Introduction

This report documents the results of an archaeological watching brief carried out at the rear of 48 Highdown Hill Road, Emmer Green, Reading, Berkshire, RG4 8QP (SU 7116 7703) (Fig. 1). The work was commissioned by Mr Philip Shell of Architectural Services, 31 Redshank Court, Thatcham, Berkshire, RG19 3UE on behalf of Mr and Mrs G Roberts of 48 Highdown Hill Road.

Planning permission has been granted on appeal (APP/E0345/W/15/3006773) from Reading Borough Council to construct a new house at 48 Highdown Hill Road, Emmer Green, Reading, Berkshire. The consent subject to a condition (4) relating to archaeology which required the implementation of a scheme of archaeological investigation, in this case, a watching brief to be carried out during groundworks.

This is in accordance with the Department for Communities and Local Government's *National Planning Policy Framework* (NPPF 2012) and the Borough's policies on archaeology. The field investigation was carried out to a specification approved by Ms Fiona Macdonald, Principal Archaeologist with Berkshire Archaeology, advisers to the Borough on matters relating to archaeology. The fieldwork was undertaken by Aidan Colyer on the 26th and 27th September 2017 and the site code is HHR 14/135.

The archive is presently held at Thames Valley Archaeological Services, Reading and will be deposited at Reading Museum in due course.

Location, topography and geology

The site is located on the western side of Highdown Hill Road, Emmer Green which lies on the northern margins of Reading (Fig. 1). It is located on a flat parcel of land to the rear of the house on the gardens associated with the property (Fig. 2). The underlying is mapped as Upper Chalk (BGS 2000), which was observed in the foundation trenches with many gravelly clay-filled solution hollows. The site lies at a height of c.74m above Ordnance Datum.

Archaeological background

The archaeological potential of the site stems from a number of records for Roman sites and finds in the area recorded in the Berkshire Historic Environment Record. To the south a Roman site was recorded at 7 Highdown Hill Road and at Emmer Green youth centre further to the south, various Roman enclosures were recorded during evaluation and follow-up excavation (MoLAS 2010). However evaluation just to the south found nothing of interest (Milbank 2007) with a second evaluation to the south (Ford 2005) finding only a single undated ditch.

Objectives and methodology

The purpose of the watching brief was to excavate and record any archaeological deposits affected by the groundworks. This would involve all areas of intrusive groundworks, in particular the digging of foundation and service trenches.

The foundations were dug using a small 360° type machine fitted under constant archaeological supervision and spoilheaps were monitored for finds.

Results

The foundation trenches (Fig. 3) measured 0.60m wide and were dug to a depth of between 1.20m in the western corner of the site to 2.20m in the eastern corner of the site (Pls 1 and 2). The stratigraphy observed consisted of 0.30m of topsoil overlying natural chalk with pockets of gravel (Fig. 4). No archaeological features or deposits were encountered.

Finds

No finds of any archaeological interest were recovered during the watching brief.

Conclusion


Despite the sites potential for archaeology to be present on the site no deposits or finds of an archaeological nature were observed during the course of the watching brief.


