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AN ARCHAEOLOGICAL WATCHING BRIEF DURING THE INSTALLATION OF REPLACEMENT INFORMATION BOARDS AT CASTLE ACRE CASTLE, CASTLE ACRE, NORFOLK JUNE 2008

Abstract

An archaeological watching brief was undertaken by Northamptonshire Archaeology in June 2008 during the installation of replacement information boards for the graphics scheme at Castle Acre Castle, Castle Acre, Norfolk. The groundworks were contained within the post-pits excavated under archaeological observation during the initial installation. No significant archaeological deposits nor were any artefacts were present.

1 INTRODUCTION

An archaeological watching brief was undertaken by Northamptonshire Archaeology in June 2008 during the installation of replacement information boards for the graphics scheme at Castle Acre Castle, Castle Acre, Norfolk (NGR TF 8146 1480: Fig 1). The work was carried out on behalf of English Heritage following a specification produced by Northamptonshire Archaeology (Leigh 2006) and approved by English Heritage.

2 BACKGROUND

2.1 Location and Topography

The site lies within the village of Castle Acre, Norfolk. The underlying geology has been mapped by the British Geological Survey of Great Britain as comprising Chalk.

2.2 Historical Background

Castle Acre Castle lies on the route of the Peddars Way, an ancient track-way which has its origins in the Romano-British period, although the name derives from the 15^{th} or 16^{th} centuries. The site comprises the earthwork remains of a bailey along with the remains of a stone keep (Plates 1 & 2). The castle was founded soon after the Norman Conquest by William de Warenne sometime around 1170 - 1180. The surviving remains comprise possibly the finest castle earthworks in England.

To the south-west, at the other end of the village is located Castle Acre Priory which was founded in 1090 (National Monument No: 21416) and eventually vacated by the monks in 1537 following the suppression of the monasteries by Henry VIII. The surviving remains include the 12th-century church and 15th-century gatehouse and prior's house.

Previous archaeological work within the confines of the castle include a watching brief carried out during the initial installation of the information boards that were replaced under the current watching brief (Burrow 2007).

3 OBJECTIVES AND METHODOLOGY

The aims of the watching brief were to:

- Observe the groundworks undertaken for the installation of the information boards, and to record all archaeological deposits uncovered.
- Determine the date, character, state of preservation and depth of any archaeological deposits observed and to retrieve all datable artefacts.
- Create a permanent archive and record of the archaeological information collected during the course of the fieldwork and analysis.

The fieldwork comprised a single visit to the site on the 17th June 2008 during the like-for-like installation of information boards at Castle Acre Castle. The existing posts and boards were dug out by hand and the new posts inserted into the existing holes and secured with post-crete. The holes measured approximately 0.40m square with a maximum depth of 0.60m.

A photographic record in both black and white negative and colour slide was kept, with supplementary photographs in digital format. The written record used Northamptonshire Archaeology pro-forma sheets. The watching brief was carried out in accordance with the standards and guidelines for an archaeological watching brief (IFA 2000).

4 THE RECORDED EVIDENCE

An examination revealed the stratigraphic sequence to be exactly that as recorded during the initial installation. All of the post-pits displayed a similar stratigraphic sequence of anthropogenic subsoil comprised of a silty loam and chalk nodules which, in the cases of post-pits 1-4 represented the material cast-up from the construction of the castle's defences, which was overlain by a shallow topsoil and turf layer (see Appendix for details).

6 CONCLUSIONS

The groundworks undertaken for the installation of the replacement information boards were contained within the areas subject to the initial archaeological condition. In this respect no additional information was obtained to add to that already recorded.

No archaeologically significant deposits were present in the post-pits where the information boards have been located. The watching brief was carried out in favourable conditions and the results are considered to be reliable.



Location of Castle Acre Castle F


