Description of Works:

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


Figure 1: Site location.




Figure 2: Site Plan

South West Archaeology Limited monitored the removal of topsoil (to a depth of c.0.30m) and the excavation of a footing trench at the rear of 50 New Street, Torrington (see Figures 1 & 2; & Photos 7 & 8). Prior to the substantial depth of topsoil being established, it was initially removed to its full depth in the south-west corner of the site, partially truncating the subsoil (1001) to reveal two modern features (see Figures 2, 3.3 & 3.4; & Photos 1 - 4). No features were revealed within the footing trench. A number of layers were revealed in the footing trench (see Figures 2, 3.5, 3.6 & 3.8; Photos 5 & 6):

Site Stratigraphy (Footing Trench: 0.6m wide, 0.75-1m deep after topsoil strip, along the footprint of the building):

0.38-0.50m of Topsoil (1000). Dark brown grey, friable clay silt with moderate small rounded stones and frequent modern debris (especially along the disused path along the eastern boundary).*No.50 New street used to be a Butchers shop, therefore bone waste was present in the soil. Contained pot, clay-pipe, CBM, glass.

0.20-0.45m of Subsoil (1001). Dark brown green, friable clay silt with moderate small-medium sub-rounded stones. Contained pot, clay pipe, animal bone, oyster shell.

0.34-0.67m of a 2nd Subsoil (1002). Light green brown, soft clay silt with occasional large sub-angular rocks. Contained clay pipe.

At a depth of 1.04-1.34m+, Natural (1003). Mid brown orange, compact clay with occasional medium-large subangular stones.

South-West corner of site (3.6x4.7m wide, 0.86m deep):

0.38m of Topsoil. As above.

0.42m of Subsoil. As above.

At a depth of 0.80m+ 2nd Subsoil occurred. As above.

In this area Pit [1005] (0.76x0.80x0.11+m) was revealed, but was truncated by the machine. The profile was a moderate-steep slope with a curved break of slope & a flat base, with one fill (1006), a mid grey-brown, friable clay-silt with frequent small sub-rounded stones & occasional charcoal flecks. It contained $17^{th} - 19^{th}$ century pottery, glass, animal bone, CBM & slag.

The terminus of Gully [1003] was also revealed. It ran east from the terminus, 0.40m wide x 1.60m+ in length. It produced modern/19th-20th century pottery and thus was not excavated but was recorded in plan with its fill (1004), a mid grey-brown, friable clay-silt with frequent small sub-rounded stones & occasional charcoal flecks. It contained modern pottery, mortar and animal bone.

The groundworks only revealed features dating to the 19th century and later, none of which was of archaeological significance. Although the sites stratigraphic layers show human disturbance from the post-medieval period such remains would be expected from a known 12th century borough with developments along New Street from the 14th century, and perhaps specifically as the site is located within 15m of known burgage plots.




Figure 3: Sections & Plan of Pit [1005].
