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AN ARCHAEOLOGICAL WATCHING BRIEF AT CHURCH STREET WANSFORD, CAMBRIDGESHORE MARCH 2009

Abstract

An archaeological watching brief was undertaken by Northamptonshire Archaeology on 16th March 2009 during the construction of a foundation trench at Church Street, Wansford, Cambridgeshire. No archaeological deposits were present and no artefacts were recovered.

1 INTRODUCTION

An archaeological watching brief was undertaken by Northamptonshire Archaeology on 16 March 2009 during the construction of a foundation trench at Church Street, Wansford, Cambridgeshire (NGR TL 074 993: Fig 1). The work was commissioned by Ross Thain and Co Ltd. on behalf of A P Jobson. Listed Building Consent had been granted by Listed Building Approval 04/00439/LBC (Peterborough City Council, Environmental Services). No written brief was issued, however, a verbal agreement was obtained from Ben Robinson, Peterborough City Archaeologist. The watching brief complied with the *Standard and Guidance for an archaeological watching brief* (IfA 2008).

2 BACKGROUND

2.1 Location and topography

The foundation trench was located in a garden laid to grass and flowerbeds. The trench was positioned at the northern end of the site parallel with the road (Fig 2). The site sloped down south-easterly towards the River Nene approximately 110m away from the trench. The underlying geology belongs to the Inferior Oolite group (BGS 2009).

2.2 Historical background

The Historic Environment Record (HER) was consulted so that the archaeological potential of the development area and its environs could be identified (Fig 3). No entries are marked on the plot, however, there are several entries within 500m. The earliest archaeological evidence is noted by Mesolithic and Neolithic worked flint (HER 7940 and HER 130), Roman pottery (HER 2039), a possible Roman spearhead (HER

2015), and a cist burial (HER 121). The church has a Saxon window (HER 127) and there are houses from the 17th and 18th centuries within the village. There is also a World War II aircraft crash site noted in the vicinity (HER 50594 and HER 50595). Details are noted in the Table 1 below (see Fig 3 for locations).

An archaeological watching brief was carried out on an extension of an hotel to the south of the river; no archaeological evidence was recorded (HER 50532).

3 OBJECTIVES AND METHODOLOGY

The aims of the watching brief were to:

- Observe the groundworks connected with the construction of a foundation trench, and to record all archaeological deposits uncovered
- ◆ Determine the date, character, state of preservation and depth of any archaeological deposits observed and to retrieve all datable artefacts
- Create a permanent archive and record of the archaeological information collected during the course of the fieldwork and analysis.

The fieldwork comprised a visit to the site during the excavation of the foundation trench (Fig 2). The groundworks were carried out using mini-digger fitted with a toothless ditching bucket. The trench running parallel with the road measured 8m long by 0.5m wide with on either end 1m spurs at right angles (Fig 2). The trench was excavated to a depth of 1.80m.

A photographic record in both black and white negative and colour slide was kept, with supplementary photographs in digital format. The written record used Northamptonshire Archaeology pro-forma sheets.

4 THE RECORDED EVIDENCE

The natural at the bottom of the trench was light greyish-blue sandy clay overlain by mid orangey-yellow sand, with angular, decaying sandstone fragments, approximately 0.80m deep (Figs 4 & 5). Above this was a layer of mid greyish brown sandstone gravel of small to medium sized stones up to 0.70m thick. The topsoil was 0.10m deep. The soil was much waterlogged and the trench walls suffered from collapse during the excavations. No archaeological deposits or finds were uncovered.

6 CONCLUSIONS

The results of the watching brief showed an undisturbed stratigraphy, which was much waterlogged. No archaeological deposits or artefacts were present within the watching brief area.


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








Scale 1:500 Trench location Fig 2
