

A BIBLIOGRAPHY OF NORTH AFRICAN MEDIEVAL POTTERY

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Although interest in the early Islamic archaeology of the Maghreb (Libya, Tunisia, Algeria and Morocco) has developed steadily in recent years, the typological study and dating of North African Islamic pottery by archaeologists still has to rely heavily on finds published elsewhere in the western Mediterranean, in particular in Italy.

It is equally frustrating for those working in Europe to find their Islamic imports virtually undatable except by association with already-classified European material.

While projects involving archaeologists from both sides of the western Mediterranean are only just beginning to come to terms with these problems, the information on North African pottery which is available in print is both scanty and widely scattered. A relatively comprehensive bibliography of works on Islamic art published before January 1972 has been compiled by K.A.C. Creswell (N. Africa: 1961, 750-755; 1973, 231-232). The following bibliography therefore lists works which do not appear in Creswell's work, as well as a handful of the more important ones that do. We have followed Creswell's example in including post-medieval and Berber pottery and have also included a few of the more pertinent works dealing with finds of North African pottery in southern Europe, and with the medieval ceramics trade insofar as it affects North Africa.
