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Pat Chapman is post-excavation supervisor for Northamptonshire Archaeology, responsible for proof reading and editing of reports and the collation and dissemination of summaries and the deposition of digital reports online. She also reports on ceramic building materials. Her periods of interest are Neolithic to Iron Age, Saxon and medieval.

Diana Gulland is a Chartered Librarian. After retiring from a career in special libraries she served as Hon. Librarian and Archivist of the Bucks Archaeological Society from 1995 until 2012. She continues her involvement with BAS as the indexer of *Records*. Her interests include local history, art and literature. She has previously published papers in Records on research carried out on Aston Clinton House.

Chris Low is an Archivist at the Centre for Buckinghamshire Studies. He grew up in Marlow before spending several years away at university. He returned to Buckinghamshire in 2007 after completing a Master's Degree in Archives and Records Management at the University of Liverpool.
