PREFACE.

FOR a list of the almost innumerable books describing the whole of Great Britain, or England, and therefore containing accounts, more or less extended, of this county, we may refer the reader to *The Book of British Topography; a classified Catalogue of the Topographical Works in the Library of the British Museum relating to Great Britain and Ireland*, by John P. Anderson, London: 1881, 8°. In the same very useful work will be found the titles of most of the numerous and interesting books which may be described as miscellaneous Collections of British Topography, and which are, in many instances, profusely illustrated with engravings. Rich as the British Museum is in topography, it must be borne in mind that the collection is very far from being complete, many smaller libraries, even private ones, being wealthier in some departments than the national depository. In the compilation of the ensuing list it has only been found possible to insert a selection from the classes before named, but it is hoped that it will be found to comprise all the most important volumes. As regards Records, MSS., and other sources of information, much may be gathered from "An Essay on Topographical Literature," by the late John Britton, F.S.A., published in 1843,* always remembering the fact that since this date the published materials for local history have been immensely increased, and that those still unpublished, Records and Wills especially, have been made very much more accessible to inquirers.

Many of the annual Reports of the Deputy Keeper of the Public Records, the first of which was issued in 1840, contain information of the utmost value to the local

historian. The Calendars of State Papers, and the Reports of the Royal Commission on Historical MSS., are no less worthy of investigation.

Much authentic information is afforded by the Returns to the Parliamentary Inquiries of 1776, 1786, and 1803 respecting the relief of the Poor; those concerning Charities, 1786-88; the Population Returns of 1801 and later years; the Returns relative to Parish Registers, 1831; the Reports on the Boundaries of Boroughs, etc., 1832 and 1858; and the Return of Owners of Land, 1873.

The present list does not include mere articles, in journals or other books, relating to the county, or parishes or places in it. These may properly be reserved for another series.

In addition to the Catalogue of Printed Books now commenced, and the proposed list of Articles on the topography of the county, an index, locally arranged, of the materials which exist in Manuscript relating to the county, is much to be desired. It is hoped that this may some day be undertaken, under the auspices of the Society. In the meantime, any notes concerning Books, Articles, or MSS. falling within the scope of the intended lists, will be most acceptable. It is requested that they may be communicated, as early as may be convenient, to the undersigned.

At the conclusion of the present Catalogue, it is proposed to add lists—

1. Of Civil War Tracts.
2. Of Local Newspapers and Journals.
3. Of Local Acts of Parliament.

VI., pt. 2, memb. 28: the gentry of the Lancastrian party); and the names of Sheriffs, from 17 Eliz. (before which this county went with Bedfordshire).
