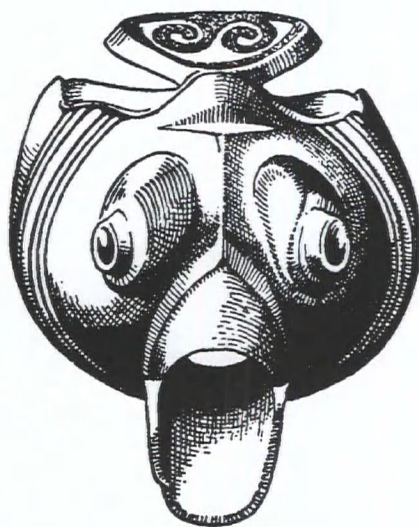

SARAH COLES, BA, PGDip, PIFA took her degree and post-graduate diploma in Archaeology at the University of Birmingham. She worked with Pre-Construct Archaeology and the Museum of London Archaeology Service before joining Thames Valley Archaeological Services in 1999 where she is now Senior Archaeological Officer. She has directed excavations throughout southern England.

MATT EDGEWORTH, BA, PhD, MIFA studied Anthropology and Archaeology at the University of Durham and currently works as a Project Officer for Albion Archaeology.
