#### Introduction

This report documents the results of an archaeological watching brief carried out at the Stag and Hounds, 302 St Leonards Road, Windsor, Berkshire (SU 9565 7565) (Fig. 1). The work was commissioned by Mr Julian Gale of Corner Cottage, Oakley Green Road, Windsor SL4 4PZ.

Planning permission (App. No. 12/00566) has been gained from the Royal Borough of Windsor and Maidenhead, along with Listed Building consent (App. No. 12/00568) for the conversion of the Stag and Hounds into two dwellings. This consent is subject to a condition (2) relating to archaeology which required a watching brief to be carried out during groundworks.

This is in accordance with the Department for Communities and Local Government's *National Planning Policy Framework* (NPPF 2012) and the Borough's policies on archaeology. The field investigation was carried out to a specification approved by Mr Roland Smith, Archaeology Officer with Berkshire Archaeology, advisers to the Borough on matters relating to archaeology. The fieldwork was undertaken by Daniel Bray on the 2nd April 2015 and the site code is SAH 14/259.

The archive is presently held at Thames Valley Archaeological Services, Reading and will be deposited at a local museum willing to accept archive material in due course.

#### Location, topography and geology

The site is located on the north side of St Leonards Road, a main route into Windsor from the south (Fig. 1). The building stands on a roughly rectangular plot, aligned ENE-WSW. The cottage lies at the west, with the Stag and Hounds public house at the east (Fig. 2). To the south is the footpath and road, with Tarmac car parking occupying the plot at the east and north. Beyond the plot boundary to the east is a 20th-century building, housing a day nursery, and to the west are houses and apartments of fairly recent construction. The underlying geology is mapped as London Clay (BGS 1981), which was observed in the foundation trenches observed and the site lies at a height of c.30m above Ordnance Datum.

#### Archaeological background

The archaeological potential of the site stems from its location in the general vicinity of the site of the medieval leper hospital of St Peter (Astill 1977). The exact location of the hospital is unclear with recent documentary research suggesting it may lie in the vicinity of the proposal site, and there remains a possibility that it lies within the proposal site itself. However, an evaluation carried out *c*.500m to the east of the site revealed no deposits or features of archaeological interest (Dawson 2011 and 2012; McNicoll-Norbury 2011). The existing building, which has 15th-17th century origins has been subject to recording (Milbank 2015).

#### **Objectives and methodology**

The purpose of the watching brief was to excavate and record any archaeological deposits affected by the groundworks. This would involve examination of intrusive groundworks such as overburden stripping prior to ground reduction, the digging of foundation trenches and service runs and deeply invasive landscaping as necessary.

#### Results

The only groundworks on the site comprised the digging of a single L-shaped foundation trench (Fig. 3; Pls 1 and 2). The trench observed measured 0.60m wide and were dug to a depth of 1.30m. The stratigraphy observed consisted of 0.40m of topsoil directly overlying yellow brown clay natural geology. A modern pit was observed in the western element of the foundation trench containing china fragments that were retained on site.

#### Finds

No finds of an archaeological nature were recovered during the watching brief.

#### Conclusion

Despite the potential for archaeological deposits to be present on the site no finds or features were observed.


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
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
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




Plate 1. New footing trench, looking north east, Scales: 2m and 1m.
