the north-eastern side of Berkhamsted and west of the castle ruins (Fig. 2). The watching brief took place at the rear of the property. The underlying geology consisted of Upper Chalk (BGS 1990), which was observed in all trenches but with an undulating reddish brown clay capping in places. The site lies at a height of c.110m above Ordnance Datum.

#### Archaeological background

The archaeological potential of the site stems from its location on the margins of the historic (late Saxon and medieval) core of the town, more specifically just to the west of the castle. The town was recorded as a Borough in Domesday Book with a castle constructed soon after the Norman Conquest (Thompson and Bryant 2005). An

official Royal charter granting Borough Status was made by Henry II in 1156. Various archaeological investigations in the town have revealed evidence of medieval activity (but little of later Saxon date). A Roman road (Akeman Street) passes through the town and is thought to be on the line of the High Street and there is a possibility of encountering Roman roadside settlement on the site. Just to the north of the site, Roman occupation deposits were recorded when the housing estate on Castle Hill Avenue was built in the 20th century and to the south a Roman kiln is recorded.

#### Objectives and methodology

The purpose of the watching brief was to excavate and record any archaeological deposits affected by the groundworks. Foundation trenches for the proposed extension were observed along with an associated soakaway (Fig. 3). All spoilheaps were monitored for finds.

#### **Results**

#### The extension

The foundation trenches measured 0.60m wide and were dug to a depth of c. 1m deep (Fig. 3). A concrete pad, c. 0.1m thick that covered the extension site had already been removed. The stratigraphy observed in the trenches consisted of 0.25m of reddish brown silty clay subsoil directly overlying an undulating chalk natural geology (Figs 3 and 4; Pl. 1).

#### *The soakaway*

A soakaway was dug further to the east (Fig. 3; Pl. 2). It measured 2.50m square and was dug to a depth of c.1m. The stratigraphy observed consisted of 0.25m of turf/topsoil overlying 0.27m of reddish brown silty clay subsoil overlying chalk and clay natural geology.

#### Conservatory

An area for a small conservatory adjacent to the extension was to comprise only shallow foundations and was not examined.

#### **Finds**

No finds of an archaeological nature were recovered.

#### **Conclusion**


No deposits nor finds of an archaeological nature were observed during the watching brief.


