Introduction

This report documents the results of an archaeological watching brief carried out on land off Bedford Road, Holwell, Hitchin, Hertfordshire (TL 1688 3234) (Fig. 1). The work was commissioned by Mr Michael Hackney of Memoria Ltd, The Pool House, Bicester Road, Stratton Audley, Oxfordshire, OX27 9BS.

Planning permission (15/01486/1) has been gained from North Hertfordshire District Council to construct a crematorium with associated parking, access road and gardens. The consent is subject to a condition (14) which requires a watching brief to be maintained during the groundworks.

This is in accordance with the Department for Communities and Local Government's *National Planning Policy Framework* (NPPF 2012) and the District Council's policies on archaeology. A preliminary geophysical survey (Beaverstock and Dawson 2015) and archaeological evaluation (Beaverstock and Bray 2015) had already been undertaken as part of this process. The field investigation was carried out to a specification approved by Mr Andy Instone, Historic Environment Advisor for Hertfordshire County Council. The fieldwork was undertaken by Luís Esteves and Ellen McManus-Fry between 16th August 2016 and 10th January 2017. The site code is BRH15/115.

The archive is presently held at Thames Valley Archaeological Services, Reading and will be deposited at North Hertfordshire Museum in due course.

Location, topography and geology

The site is located c. 900m to the south of Holwell and c. 1.5km to the north-west of Ickleford (Fig. 1). The area to be developed covers approximately 3ha and is situated at a height of 65m above Ordnance Datum. It is bordered to the west and east by farmland, to the north by a private road and to the south by Holwell Quarry. The site sits on a relatively flat parcel of land which was being used for agriculture. The underlying geology is mapped as Anglican Glacial Till, a salty chalky clay (BGS 1995) and this was was observed on site.

Archaeological background

A desktop study (Bermingham 2015) highlighted that, while there are no known heritage assets within the boundaries of the site, it lies within a wider area with known periods of occupation including Prehistoric, Iron Age, Roman and Medieval. Observations and subsequent excavations at Holwell Quarry to the south-west of the site recorded the presence of Iron Age and Roman occupation and burial deposits as well as evidence for medieval ridge and furrow. A geophysical (magnetic) survey (Beaverstock and Dawson 2015) was conducted on the site which revealed a number of anomalies including a ditch tentatively dated to the Roman period on the basis of three sherds of pottery. A single sherd of prehistoric pottery was also recovered.

Objectives and methodology

The purpose of the watching brief was to excavate and record any archaeological deposits affected by the groundworks. This was to involve examination of all the areas of intrusive groundworks, in particular the stripping of overburden and the digging of foundation trenches and the pond area. Any archaeological deposits threatened by the groundworks were to be excavated and recorded with sufficient time allowed within the groundworks schedule without causing undue delay.

Results

Building foundations trenches.

The foundations for the new building (crematorium) were observed and recorded (Fig 2; Pl 1). They were typically 0.6m wide with a depth between 0.85m in the east and 1.25m in the west. The stratigraphy revealed was variable with 0.15–0.2m of topsoil overlying a 0.2m–0.3m mid yellow silty clay subsoil overlying a light yellow/brown silty clay with occasional chalk inclusions (natural geology) (Pl. 2). No archaeological features or finds were observed.

Car Park (Pls 3 and 4)

Topsoil was stripped over an area for an access road and two carparks (Fig. 2). This work did not penetrate below topsoil level and thus the archaeologically relevant horizon was not exposed here.

Pond (Pls 5 and 6)

In the north-east of the site construction of a small pond related to the garden area was observed and recorded

again by monitoring the initial topsoil and overburden removal (Fig. 2). The pond had an area of 0.07ha and was

1.25m deep. The pond excavation showed a stratigraphy similar to the rest of the site, 0.1m-0.15m of topsoil

overlying a 0.38m mid yellow brown silty clay subsoil overlying a light yellow brown silty clay with occasional

chalk inclusions natural geology. No archaeological features or finds were observed.

Finds

No finds of archaeological interest were observed during the watching brief.

Conclusion

The previous archaeological evaluation and geophysical survey undertaken before these groundworks

commenced identified some linear features (a Roman ditch and undated gullies) in the northern and eastern parts

of the site). However, these were not revealed during the watching brief as the access road and car park zones

which may have encountered them were only stripped of a shallow depth of overburden (topsoil only). Areas of

deeper groundworks, namely the location of the crematorium and the pond revealed no archaeological deposits.




